

Friona, it seems to us, has more than its share of "hot rodders"-that lusty class of drivers, comprised mostly of young men, who delight in beefing up stock car engines with supercharger equipment, gutting the mufflers, and daring pedestrians to get in their way as they rip down the town's streets.

On occasion, they convert what ordinarily ought to be a peaceful city thoroughfare into a miniature Indianapolis, complete with screaming tires, roaring exhausts, and clouds of dust.

"We ought to do something about it, before somebody's kid gets killed," is a commonly heard expression on Main Street these days from folks who worry about wreckless driving.
