Clyde Men Given Probated Sentences Thursday

BAIRD—Probated prison terms were given here Thursday to two men who pleaded guilty to felony charges involving assaults— an attempted murder by drowning and a knifing.

Douglas Wayne Gray, 25, of Clyde received a four-year term from 42nd District Judge Don Lane after he admitted attempting to drown his estranged wife, Carol Yarbrough Gray, by holding her head under water in a bathtub at her home on Jan. 5.

As part of the "plea bargain" entered into by Criminal District Attorney Pat Elliott and Gray's attorney, Lynn Ingalsbe of Abilene, Lane was allowed to consider a second charge against Gray as an "unadjudicated offense" in setting the punishment. The consideration means that Gray may not be prosecuted on the second charge he admitted, burglary. That charge alleged Gray broke into the home of Mrs. Gray's grandfather, O.J. Sampson, 71, and threatened him with a knife after Mrs. Gray escaped and fled to

the relatives house. Sampson said Gray left after he hit the younger man with a chair and called for deputy sheriffs.

Callahan County Deputies Ed Duncan, Jess Henley, and Constable Glen Smith arrested Gray at his home 2½ hours after the incident. He was abusive and resisted arrest.

William Everet Kennard, 51, of Clyde, received a three-year term and was ordered to make \$260. restitution for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Kennard admitted cutting Kenneth Wayne Swanson, then 16, of Clyde, on the back of his leg on Jan. 20.

The 12-inch cut, required 36 stitches. Kennard was ordered to pay Swanson's \$260. medical bill as one of the terms for probation.

Kennard also received a \$200. fine and a 10-day jail term for driving while intoxicated. Those charges involved an arrest by DPS Troopers Bill Russell and P.D. Dean on May 12, while he was free from jail on bond on the assault charge.

Men Brought Back To County For Trial

BAIRD— James Dennis Dwyer, 21, a former Abilene college student who had been sought for more than four months on assault and sexual abuse charges has been arrested in California and returned here for trial. He was living in Abilene at the time he disappeared in February and was later arrested on an indecent exposure charge in Blythe California on May 25.

Dwyer originally refused to waive extradition, but after the paperwork to return him here was begun, the suspect agreed to accompany deputies back to Callahan County. Deputies immediately flew to Blythe and returned with Dwyer, who is now in Callahan County Jail.

Dwyer was indicted by a 42nd District Court grand jury in February on charges of sexual abuse and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Livestock Killed In Accidents Sun.

COUNTY—The Callahan County Sheriff's Department received word that Bill Cason's missing 1976 oldsmobile was found abandoned just north of Los Angeles on Interstate 5. It is presently being

stored at Velencia, California.

In other news, five head of livestock were killed 5 miles north of Baird Sunday night, June 3. There were three vehicles involved, but no one sustained any injuries.

Aug. Kindergarten Pre-Registration

BAIRD- Kindergarten pre-registration for Baird students who have not already been registered for the coming year will be held August 16-17.

Parents are reminded to bring their child's legal birth certificate (hospital record not acceptable), and an up-to-date immunization record.

Immunization requirements for school are as follows:

1. Polio. Three doses of oral polio are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

2. Diphtheria/Tetanus/Whooping cough. At least three doses of DTP are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

3. Measles. Measles vaccine is required on or after the first birthday, or provide a history of measles illness.

4. Rubella. One dose of rubella vaccine

is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.

5. Mumps. Mumps vaccine will be required for all students under eight years or age. A history of mumps illness will be accepted in lieu of vaccine, if it has been validated in writing by a physician.

The monthly screening clinic held at the Baird Community Center will be held later on in the month of June, and parents are encouraged to take advantage of this service in order to get their children's immunization records up-to-date.

In regard to the assignment of morning and afternoon kindergarten classes, J. Weldon Moore, elementary principal, stated that students would not be assigned to either class until after the August registration. Therefore, if you have a preference for your child, you are to submit your written preference before August 16-17.

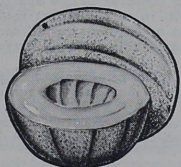

M.B. Nichols Is Mr. Holstein in S. America Davis Receives Promotion

BAIRD - His name at home is M.B. "Nick" Nichols. But in northern South America where dairy herd breeding has boomed as an industry he is known as "Mr. Holstein".

Nichols, for many years a field representative in Arizona and 10 other Western states for the Holstein-Friesian Association began his Latin American operations in 1948 in Ecuador. He worked there with then President Galo Plaza to create one of the finest dairy herds in South America.

