## Chamber of Commerce C-U-R-R-E-N-T-S

We haven't a very enthusiastic response of community leaders regarding our proposed county fair and I am sure that this is just neglect or that our people think that there is plenty of time to work it up. This is a mistake however as to put on a fair worthy of the name we should commence making our plans and decide just what we are going to deliver. It is not the idea to place the proposition absolutely under the control of the chamber of commerce, but to organize a county fair association separate and apart with its own officers and directors. I notice that since the fair was merged with the chamber of commerce that it lost a lot, and especially the influence and active cooperation of citizens who had heretofore taken an active part in putting it over each year and this is just what we desire to get back to. It can be done and we should have a good county fair. Some of you fellows, whether you consider yourselves community leaders or not; come in and let's talk it over and see if we can't start something.

For the past several days we have been trying to complete work toward the conclusion of the Brownfield-Plains-Lovington highway but it is a pretty hard matter to select a route in Lea county that is satisfactory to every resident. The matter will be worked out in time to present to the next commissioners court.

A meeting of the Roswell Air Line will be called within the next few days and it is hoped that a way will be found to cause the highway department to let the contract for the closing of the gap now existing in Kent county, which when complete, will make the route practically hard-surfaced between Fort Worth and Post.

This office called for samples of the popcorn that was grown in a limited quantity in our county for the purpose of sending to the manufacturer of popcorn confections, but up to this date we have not received an ear. Reason for desiring these samples was that it was thought that we might receive an offer for delivery of a new crop at a profitable price. I notice where a man in Lamb county grew an acre of popcorn and set aside his home winter supply and sold the remainder for \$140.50. Some money per acre. Peanuts are going to be in demand at a good price and each community should plant a few acres on each farm we could then get outside bids and probably make some pretty fair outside money. For the present and probably for the next several years cotton will be our main crop but this should not deter us from trying other cash crops.

The office has received notice that a shipment of Government bulletins would be made the next few days and in addition to this we are expecting a number of booklets from the Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association covering on hogs, poultry, cattle and sheep and feeding them for profit. Advance sheets received by us lead to the opinion that they are as valuable as the bulletins placed by the department of agriculture.

Don't forget cleanup week the 3rd week in April. Let us put on a new spring dress and don't forget that a beautiful yard contest will be staged along plans published in last paper. The "Brownfield" will be mailed about the 15th. Don't fail to read it as we hope to make it interesting.

## South Route Extended About 12 Miles

Word was received this week by Postmaster J. C. Bohannon to extend the south route, a tri-weekly route, 12 miles, going on from the Union community into the Jack Bryan and Scudday communities. This will be a great accommodation to these people. Mr. Bohannon informed us also that hard work would now be put forth for the next quarter in order to try and make the route a daily, and with the fact that 12 miles has been added to the route, making it nearly 50 miles long, he is confident that with the cooperation of the patrons and the town, it can easily be accomplished.

## Telephone Exchange Gets New Directories

We are pleased to announce that the local telephone company have finally installed a new directory, the first since 1924, and now we are supposed to call by number. ## Santa Fe Makes Many Official Changes

AMARILLO, April 4.—Important changes in operating officials on the Eastern and the Western Lines, grand operating divisions of the Santa Fe Railway, take place on April 1st.

F. C. Fox, General Manager of the Eastern Lines with headquarters at Topeka since 1916, becomes Assistant to the Vice-President in charge of operations with headquarters at Topeka.

F. A. Lehman, General Manager of the Western Lines for six years, succeeds Mr. Fox as General Manager of the Eastern Lines with headquarters at Topeka.

R. H. Allison Assistant General Manager of the Eastern District of the Eastern Lines, comes to Amarillo as General Manager of the Western Lines.

D. S. Farley, Assistant General Manager of the Western District of the Eastern Lines succeeds Mr. Allison.

A. Ewing, Superintendent of the New Mexico Division since 1920 with headquarters at Las Vegas, succeeds Mr. Farley as Assistant General Manager of the Western District of the Eastern Lines with headquarters at Topeka.

J. F. Anton, Superintendent of the Slaton Division since 1920, succeeds Mr. Ewing as Superintendent of the New Mexico Division.

J. C. Barton, Assistant Superintendent of the Panhandle Division, is promoted to Superintendent of the Slaton Division with headquarters at Slaton, Texas.

Mr. Allison, the new General Manager of the Western Lines entered railway service in 1887 and has been in continuous service for forty years. He became dispatcher of the Santa Fe Railway in 1902, advanced to chief dispatcher in 1903, to trainmaster in 1905 to superintendent in 1914, and to assistant general manager in 1920.

The Western Lines, one of the four operating districts into which the Santa Fe Railway is divided, include over four thousand miles of main line in western Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, northwest Texas, and western Oklahoma.

Stamford—The law firm of Andrews and Coombs is to make use of the upper rooms of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce building. Judge Coombs, past mayor of Abilene, will serve, among other duties at the Stamford office, as counsel for the Swenson Cattle and Land Company. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce building was erected to care for growing needs of the organization and until such time an expansion will make necessary, the upper floor will be rented out.

