Painful "Dengue Fever" Is Traced to Mosquito

Dengue fever, the extremely painful but seldom fatal malady that breaks out in epidemics along the eastern Mediterranean and in the East Indies, is spread by the same mosquito that carries yellow fever.

Dengue fever itself appears to establish an immunity against yellow fever and may be a guard set up by nature across the line by which the latter might penetrate Europe and Asia.

These are findings from recent experiments of the Dutch Institute of Tropical Medicine at Amsterdam. Fourteen volunteers allowed themselves to be bitten by mosquitoes which had fed on Dengue patients. All fell sick with the same malady.

Then monkeys were infected with Dengue fever. It is much more fatal among them than among humans. Those that recovered were given injections of yellow fever. Only 27 per cent died. Ordinarily, yellow fever causes a 90 per cent mortality rate among monkeys.

These experiments have greatly lessened the fear of a yellow fever outbreak in the Dutch East Indies, where Dengue is an almost universal experience.

"Prodigal Son" Parable

Marvelous Short Story

The short story has always existed, though it was not until the Nineteenth century that the art of writing it was consciously practiced. As Sophocles said of Aeschylus, these early authors of short stories did the right thing without knowing why. It was only on rare occasions, however, that these happy accidents occurred. Thus Professor Baldwin, after an exhaustive examination of the 100 tales in Boccaccio's "Decameron," decided that only two of them are short stories in the modern critical sense, while three others approach the totality of impression which is the result of conscious unity in expression. The New Testament contains a short story which is a structural masterpiece. The parable of the "Prodigal Son," which is only 500 words long in the authorized version, satisfies the modern definition, securing the greatest emphasis possible with a surprising economy of means. In America the short story had its beginning in the "Sketch Book" of Washington Irving.

Heroes of World War

The "Lost Battalion," is the name given to the Three Hundred and Eighth regiment, United States infantry, commanded by Lieut. Col. Charles W. Whittlesey. Whittlesey was ordered to advance through the densest part of the great forests of the Argonne during the World war in order to take a certain point and hold it. Far in advance of the other troops, he was soon surrounded by the enemy and attacked for four days and nights. More than 100 hours passed without his men obtaining any food and only a little water. The majority of his command was killed or wounded, but Whittlesey refused to surrender. He was eventually relieved.

First Apple Dumpling

It is said to have been George III who asked how the apple got inside the dumpling. Here, then, is the true story of its origin, as related in Norfolk. It goes like this: Once upon a time there was a worthy Norfolk farmer who had a pretty Norfolk wife. He compared her cheeks with apples. He asserted fondly that he would like to eat them. "So you shall," replied the wife. "Wait until tomorrow." And when the morrow came she set before him the father of all apple dumplings. So the farmer laughed hugely and gave the rosy rogue a groat with which to buy ribbons at the next fair.

Banana as a Food

The banana is known to be an alkali-producing food. It is a food which has been found to be efficient in reducing the acidity of the body. The banana when fully ripe is a most valuable addition to the diet of young children, particularly those for whom a gain in weight is desirable. It can also be given to infants. This fruit when unripe consists largely of starch and is, therefore, difficult of digestion. As the ripening process goes on a large part of the starch is converted into sugar.

New Law and Crop Situation in Texas

Texas cotton growers are confronted by an annual situation. The Legislature enacted a law for a fifty per cent reduction of the State's cotton acreage. A district judge has declared the law unconstitutional. His decision has not been reviewed by the Supreme court, although notice of appeal has been served. Most cotton growers say they will follow the decision of the lower court, and plant such acreages as in their judgment are warranted by market demands.

The Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College is conducting a statewide campaign for the purpose of bringing to the attention of farmers and importance of a more diversified farming program to include beef cattle, milk cows, hogs, poultry, fruits and vegetables. The College is carrying its course of study to the farmers direct with its best specialists and several car loads of exhibits of the class of those usually found at State fairs. The Santa Fe Railway is cooperating with the College by furnishing a nine-car train for a tour of seven weeks including 131 stops. Large crowds of farmers are attending the meetings, showing that they are interested in any program which will help them in making their operations more profitable and their living more comfortable.

Excessive rains over most of Texas has retarded crop planting, little progress in that line having been made except in the western counties where work is well advanced. Feed crops in the northwest will take up the slack caused by wheat acreage reduction. Wherever a reduction in the cotton acreage is made, more crop and other feed crops will be planted.

ing the record production in 1931, will show further increase in acreage. The potato acreage in East Texas will be reduced, but the area devoted to truck crops generally will be increased, particularly tomatoes.

