Since publication, we have been asked on several occasions why all these were sold, why the city hall bonds had not been sold before this date, and why was no announcement made of construction plans for the city hall if bonds earmarked for that purpose were being sold as

We shall try to explain each of these to the best of our knowledge, after further study since publication.

True, likely a number of voters OK'd the paving and waterworks improvements only upon satisfaction in their own mind that a city hall would be included in the improvement program. Though we would be among the first to wish that a city hall and jail were completed at this time, we can see where circumstances might have prevented early erection. And we hope we are correct when we observe that the city dads have been mighty busy and have carried out the voters' wishes in expeditious manner, just as fast as the various and separate jobs could be tackled. Excessive strain on manpower, costs and facilities no doubt would have been mandatory had the city gone all out to simultaneously pave the streets, lay the curb and gutters, and re-model and enlarge the sewer and water facilities in any record time. So first things were considered first. And now we believe it is time to turn to the city hall, with other programs nearing completion. And we believe such will be done; if not, then the public is due full explanation.




