

Year-Round Culling Brings Chicken Profits



Culting the hens four times a year should be done regularly by oultrymen, if star boarders who eat up profits are to be eliminated. In November, February, May and August, poultrymen should determine if each hen is laying. Those laying in November are excellent hens. Those not laying in February or May should be sold or eaten. Hens laying at all four cullings should be kept for breeders as well as layers. Above is a typical Texas culling scene. The loafers go to

The writer was in attendance upor a highway meeting of the South Plains Division of the Texas Good Roads Association that was held at Lubbock last Friday which was called for the purpose of discussing our highway problems and to arrange to join other movements in a program of undertaking to secure an additional appropriation from Congress in order that an enlarged program of highway development could be inaugurated.

The last congress appropriated \$400,000,000 for highways, of which Texas was awarded about \$24,000,-000, and with the building of highways and lateral roads, it appears that this will be exhausted within a very short time and we are going to need more money if the break is kept rolling. Another thing that occupied the attention of the association, was a special appropriation of something like \$8,000,0000, that was supposed to be expended on the roads of the drouth stricken pottions of the state and the information received by those at the meeting, was that no part of this had been used and no one, even with the assistance of our congressmen and senators, was able to discover what disposition had been made of th appropriation, if any, but the leaders of the good roads organization advised that they expected to keep hammering away until they got some action. If and when this is done, our county will come in for its part.




