> The major changes in the new cotton contracts:

1. They cover four years instead

2. National base acreage is reduced from 45,500,000 to 44,500,000

3. The reduced production for 1936 must be 30 to 45 percent of the base, compared with 25 to 35 percent in 1935, and 35 to 45 percent in

4. Benefits equal to five cents a pound, or \$8.60 an acre, will be paid in one check for the reductions.

5. Share croppers will receive 25 percent of the payments instead of

Some months ago it was announced the company would not feed any cattle at Brownfield. It was also indicated the 3,000 head on pasture would be sold. But several weeks ago the company began discussion of feeding plans. It was indicated that up to 6,000 head of cattle might be fed out at Brownfied.

This is the fourth year that the company has operated in Terry county. More than 24,000 head have been fed by the Hearst interests, owners of the Babicora Development Co., here.

Home Owners Loan Corp. Nears Finish

The emergency task of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation in the relief of wide-spread home mortgage distress is approaching completion, according to the latest bulletin from that agency, As of Nov. 28, refinancing loans had been granted to 953,-195 home owners in the amount of \$2,882,733,143. Less than 5 per cent of the total number of applications received since the HOLC was established in June, 1933; are still pending. Belief was expressed by the corporation's officials that all pending cases will be disposed of "well in advance of June, 1936," when, by law, the lending operations of the corporation will terminate



NEW RANGER CHIEF KNOWN AS FEARLESS OFFICER

"Captain J. W. McCormick, veteran Texas Peace Officer who has been appointed senior captain of the rangers, served for many years in Wichita Falls as a police chief, deputy sheriff and state officer during the boom days.

Captain McCormick was police chief here during the early twenties, serving for about two years. Afterwards he was a deputy sheriff during the administration of Fred K. Smith. McCormick came here from South Texas, where he was a Texas ranger on border duty and saw much gunfighting along the Rio Grande.

"He was stationed in the Northwest field, both as a ranger and deputy sheriff, back in the days when scarcely a night went by without trouble. His term as chief of police here was in the stormy postwar days when the boom was beginning to wane and the beginning of unemployment caused an increase in crime.

"Fred Smith, who is now constable here, says that McCormick was always phenomenally fast on the draw. Sometimes he would appear in the traditional ranger regalia of a tengallon Stetson and cowboy boots with two guns around his waist. At other times he dressed as an average busi-




