When he discovered that the car was afire he jumped out of it and began jerking off one of the front tires in an effort to save as many of the accessories as possible, keeping one eye skinned in the direction of the gas tank in the meantime with a view to abscond as soon as an explosion might seem imminent.

"Bang! bang, went the gun, and

a bullet or two whizzed by Price's left ear. He 'lit out' across the terrain in a seeming effort to overtake the bullet. When he came to himself he was over behind a sand bank thirty or forty yards from the burning vehicle. Hearing no futher report, he finally decided to peep over the sand bank and find out what was doing. He had scarcely gone over the top when that .44 got busy again. Price says he doesn't know how many shells exploded but it sounded to him like a regular bombardment from the whole Hindenberg line, or some such battle front. Not having a speedometer attached to his person he doesn't know just how many miles per he made during the next few seconds, but when he again regained consciousness he found that it was a long walk back to the ruins of his car.

**Amarillo Rail Confab Very Enthusiastic One**

Amarillo, Oct.—Citizens from 13 Plains counties in a gigantic and highly enthusiastic rally in Amarillo today pledged their whole-hearted cooperation to President J. L. Lancaster and other officials of the Texas and Pacific railroad in their project building program from Big Spring north to Vega, Amarillo and Lubbock.

Upwards of 500 visitors registered, every city and community along the proposed 332-mile route having delegations on hand.

**Cooperation Pledged**  
A desire to cooperate with the Texas and Pacific in any activity that will hasten the building of the new road was the keynote of the meeting as expressed by the various speakers.

Delegations from the various cities began arriving in Amarillo early in the day, and spokesmen for the different communities were in conference with Mr. Lancaster before the big rally at noon, which was held at the Herring hotel with Mayor Ernest Thompson presiding.

Hereford with 86 boosters on hand claimed the largest representation. However Levelland was a close second with 68 delegates.

President Lancaster told the enthusiastic that the Texas and Pacific was most anxious to begin the construction of the road, he said that the presence of so many representatives from the different counties to be served removed all doubt as to West Texas being 100 per cent back of the project.

"We want to build this road" said Mr. Lancaster, "because we realize that the Plains country is just beginning to come into its own, Amarillo is destined to become a great city, and development has just started in all the tier of counties which our new line would traverse and serve."

"We don't want to take anything

from the other roads and we will be fair in this fight, which by the way is going to be a dog fight."

"The question to be decided at the hearing is the public convenience and necessity which the road would meet. This question will be decided by the evidence you people offer at the hearing, not by what we or the other railroads says."

Mr. Lancaster closed with the statement that the need exists for the new road and that ample evidence will be submitted to support the application.

Responding to his address speakers of the various cities declared work was under way for the presentation of much testimony in support of the T. and P. application.

**Would Aid Business**  
John P. Slaton, in charge of the Hereford delegation, said the new road would create more business for all existing lines, and that it would be a big forward step to general development benefitting the entire Plains country.

Mayor Thompson of Amarillo said if there ever was a time when "the spending of \$13,000,000 is necessary and convenient" it is now. He declared that 98 per cent of the people of Amarillo are backing the project, and that Amarillo will leave no stone unturned to assist in the building of the line.

Wilbur C. Hawk, president of the Tri-State fair and general manager of the Amarillo News-Globe, said he wanted to corroborate everything "the mayor said."

"Amarillo helped the Santa Fe" said Mr. Hawk "in its new construction program; it got back of the Rock Island in its new lines and now it stand ready to help the T. and P." Both Thompson and Hawk were given prolonged applause.

**Growth Of Area Cited**

Garland Woodard of Big Spring said the great growth in the United States had been in West Texas during the past decade, and declared there is ample room as well as a pronounced need for the road. "In ten years we will have to have more roads," he said.

W. O. Stevens and A. B. Davis, manager of the Lubbock Board of City Development, reported Lubbock as backing the program 100 per cent. "We want to help the Texas and Pacific and to help every other move that will benefit West Texas," said Mr. Stevens.

Dawson county has grown rapidly in recent years and needs the new railroad said W. W. Evens of Lamesa. "We have 16,000 farms in our country that will be benefitted by the road. We are prepared to help 100 per cent when the time comes."

Charles H. Dean and Judge B. D. Woodlee pledged the support of Dimmitt to the program.

**Lamb County Attends**

Lamb county produced 51,000 bales of cotton last year, said Arthur P. Duggan, spokesman for the Littlefield delegation. It wants the road and will help get it, he said.

"Let's let the Texas and Pacific spend the \$13,000,000" said Judge John H. Doyle of Levelland, "just as fast as they get started."

He reported Hockley county had 9,300 persons in the 1930 population against 137 ten years ago. "We produced 30,000 bales of cotton this year and the surface hasn't been scratched."

Olton is not on the route, but is cooperating every way possible, said P. B. Campbell, who was roundly applauded.

Dr. O. H. Loyd of Vega, which had a delegation of 50 present, said the building of the road would help every community in West Texas. "It will hurt no one but will create new business and add new wealth for the section as a whole," he said.

**Terry Behind Project**

Terry county will have plenty of evidence showing the need for the road, said Judge W. W. Price of Brownfield. A similar report was made by Dr. T. C. Bradford of Earth, in Lamb county.

George E. Lance of Morton, editor of the Cochran County News, said his county had 63 inhabitants 10

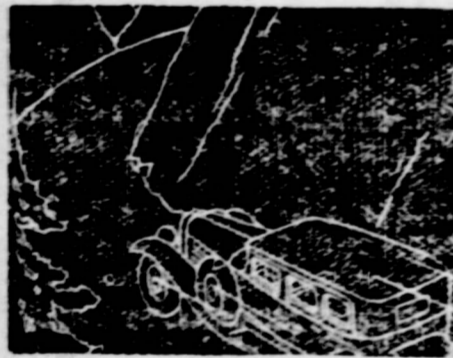

Tardy recognition of good work is sometimes worse than none at all.

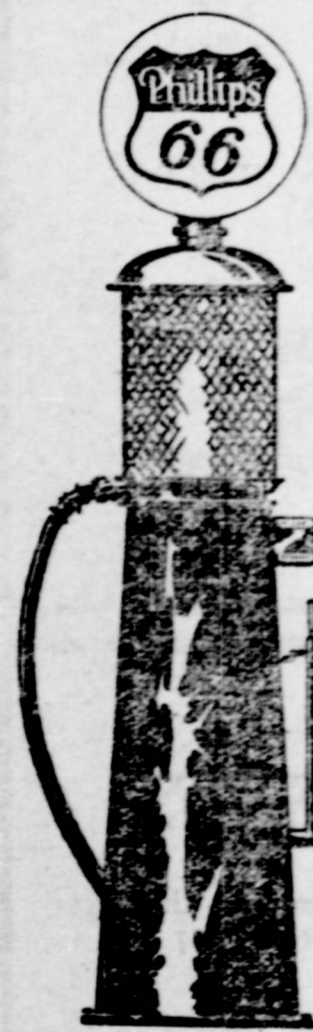
