Grider received a communication from Mr. Williams stating that his surveying party was at Throckmorton, explaining that slow progress had been made on account of the rains but that more rapid progress was expected hereafter. DIVERSIFICATION IN POLITICS

Texas has 254 counties and nearly 2,500 cities, towns and villages. No one can honestly claim that most of these, or even many of them, are efficiently and economically administered. All citizens, of course, admit that there is great room for improvement in the administrative organization and system of expenditures of the State itself. Yet, like Mark Twain's remark about the weather. though all complain of the shortcomings of government, no one does any. thing about it.

Texas needs a new policy of diversification. It needs to diversify its crop of perennial politicians and embryonic statesmen. There are too many of a sort and not enough variety. Too few know what is doing in the field of progressive government in other parts of the United States and so few have vision enough to plan broadly for the Texas of the future. Many are purely local in their point of view and do not know Texas. Is it not about time that the citizens of Texas take their obligations of citizenship seriously? Within the next twelve months they should plan to put their best representatives into office, and should then back them up in plans for the improvement of politics and reorganization of the systems of taxation and finance .--- Dallas News.