The son of a Texas cattleman, Nichols said his first job dealing with Holsteins was at the Fort Collins (Colo.) State College in 1930, testing cattle and check-

ing on their milk production.

Nichols went to the extension staff of Washington State University in 1944 and four years later, he was on his way to Ecuador to give President Plaza a hand with his new Holstein herd. For three years he worked and talked Holstein in Ecuador. Nichols returned to University work but was called upon by Ecuador neighbors for help with their cattle.

Nichols found his Latin America experience so rewarding that he decided to abandon university work and concentrate on the export of registered Holsteins abroad.

Except for lending a

hand to his Latin American friends, Nichols said he had retired from active business, planning to keep busy writing about his experiences in Latin America.

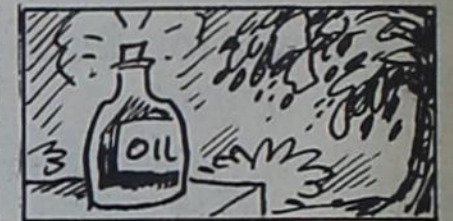

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN BY CALLAHAN COUNTY OF ITS RENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.

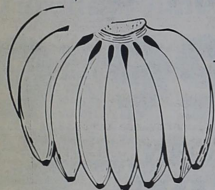

Horses Should Be Vaccinated

COUNTY - Texas horse owners should begin plans to vaccinate their animals against Eastern, Western and Venezuelan Encephalomyelitis, advises Greg Gerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

This sleeping sickness is caused by viruses transmitted by mosquitoes. Early clinical signs of the disease are depression and high fever. Diminished reflexes, a drooping lower lip, reluctance to move and incoordination soon follow.

Horse owners should consult their veterinarians about vaccination against all types of the disease,

Gerngross advises. Following the initial series, annual booster shots are required.

Gerngross believes these vaccinations are worth the trouble since prevention is cheaper than treatment or losing a valuable animal. Since the course of the disease is short, treatment is generally unsuccessful. Also, treatment costs would pay for several animals' vaccinations each year.

To aid mosquito control, insect repellents, sprays and screened enclosures for night stabling may be helpful.

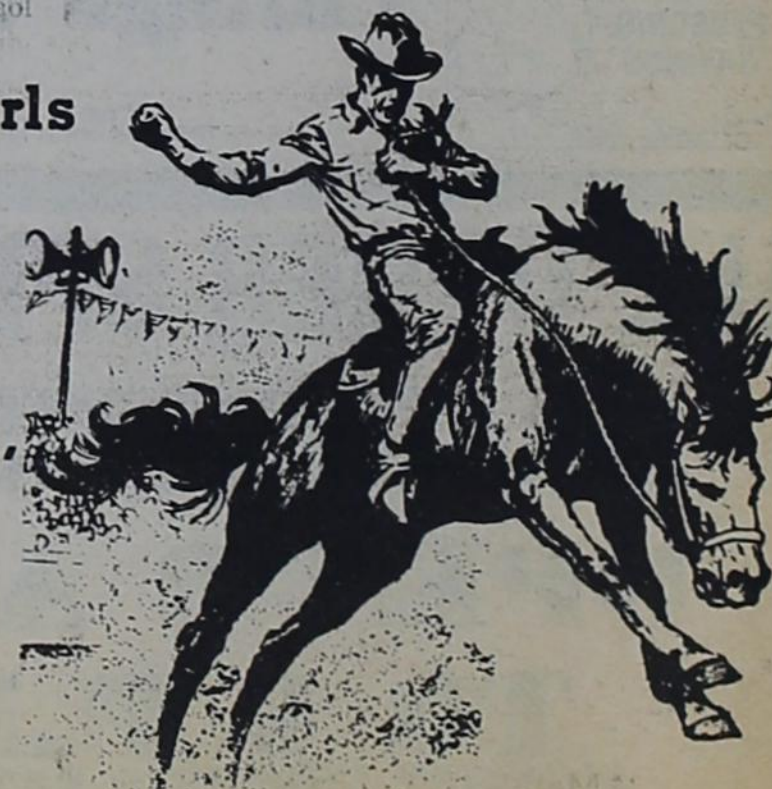

THE DESOLATE WILDERNESS

Here beginneth the account of Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, concerning those memorable circumstances of the year 1620:

"So they left that goodly and pleasant city of Leyden, which had been their resting place for above eleven years, but they knew that they were pilgrims and strangers here below, and looked not much on these things, but lifted up their eyes to heaven, their dearest country, where God had prepared for them a city (Hebrews 11:16) and therein quieted their spirits.

