WASHINGTON, March 9 -The House headed off Friday sturdy efforts to pour extra billions into a fund to ease home mortgage burdens, but only after the Banking Commmittee was compelled to compromise on a \$1.750,000,000 (billion) increase in projected funds for the Home Owners

Loan Corporation. This figure is \$250,000,000 higher than that originally in the bill.

Yielding further to stormy demands for liberalization, the committee was forced also to grant access to the loan fund by persons applying for aid

within sixty days of enactment. Before the measure becomes law, however, they must have let the HOLC know they were acting in good faith and needed assistance. The amendment represented a concession from the original plan to use new funds only for filling applications



28,000 Farmers Sign '35 Hog-Corn Contracts

COLLEGE STATION, Twenty-eight thousand farmers have signed the new 1935 corn-hog contract, it was announced here today by E. M. Regenbrecht, Extension Swine Specialist.

This is an increase of more than 25 per cent of signers over last year.

"The progress of the 1935 sign-up is gratifying," Regenbrecht declared "Much of the increase, in singing the contracts, is due to the new liberal regulations of the contract. The increase is particularly noticeable in the 'Black Lands'. Corn-hog farmers may now receive payment from the government by retiring a part of their corn corps and at the same time plant an unlimited amount of other feed crops such as oats, barley and other feed grains.

"Also" he added, "this year the government has raised the ante on payment. Thirty-five cents a bushel will be paid for the corn, an increase of five cents a bushel over last year."