## Our Merchants Doing A Fine Business

While building is at a standstill in Brownfield, there nevertheless is much improvements going on in the way of repairs in order to beautify the homes of the people in one way and another, and just as soon as the dust storms have sorter let up, the paint brush will be used about the town in beautifying the appearances of the premises. As a result, the carpenters, while not rushed, are mostly finding jobs of the above nature and later on if something on the order of an oil well or another bumper crop comes in, work of building new dwellings and business houses will then get under way again.

In the mean time, our merchants are doing a good business, especially those who are advertising and asking for it, and they are bringing to the city people further and further away from Brownfield, and once they come, they seem to like and return for more bargains. In fact, despite the fact that new comers this year have not more than held their own with people who have left for one reason or another, our Saturday crowds are constantly increasing, and those who have taken the trouble to investigate the matter find many trading here who have hitherto done their trading at other towns. Indeed, we find many of these people coming more than half way of the distance between Brownfield and other towns of our size and larger to do most of their trading here. This is the result of the fact that what they eat, wear or use can be had from Brownfield merchants at a distinct saving, and while they are about the matter, they are spending money with other institutions here and enriching the town. Therefore, no merchant should sit down on the job and let "George" bring them here, but all should share alike in this expense unless they propose to reap where they have not sown. Let's all get together and all pull alike for this new trade.

The Herald is pleased to say that just because times got a little pinchy the most of our long-headed merchants did not cut down their advertising in this paper, and as a consequence they have reaped this cash business that otherwise would have gone to the other town. As a comparison, we note that nearly all the towns of Brownfield's class, the papers have all cut from eight to six pages, and a few times have appeared with only four pages since the holidays. The merchants in these towns have, to our notion, just been cutting their own throats in order to accomplish what they thought was "economizing." There is a false economy and there is true economy, and all should be able to distinguish between them.

The day has come when people are great newspaper readers. The paper goes right into the home and is read by every member of the family, and the ads are considered legitimate reading matter. The day has also come when trade goes where it is invited, whether it be individuals or invitation each week for trade towns. With a concerted action and invitation each week for trade in Brownfield by the Brownfield merchants, it is no wonder, with the attractive prices and courteous treatment, that people from more than half way and no better roads if as good, are coming to Brownfield. With the advent of good roads and the automobile, there is hardly a limit to be placed on a town's trade territory.

## City Election Also Quiet Affair Here

The voters of Brownfield did not take enough interest for more than about 50 to turn out Tuesday for the city election, but what did turn out seemed to be well satisfied with the old councilmen and did not believe in changing horses in midstream.

The old farmer assured us that he had no intention of stepping on anyone's toes, nevertheless he was firm in his contention that diversification, other than for home consumption, was only a theorem, the lack of which, not being the cause of the present agricultural depression, and should it be practiced by all farmers, would prove even a greater failure than specialization in cotton. Otherwise, in view of the fact that last year we planted the fence corners to cotton, and produced the world's greatest crop, he would be glad that anyone adhering to, or advocating the safe methods of farming, would give practical answers to the following questions, also logical reasons for existing conditions, viz:

Why on the Plains did corn sell for 35 cents per bushel, maize 88 per ton, kaffir \$6, other products in proportion; in central Texas oats at 18 to 22c per bushel, in south Texas, cabbage at \$6 per ton? Why the raw products so cheap? and the finished materials so cheap? The writer being unable to answer his questions, gladly refers them to his readers. The old farmer closed his discourse by saying, that in his opinion, if the

percent of farmers go into the hog and poultry business as the daily farm and other publications contend should before the ending of another year, there will be an open season for destroying the unmarketed products of the sow and hen.