"When they came to Delfs-Haven they found a ship and all their things ready; and such of their friends as could not come with them followed after them, and sundry came from Amsterdam to see them shipt, and to take leave of them. One night was spent with little sleep with most, but with friendly entertainment and Christian discourse, and other expressions of true Christian love.

"The next day they went on board, and their friends with them, where truly doleful

was the sight of that sad and mournful parting, to hear what sighs and sobs and prayers did sound amongst them; what tears did gush from every eye, and pithy speeches pierced each other's heart, that sundry of the Dutch strangers that stood on the Key as spectators could not refrain from tears. But the tide (which stays for no man) calling them away, that were thus loath to depart, their Reverend Pastor, falling down on his knees, and they all with him, with watery cheeks commended them with the most fervent prayers unto the Lord and His blessings, and then with mutual embraces and many tears they took their leaves one of another, which proved to be the last leave to many of them.

"Being now past the vast ocean, in a sea of troubles before them in expectations, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succor; and for the season, it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to no places, much more to search unknown coasts.

"Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of wilde beasts and wilde men? And what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not: for which way soever they turned their eyes (save upward to heaven) they could have but little solace or content and respect of any outward object, for summer being ended, all things stand in appearance with a weather-beaten face, and the whole country full of woods and thickets, represent a wilde and savage hew.

"If they looked behind them, there was a mighty ocean which they had past, and was now as a main bar of gulph to separate them from all the civil parts of the world."

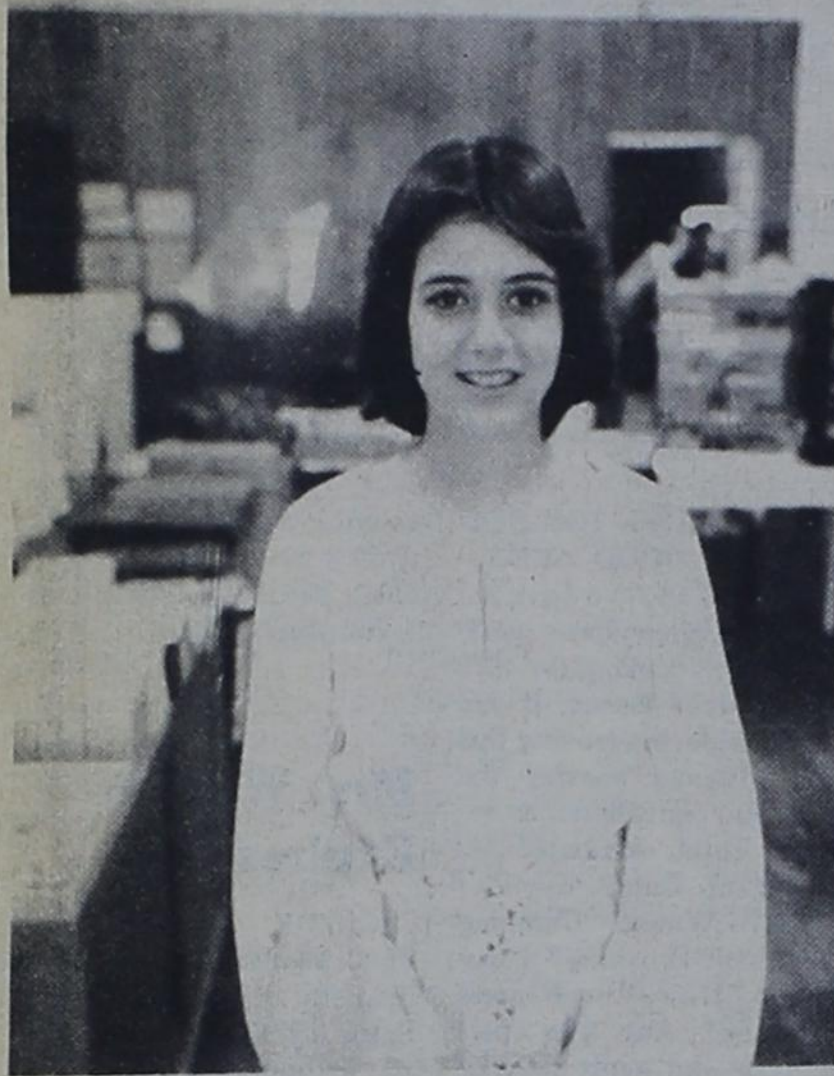
