BLANTON ANNOUNCES WILL BE CANDIDATE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 .- Representative Thomas L. Blanton of the Abilene district, announced Wednesday that he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination to the United States Senate. He expects to begin an active campaign of the State as soon as the appropriation bills are passed. Mr. Blanton will complete twelve consecutive years in the House with the present Congress.

Senator Earle B. Mayfield has al ready announced his candidacy for a second term. Others in the race are Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham of New Waverly; Col. Alvin M. Owsley of Dallas and former Gov. Oscar B Colquitt. Mr. Blanton's formal statement issued announcing that he is in the race, "regardless of who may en ter it," reads as follows:

"I shall be a candidate for the United States Senate.

"This Government must be wrested from the control of plunderers and be restored to the people with honest and economical administration. Only in the Senate may plundering be effectively stopped.

"All exploiters of public funds and governmental favoritism are not in the Republican party alone. Some operate in all parties, and need constant checking.

"There must be established a rea partnership between the Federal Government and "all the people."

"At an early date I will submit my platform to the people, and as soon as we finish our work in passing the appropriation bills, I will begin an active campaign of Texas from every part of which I have been promised loyal support. I am in the race regardless of who may enter it."



WHY SHOULDN'T THEY FIGHT FOR THEIR RIGHTS?

A number of press dispatches feature stories to the effect that public utilities have organized to defeat the plans of public ownership of industries. The inference is that they are doing something wrong by such ac-

No reports of equal prominence are published to show that individuals and organizations favoring the establishment of socialistic government in this nation are catering their attacks for the moment on public utilities.

Is it any more undesirable for the public utilities or any other business to organize openly and fight for their lives than it is for individuals and organizations to surreptitiously seek to undermine the right of private own-

When Chass Was Put Under Churchly Ban

As to how chess was introduced into western and central Europe little is really known, and still less about its advent into this country. Some say that chess was brought into Europe at the time of the Crusades, the theory being that Christian warriors learned to play it at Constantinople, but this has been disproved.

More probable it is that the Spaniards received the game from their Moslem conquerors, who had learned it from the Persians, who in their turn had been initiated into it by the Hindus, while the Italians acquired

chess from the Byzantines. It seems that chess was known in Italy before the first Crusade, for there is extant, says Colonel Whitten. in the Nineteenth Century, a curious letter from the cardinal archbishop of Ostia to Pope Alexander II, written about 1061, bearing on the game.

The cardinal had imposed a penance on a bishop whom he had found diverting himself with chess, and in his letter to the pope the cardinal quetes the language of reproof he had used to his erring subordinate: "Was it right, I say, and consistent with thy duties, to sport away thy evenings amidst the vanities of chess and defile the hand which offers up the body of the Lord, and the tongue which mediates between God and man, with the pollution of this sacrilegious game?"

Death as Companion

Bolivia is probably the most inaccessible country in the world. It can only be reached by crossing the Andes er by taking a long and difficult journey through the Argentine. Thus, although it is four times as large as Great Britain, its population is only one-quarter that of London.

It lies wholly in the tropical belt, but much of its surface consists of a lofty tableland running up to 13,000 feet, where the climate is intensely dry and cold, with censiderable snow and fearful electric storms.

In many places the track is a mere shelf of rock with nothing between its edge and a drep of thousands of feet. In places the track rises 15,000 feet above sea level. On this plateau, at a height of 13,-000 feet, is the vast Lake Titicaca, almost as big as Lake Erie in Canada.

HOME POSSIBLE? To create a true home, however

modest, requires many things in combination, but without insurance protection no home would be possible to the average citizen.

To begin with, its cost would be almost prohibitive. Building materials, if those who deal in them had no fire insurance, would ultimately soar in price.

From the first breaking of ground to the driving of the final nail, the savings of the owner might be wiped out in a few minutes by fire. After the home, which possibly represented the savings of a liftetiime, was finished and occupied, there would be the ever prsent risk of complete de struction by fire.

Even if the owner wished to assume this risk, it is generally necessary to borrow some money for home building purposes, and the agencies with money to loan would not accept such a risk except at an exorbitant rate, without insurance protection. 

Longest Bridges

In estimating which is the longest bridge in the world, the length of the main span is usually considered, without the approaches. The Quebec cantilever bridge over the St. Lawrence, 1,800 feet main span, is the longest. The new Delaware river bridge between Philadelphia and Camden, 1,-750 foot span, is the longest suspension bridge in the world. Not Original Draft

Easy to Trace Origin of Names of States

Two are plainly coined words descriptive of the outstanding physical features of the states that bear them -Vermont and Montana.

Stern in Discipline

An occasional copy of the People's Magazine fer 1836 is found in New England's "attic libraries." In one of these yellowed volumes treasured in a Bradford (N. H.) home is a casual mention of a statistical matter that might be of interest to presentday pedagogs.

