COMING OUT OF THE MUD

One of the chief benefits the farmer derives from really good roads is that of being able to move his farm products to market over them, quickly, cheaply and without inconvenience. The farmer's crops are his stock in trade. If he can market them without delay when the price is up, he is the gainer; if, because of bad roads, he is unable to get his products to market until after the price has declined, he loses.

In the old days when roads were only good in good weather, the farmer could do little satisfactory marketing. He was forced to take a chance on getting his products to the buyer on a rising market.

One decided advantage in good roads is that they encourage the use of motor vehicles by the farmer, effecting a saving in time and worry in moving his crops, and in getting his family to church and the children

Thousands of miles of poor roads which act as feeders for main highways are being made practical for modern traffic at a minimum of expense, by protecting the old base with a waterproof wearing surface. Thus farm land is made available for use, which would otherwise be isolated due to distance from school and markets and prohibitive cost of building standard types of state highway

The modern tractor and road machinery plus the waterproofing qualities of asphalt are enabling hundreds of communities to come out of the





A number of large wells have been sunk and water will be pumped into the reservoir and carried by large pipe to the city by gravity. This was a surprise to me as I had always been told that Amarillo was the top of Texas, and the coldest and windiest in the state.

The pumping will be done by large air compressors operated by electricity. These have not been installed but are on the ground. They have a large electric plant with immense generators. At present they are pumping through a six inch pipe to supplement the present water supply of the city.

The plant when completed will cost two million dollars, and is expected to meet the future needs of the city for years, or until it reaches the porportions of New York or Chicago. Most Amarillo folks think that it will surpass these two towns, in a few decades. Of course it isn't a windy city?

Farming in that region is rather backward this season. Over a large portion I saw very little row crops planted or preparation of ground for planting. In most fields harvesting was in progress and combines were a feature of the land-

Crops are backward in all parts of the plains visited and the outlook for cotton gloomy indeed. In a few places the plant was up but looked sick-needed a tonic or, perhaps a rain would do but even that has been denied to most parts.

One reading the dispatches in the Star-Telegram and some of the plains papers would be led to believe that we have had abundant rainfall over most of the plains. This is a false statementt. The facts are that very few scatttered areas have had more than half inch at any one time this year, many of them less.



TWO NEW OIL TESTS TO BE
