The State of Texas, County of Terry To the Sheriff or any Constable of Terry County, Greeting: You Are Hereby Commanded to summon Mrs. W. B. Brown, and if she be married, her husband, whose name is unknown, by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in the nearest County where a newspaper is published, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Terry County to be holden at the Court House, thereof, in the city of Brownfield, on the Fourth Monday in August A. D. 1935, the same being the 26th day of August A. D. 1935, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 7th day of January A. D. 1935 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court as No. 1810, wherein S. J. Treadway and Elsie L. Treadway, independent Executors of the estate of T. L. Treadway, deceased, are Plaintiffs and Mrs. W. B. Brown, and if she be married, her husband, whose name is unknown, Defendant, and said petition alleging that on Sept. 29th, 1923, J. H. Scott made, executed and delivered to N. W. Jones his certain promissory note, being numbered eight of a series of 10 notes, for the principal sum of \$355.00, bearing date on the day and year last aforesaid, due January 1st, 1932, payable to said N. W. Jones, with 8 per cent per annum interest from date until maturity, and 10 per cent from maturity until paid, and expressly providing for 10 per cent attorney's fees on the amount then due if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, which said note was given in part payment for the West half of section Number 53 in Block "DD", John H. Gibson survey, in Terry County, Texas, and the Vendor's Lien acknowledged in the note to secure its payment and retained in the Deed from said N. W. Jones and wife to said J. H. Scott, recorded in Vol. 22 page 110 of the Deed Records of Terry County, Texas; That in due course of trade, and for a valuable consideration said N. W. Jones transferred, assigned and delivered to T. L. Treadway said note, together with the lien securing same which assignment is of record in Vol. 20 page 379 of the Deed Records of Terry County, Texas, but before such

transfer, assignment and delivery of said note the said N. W. Jones released the southwest quarter of said section 53 in Block "DD" in Terry County, Texas, as to said note, and retained same against the Northwest quarter of said section; That J. H. Scott and wife conveyed the Northwest quarter of said section to Q. D. Stark by deed recorded in Vol. 20 page 576 of the Deed Records of Terry County, Texas; and by deed recorded in Vol. 36 page 491 of the Deed Records of Terry County, Texas, the said Q. D. Stark and Mrs. N. E. Harris, a widow, conveyed said land to the defendant, Mrs. W. D. Brown, and in said deed of conveyance the said Mrs. W. D. Brown assumed the payment of said note number 8, whereby she became liable and bound to pay same together with all interest and attorney's fees due thereon, to the owner and holder thereof; That T. L. Treadway is now deceased, left a written will in which your plaintiffs were named independent executors of said will, and at the time of his death the said T. L. Treadway was the legal owner and holder of said note No. 8, and that plaintiffs, in their capacity as independent executors of the will of said T. L. Treadway, deceased, are the legal owners and holders of said note No. 8. That said note is now long since past due and unpaid, and defendants, although often requested has failed and refused and still refuse to pay said note, except a credit of \$177.50 on March 14th, 1924 on principal, and annual interest paid to January 1st, 1931, to plaintiffs damage \$500.00. That said note has been placed in the hands of plaintiff's attorney for collection, and the 10 per cent attorney's fees provided for in said note are due and payable. Plaintiff's pray for Citation to issue to the defendant to appear and answer herein, for judgment for their debt, principal, interest and attorney's fees, cost of suit, order of sale, and for such other and further relief, special and general, in law and in equity, to which they may be entitled etc. Herein Fail Not, and have you before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same. SUMMER COMPLAINT

AUSTIN, Texas August 5, 1935.—It is a matter of vital importance, particularly during the warm summer season, that sanitary measures be applied to prevent the contamination of perishable foods, stated Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. Various intestinal disorders result from food which has in some way been rendered unwholesome. Summer diarrhea or 'summer complaint,' affecting young and old, is a serious type of stomach and bowel condition. So called "ptomaine poisoning," in nearly all cases, is none other than a food infection due to the presence in food of harmful bacteria or germs. Perishable food, if contaminated, endangers human health. This hazard is greater in warm weather, because germs or their products multiply or develop more rapidly at high temperature. Some of the most valuable foods are of perishable nature. Such foods demand the exercise of safeguards. Among well known precautions, which need to be used if perishable foods are to be kept wholesome, are the following: 1. Some form of modern refrigeration or cooling is necessary to preserve food from day to day. Lack of an effective cooling process causes meat to spoil and milk to contain a dangerously large number of bacteria. 2. Resort to thorough cooking or boiling is the simplest and yet most useful method of preventing illness of food-borne character. This precaution applies especially to food prepared for infants and children. 3. Contamination of perishable food is avoided through the constant exercise of cleanliness on the part of those who handle food. 4. Pastries and other food products make a far greater appeal to the consumer or patron if there is an entire absence of flies. Adequate provision for screens and application of every known means of fly and insect extermination are worthwhile. The rewards of improved sanitation include tangible assets in good health and sound business.

PROTEIN NEEDED IN DIET YEAR 'ROUND Though the summer sun may sizzle, and our appetites are gone, still we must have food, and food of the right kind. And when appetites fail, it is more necessary than ever to see that all the food essentials are included in our diets. It is especially important that every diet, winter or summer, includes plenty of protein, for without protein no life can exist, it is pointed out by Inez S. Willson, home economist. It is the body building material, the material used to build new body cells and also to repair broken cells. Meat Protein Ranked High Not all protein foods are alike in their value to the body. Protein is made up of amino acids and the protein which contains the largest num-

ber of these is of greatest value in the diet. Because meat contains a large number of these acids, it is rated as a protein food of high biological value. Meat not only contains protein of good quality, but it also contains more protein per serving than does any other food. Therefore if meat is included often in summer meals, you need not fear protein lacking.

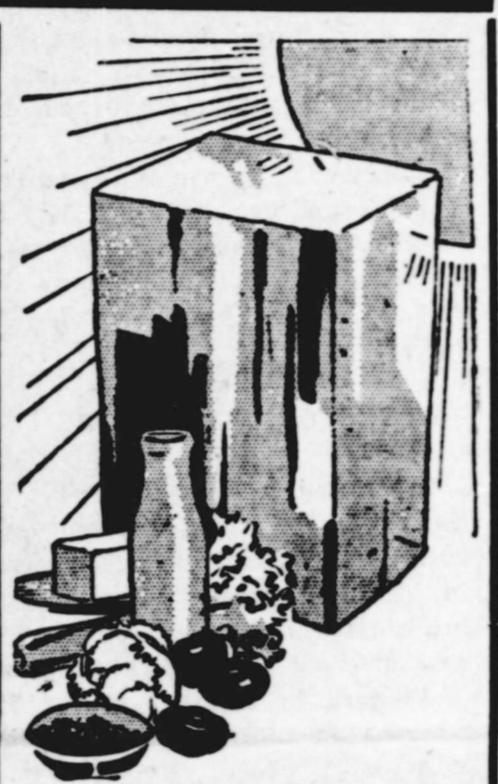
PLATONIC FRIENDSHIP