It is stated that a certain schoolmaster named John James Hauberle had taught school 51 years. In that time he had given the youths entrusted to his care 911,957 blews with a stick, 24,410 strokes with a rod, 29. 899 ferrulings, 136,715 blows with one hand, 10,326 slaps on the chops, 7,905 boxes on the ear, 1,115,000 raps on the head, 12,342 Nota Benes with the Bible, catechism, Psalm book and grammar, and had made boys kneel 613 times on peas and 777 times on a three-cornered block of wood.

People Never Partial

to Perforated Coins

Ferforated coins were never in favor in the United States, though various efforts were made to popularize them. The first United States coin with a perforated center was a gold dollar issued in 1849, which had a square Hole in the middle of the planchet. It was the forerunner of the gold dollar issued by the United States mint in 1849. The coin was engraved, not struck from dies. The next United States coin with a perforated center was issued from the Philadelphia mint in 1850 and was of the denomination of 1 cent. It was about the size of the bronze cent now in use.

At that time the large, old fashioned copper cent was in general circulation and the perforated coin received the name of "ring cent." The designer reasoned that by means of the perforation the cent could be distinguished by touch from the dime. Another perforated cent issued the same year showed two rings in the field, with the words "Cent, one-tenth silver." The reverse showed an olive wreath around the perforation and the words 'United States of America." The mint authorities undertook to design a coin that would answer all requirements, and the pieces were struck with both pierced and perfect centers in silver, copper, nickel and composition metal, six varieties in all, without counting the various metals, but none of the designs was favored by the government authorities, and consequently they were never put in general circu-

Getting married is complicated business in China. Anna Louise Strong, writing in Harper's Magazine, gives the following description of Chinese wedding customs as related to her by Chinese student:

"If a marriage is honorable in China, the parents of the groom will pay the money needed. They will send notes from the groom's father: 'On such a date my son will marry the daughter of Mr. So-and-So. Your presence is requested at the feast.' But it is worth much to him, for at the wedding, all honor is shown to this old man, who will now be a grandfather, since his son has taken a wife.

"But if the marriage be without parents' consent, then the young folks cannot be at home on their wedding day. A proper, henorable marriage-it really cannot be done without the parents; otherwise, all is disorder. There are only two other ways for young folks. One is to wait and beseech the parents. Even if they do not like the girl, still they love their son, and if they see him always unhappy, refusing to take any other woman or to give them grandsons, in the end they will often give way."

Vanity of Pakenham Brought His Defeat

The American forces under Andrew Jackson at New Orleans in January, 1815, inflicted severe losses on the British troops because General Pakenham, the British commander, Insisted upon carrying out a set method of attack which did not prove successful against the Americans, points out Clifford Raymond in an article in Lib-

"It was British tradition," continues the author, "that troops could take a position in frontal attack, carrying material for filling ditches and ladders for scaling walls. It was also in the history of British regiments in America that they had not done it on many occasions; but Pakenham, with his reputation to maintain, was convinced that he had do it, even with Andrew Jackson animating the troops behind the breastworks.

"Pakenham died rallying the men," explains Raymond, "when they withered under the rifle and artillery fire. Before that fire, in 25 minutes the sterm troops of Great Britain disappeared. There were 700 killed, 1,400 wounded, and 500 taken prisoners. The American loss was 8 killed and 13 wounded."

Peking Child Beggars Bane of Foreigners

Even Cairo and Naples cannot compare with Peking in the number and persistence of the professional beggars who swarm upon the streets and annoy strangers with their supplications. In Peking the casual tourist will do well to buy a "small dime" coppers before he goes out-that means twenty-eight coppers-and to distribute a copper here and a copper there. It purchases immunity from annoyance.

Recently the doorways of the foreign hotels were beseiged by swarms of ragged little girls of eight or ten years, each carrying a tiny, wailing, naked infant, supposedly their starving little sisters. As a matter of fact, these little begging girls are all hired, as are also the infants, by fat, sleek men who control this beggar ring and prey upon ignorant for-



Sickle Still in Use

at Galician Harvest

A Galician peasant girl frames her bronzed face with a russet-colored handkerchief. She wears a blouse of blue percale with sleeves of checked gingham, and a gray woolen skirt. The white and blue striped apron is crumpled by the sheaf of yellow wheat clasped in her smooth brown arms.

In Galicia many of the men emigrate to find employment, and the women carry on the work of the four seasons. The fields are small; the farming methods are the methods of the Homeric age. The red earth is turned in shallow furrows with wooden plows drawn by biscuit-colored oxen.

The seed is scattered by hand, and the soil is cultivated with wooden harrows. In June the grain is ripe. and the peasant girl goes into the field with her sickle.

The harvester bends low; in the left arm she gathers a cluster of grain stalks; with the sickle in her right hand she cuts a swift stroke near the roots. Catching the severed grain in the curve of the sickle, she raises it above her head and waves it in a circular movement; then, pivoting on her hips, she lays the sheaf on the ground behind her. In tireless rhythm she moves across the rows of grain.

A boy follows in the field, tying the sheaves with straws.-Exchange.