The watermelon acreage is uncertain, due to wet weather. Onions will be grown in the Cane belt for the first time.

Famous Humorist

His most successful work was his "Farmers' Almanac," a travesty on the Old Farmers' almanac. He died in 1885.

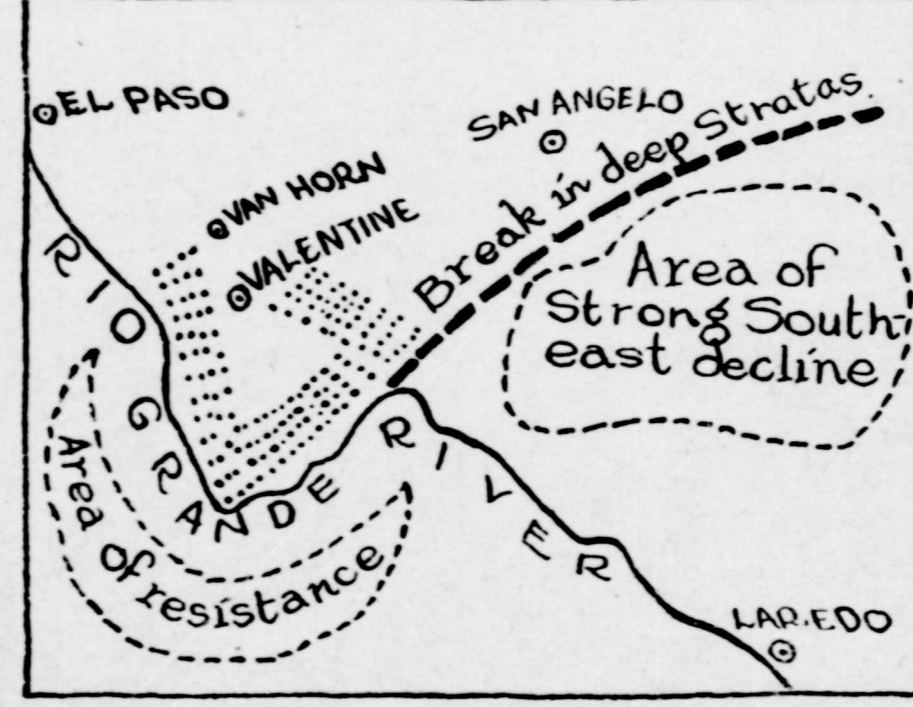

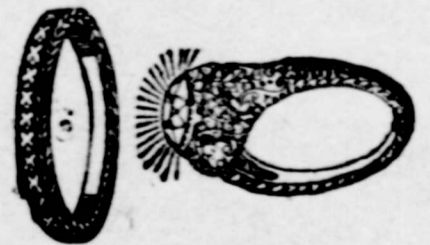

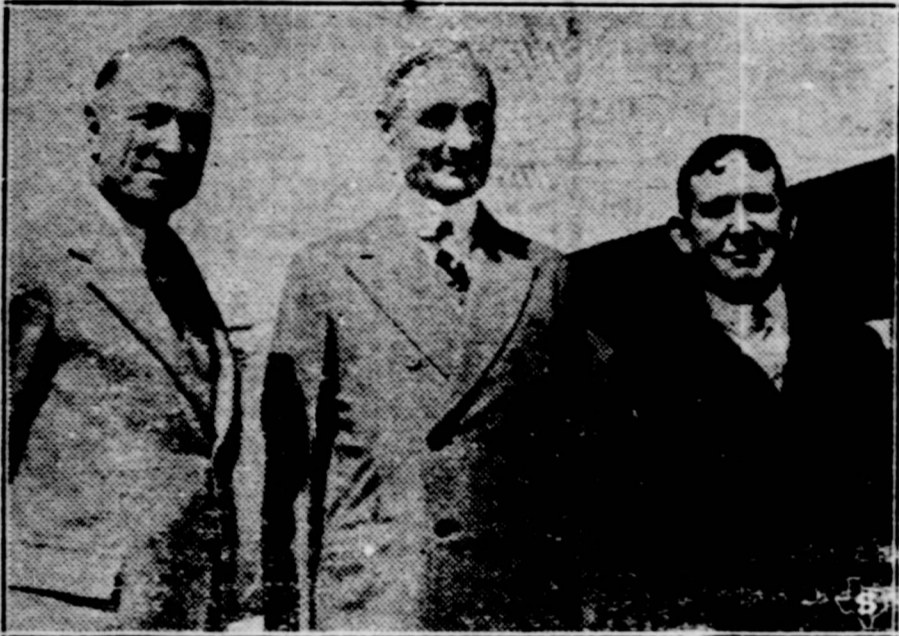

Hitchcock, vice president and general manager, and T. B. Gallaher, general freight and passenger agent, Amarillo, and college officials, programs will be given at stops on the P & SF lines similar to those on lines of the GC & SF. J. D. Tinsley, agricultural agent, Amarillo, will direct the programs on the P & SF lines.

