Sec. Shelton Gives Ideas on Fed. Charity

With further reference to the charity proposition and the need of an organization in Brownfield, and which was covered by an editorial in the Herald last week, with the further statement that the chamber of commerce is not in a position to handle it any longer and that some other way must be found to deal with those cases that cannot be legally taken care of by the county, the secretary of the chamber of commerce has investigated the manner in which they are taken care of by towns in the same class and population as ourselves and finds that Lamesa has about the best plan of operation and in addition is able to assist in the care of its local people who are not subject to county aid. The greater part of the work of the chamber of commerce in the past has been to assist transients to get out of town and to the next one, while the Lamesa Association enlarges by including local cases that are not subject to other aid.

The plan is built on the same order as a Mutual Aid Life Association, in that each member of the charity organization is assessed \$1.00 upon joining and further collections of the same amount are called for as needed. The activity is carried through the chamber of commerce office but the fund is handled under a separate account.

Last year the Lamesa Association, had 104 members, collected \$1,079. Disbursed \$849, and carried a balance over of \$230. Taking care of 64 cases of charity and destitution. They also paid the annual subscription to the Salvation Army and no drive was made necessary to secure funds as is the case with us.

Indications are that we are going to have to look after a number of people this winter and we might just as well prepare for it or allow them to solicit the town in a general way, which will prove to be more expensive and unsatisfactory. Several applications for aid has been made to this office since we ceased to extend it.

Women Propose to Build a Club-House

If it be true, as generally believed by the genus homo, that whenever a woman makes up her mind to do a thing she will do it despite all obstacles, then there is no doubt but that the one hundred thousand dollar club house which is proposed to be erected in Austin as permanent headquarters for the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, will be realized. Mrs. R. F. Lindsey of Mount Pleasant, upon her accession to the state presidency a year ago, announced as one of her objectives, the building of this home. Mrs. Lindsey is an experienced business woman and when she gets a goal she drives unhesitatingly to it.

In the face of the financial depression which has obtained, there is an admirable courage in his unshaken purpose. Tightness of money, however, is no barrier to a well matured sentiment. For thirty years, or since the organization of the Texas Federation it has been the ambition of the Texas women own a home which would be a pride to our state and a fitting monument to the ideals and principles of the organization. With the beginning of the year Mrs. Lindsey named as her committee chairman Mrs. Jas. Welder of Victoria. The presidents of the seven districts together with Mrs. Sam J. 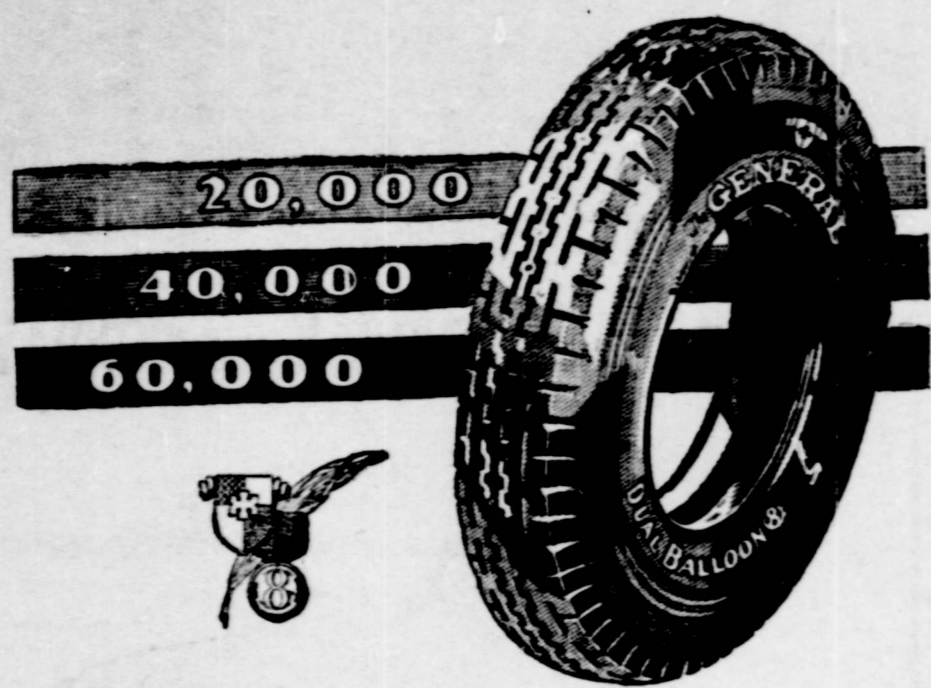

Man and Woman Are Held Without Bond

Crosbyton, Oct. 25.—Facing two charges of assault to murder, a man identifying himself as Jimmie Carter, 24, of Tucson, Ariz., and a woman companion, arrested Friday afternoon following a gun fight with officers on a downtown street of Ralls, were in the Crosby county jail here today, while authorities awaited reports from law enforcement agencies to which Carter's fingerprints were sent. No bond has been set.

Carter and the woman, who said she was Mrs. Roy Simms, 28, also of Tucson, disclosed virtually nothing when questioned Friday night and Saturday, according to District Attorney Durwood Bradley, of Lubbock.

Both Face Charges

A charge of carrying a concealed weapon and another of driving an automobile with improper license plates also were filed against Carter and a concealed weapon count was entered against Mrs. Simms. All of the charges were filed in justice court there. No bond was fixed, Crosby county officers said.

Cases of the two will be presented to the grand jury, which does not meet until January, District Attorney Bradley said.

Carter's willingness to shoot, when his woman companion was disarmed, led officers to believe that the man is wanted on a serious charge. Fingerprints were sent to the bureau of criminal identifications, United States department of justice, and to authorities in near by states.

Car Confiscated

A Buick coupe confiscated when the two were arrested had been stolen about a month ago at Holliday, Archer county, the district attorney said. License plates on the Buick were issued for a Chevrolet in Tom Green county, Crosby county officers said. Whether the Chevrolet or the plates had been reported stolen had not been determined. Carter told officers he bought the Buick in El Paso.

When Deputy Sheriff Warren Hames disarmed the woman, seated in an automobile in front of a Ralls cafe. Carter and Constable J. B. Kimbrough, who had been talking with him, approached the car. Drawing a gun, Carter held up Hames, took the deputy's revolver and the one he had confiscated, cast aside one "iron" and using Hames

Man Killed as He Drags Gun Thru Fence

Victim of an accidental charge from his own shotgun, Creed Clements, 39-year-old farmer, of New Home community, Lynn county, 22 miles south of Lubbock, died in a hospital here at 4:35 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Clements had laid down his shotgun, evidently intending to pull it through after him, and was shot as he crawled through a fence. The accident occurred early in the morning on Clement's farm as he was hunting hawks.

Officers of the sheriff's department were notified of the accident by 9 o'clock and reported that Clements made a statement in which he described the shooting as accidental.

Charges Hit Stomach
Charges from the gun penetrated Clements stomach on the upper left side, tearing a hole large enough to permit entrance of a man fist. Some of the shot penetrated the left lung and the intestines were punctured, hospital attaches said.

Upon being received at Lubbock sanitarium, Clements was examined and physicians decided to delay operations because of the man's weakened condition.