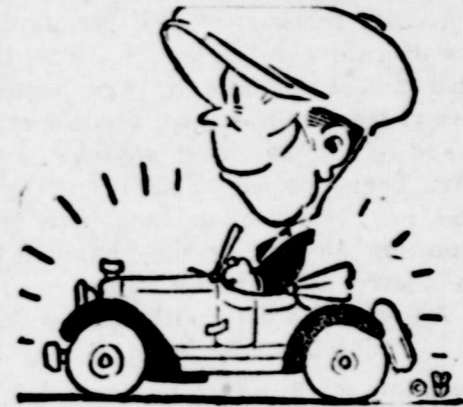

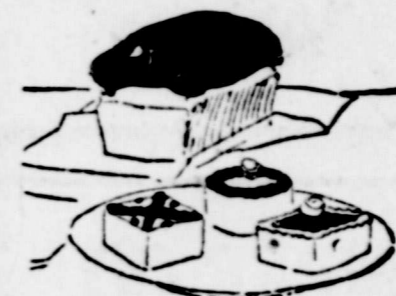

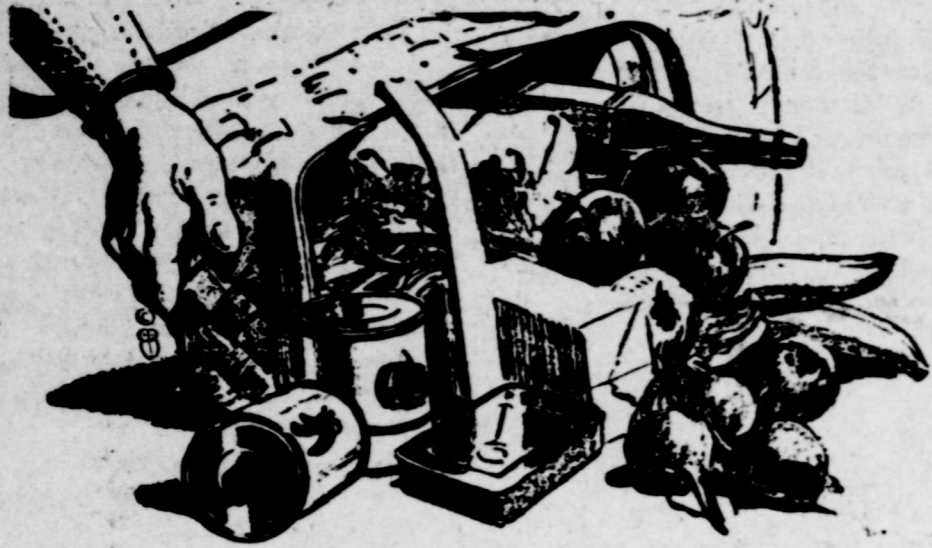

## TEXAS UTILITIES OFFERS PRIZES FOR ESSAYS

These rates will go on sale May 13 and have a final rate limit to May 19. The convention will be held in this City May 16 and 17. These rates will apply from all points in Texas and are effective on a zone basis with a minimum selling fare of \$1.00. Under the one basis there is a graduated scale of fares providing for a one fare plus one-half fare for points within 299 miles of Wichita Falls. For 600 miles or over the rate will be one fare plus \$1.00, while for distances ranging from 300 to 599 miles the rate will be a one-way fare plus one-fifth to one-third. Indications point to many special trains. It is expected the New Mexico delegation will start from Roswell in a special train and delegates will be picked up at other New Mexico towns. New Mexico is planning for the biggest delegation that State has ever had at the convention.

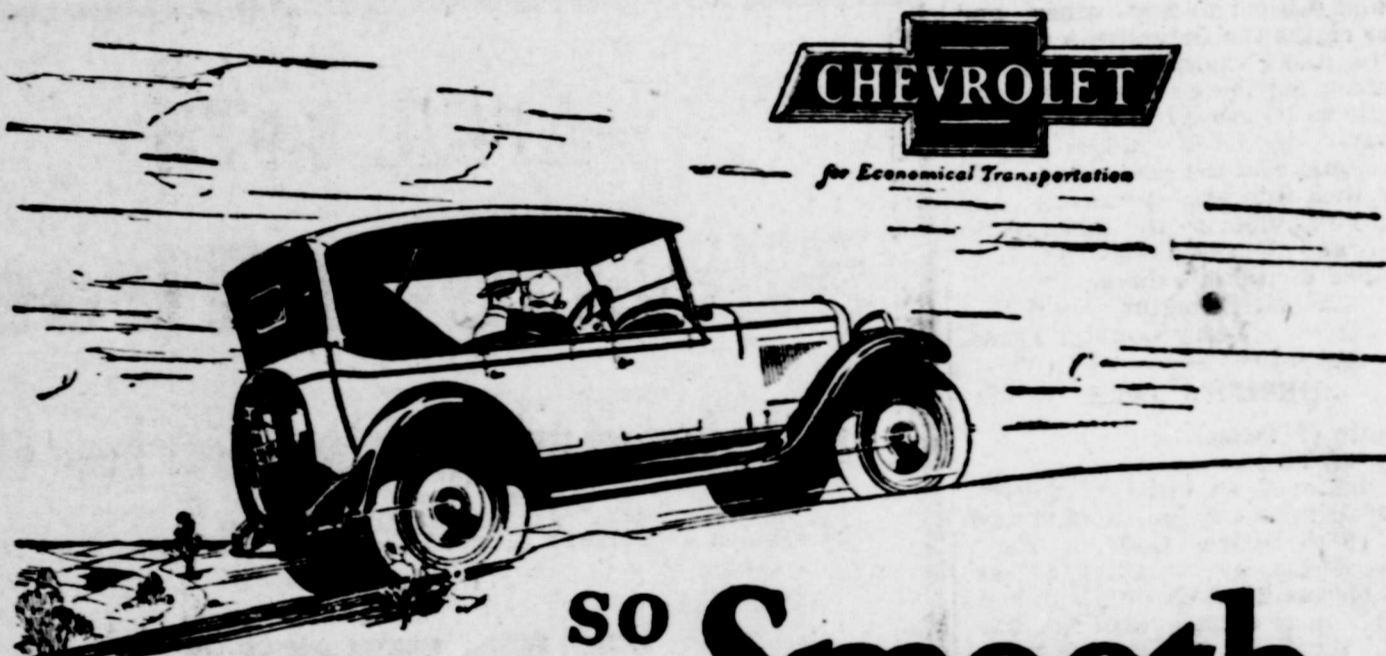