The special is a nine car train carrying numerous agricultural and livestock exhibits stressing tried methods of making the farm self sustaining and of cutting production costs. The train is being operated by the Santa Fe the exhibits and speakers being supplied by the college and other cooperating agencies. Specialists from the Extension Service and the college will speak on the exhibits and the facts they emphasize, calling attention to the importance of having several sources of income on the farm in order to put the farming industry on a sound basis. Following the talks, visitors will be invited to go through the train to view the exhibits. Passenger coaches will be used for meetings in inclement weather. The speaking program has been arranged so as to hold interest for women and young people as well as men. Questions regarding the exhibits and farm problems will be invited.

OLDEST STRUCTURE

San Antonio, Feb. 26.—The oldest complete structure still remaining in Texas is the stone fort at San Pedro Springs, here.

Plans to preserve it are well advanced. Its construction is placed at various dates between 1690 and 1716. The stone fort formed the southeast corner of a cedar stockade, burned by the Indians.

Defense of the old fort from attacks of decay has been spurred on by recent loss of the old stone market house and the Veramendi Palace. Both these old buildings gave way to the march of industry.

The fort is on ground made by a park by the city, so is free from danger of razing.

Olton, March 19.—In an election which drew an unofficial total of 5,101 votes, this city retained the Lamb county seat Saturday, although it mustered only 936 ballots. Today's election is the second to be held in the past three years to change the site of the county capital.

Littlefield, polling 2,925 votes, fell about 470 short of the required two-thirds majority to win the coveted county seat.

Amherst, drawing 1,240 ballots, missed victory by about 1,300. Amherst could have secured the election with a majority because it is within the five-mile radius of the county's center.

Lamb county's voting strength, not including exemptions, is reported to be 4,754 votes.

KIDNAPPING IS PUNISHABLE BY DEATH IN TEXAS

Kidnaping was made one of the few offenses punishable by the death penalty in Texas by an act passed by the 42nd legislature in 1931.

The new law provides that any person who "forcibly detains, takes, confines or conceals" or who "fraudulently entices away" any person for the purpose of obtaining money may be punished by death or by any term of years in the penitentiary not less than five.

It provides, however, that in the event the kidnapped person is returned without having received any serious bodily injury the death penalty may not be inflicted and the punishment is any term of years in the penitentiary not less than five. There have been several prosecutions under this new law since its passage but none of them have yet been passed upon by the higher courts, according to state attorneys.

The old kidnaping law had a punishment of from two to ten years for abduction and from two to five years for false imprisonment.—Exchange.

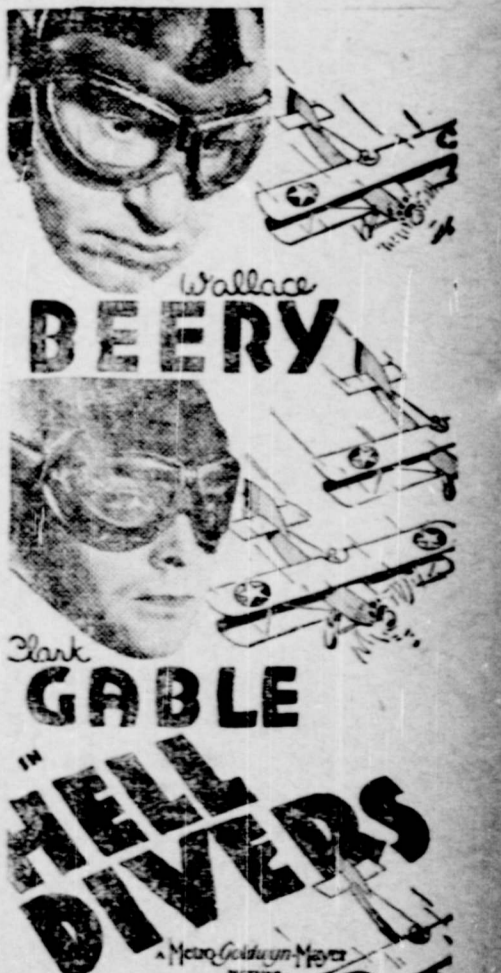
