

His tall corn attracts a lot of attention as it waves in the breeze along the highway.

Seale has 200 acres in Texas Hvbrid 30, and nearly all of it is looking excellent. He has only one irrigation well for 290 acres of land, however, and he expects to be hard pressed later this season to keep everything supplied unless rainfall comes.

Seale raised about 40 acres of corn last year and found that a ready market of about \$2.50 per nundred looked considerably more for grain sorghums.

But on the Plains, if it were not for the sparkling water running down the rows from an irrigation well, the jig would soon be up for our corn. With its broad leaves and tall stalk, the corn is wide open for the maximum moisture loss due to transpiration, and could never last long in the dry Plains'

If you're still a little befuddled over the soil bank program, don't forget that the only part of it in operation at present is what is known as the acreage reserve. This applies to basic crops only. The second half of the program

will not take effect until next year, and probably nothing definite will be released until this fall. The other part of the soil bank will be known as the conservation reserve.

Comanche has about the same maturity as Westar. Comanche's excellent milling and baking characteristics have made it popular with millers and bakers.

ers were checked, and none were found to be planting certified seed. Ten of them had their seed tested for germination.

Sherman County growers of certified seed numbered three out of 46, and eight had their seed tested.
