

The scientific documentation of the vaccine's safety and effectiveness is overwhelming. Over 30 million children in the United States alone have been inoculated without mishap since May 7, 1955. Experience in 1955, now reported from 23 areas (mostly states) shows that the vac-cine is at least 75% effective in preventing paralytic poliomyelitis.

Dr. Spring indicated that vaccine is on hand now at the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, and that doctors there will proceed with inoculation as is suggested by the Foundation.

They previously had decided not to vaccinate after July 1 of this summer.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

To be voted on at an election to be held on

NOVEMBER 6, 1956

Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations; providing for the necessary perclamations and publications.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1, That Section 9, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section (63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:
"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48. Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be equal to the sagneting the Legislature to revise the amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall no one (1) year exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (5504.00) for any such person; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire herefore either straining the age of the constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any such employment, and in no case shall any person retire the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (5504.00) for any such employees and providing have the such proposed in the propose shall equal contributions by such employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State countributions for public schools, colleges, and universities and providing that they do not exceed at






