Prevention is Cure For Auto Accidents

AUSTIN, Dec. 21.—"The only way to avoid the useless waste of life due to traffic accidents is to prevent the accident," reads a warning issued by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is not a question of who is right and who is wrong after the accident has occurred," he said, "and automobile accidents never happen merely because of 'bad luck'—there is a definite cause for every one of them, although it is not possible to determine the precise origin of every mishap.

"Leaders of the safety movement agree that the most fundamental approach to the solution of our national accident problem lies in the education and training of the individual. Safety education includes the training of individuals to avoid accidents to themselves and to prevent accidents to others. It involves the acquisition of a certain fund of information, the ability to apply this information to concrete situations, and the building up of habits which will make the application of knowledge to situation automatic.

"The dangerous curves and intersections on the highways of this State are distinctly marked, and automobile accidents by carefully observing these warning signs.

"Some motorists rely too much on traffic rules and regulations, thinking that if they are obeying the rules of the road at the time when an accident occurs, no blame can be attached to them. This is not true. The only man who can consider himself blameless in case of an accident, when he was obeying the rules of the road, is the one who did everything possible to avoid that accident.

"The consequences of an automobile accident are so disastrous, that only when we have done everything in our power to avoid such accidents, can we consider ourselves, or expect others to consider us, blameless in the case of an accident.

"When each individual does all that he is able to do toward avoiding an accident of any kind, then, and then only, will our traffic accidents be avoided."

Dr. Geo W. Cox New State Health Officer

AUSTIN, Dec. 29.—A young man's ambition formed nearly thirty years ago materialized on December 14 when Dr. George W. Cox was chosen State Health Officer. Through busy years in the practice of medicine and surgery Dr. Cox nursed the desire to engage in public health work. Dr. Cox as a youthful physician accepted appointment of Governor Thomas M. Campbell to be in charge of quarantine stations at Brownsville and Corpus Christi. During that four years of service he developed an abiding interest in public health work. Dr. Cox has had a varied and in-



teresting career in medical and health service. He was born at Gonzales and educated in public schools there at Polytechnic College at Fort Worth. Later he was in the University of Texas and Vanderbilt University, where he studied pharmacy and advanced chemistry. He was for a time a pharmacist and in the drug business at Corpus Christi. He studied medicine two years in the University of Texas Medical College at Galveston and received his degree after two more years of study in Tulane University, in 1906. It was shortly thereafter that he was appointed by Governor Campbell in the quarantine service, then maintained by the State and later taken over by the United States Public Health Service. Later he practiced medicine at Corpus Christi and was at Ozona for a time before moving to Del Rio, where he has practiced general medicine and surgery for the past seventeen years.

Dr. Cox was a charter member and is past president of the Del Rio Rotary Club and has been active in all civic affairs of his town. Since he was appointed by Governor James V. Allred as a member of the State Board of Health in January, 1935, Dr. Cox has devoted much of his time to an intensive study of public health problems in America. A few months ago he resigned his membership of the Board and since then has been engaged in a study of the public health systems in Kentucky and New York, and the United States Public Health Service in Washington.

Mrs. Cox, wife of the new State Health Officer, also has had an extensive career in civic work. She is president of the fifth district of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, which embraces thirty-two counties extending from Austin to the Rio Grande border. She is a director of the Del Rio Red Cross and past chairman of the Board. She is a past president of the Federal Church Auxiliaries and past president of the Bible Literature Committee of the State Federation. She is a past president of the Pioneer and New Century Club in her home town.

Postoffice Preparing To Move This Week

For the first time in some 20 years, the Brownfield Postoffice will be situated on the west side of the square after January 1st. The last time it was on the west side of the square, it was in a building along about where the Huggens & Knight Hardware is situated today.

The postoffice will go in the Randal building, which until the last few days was occupied by the Cash & Carry Grocery. That business has been consolidated with the Huggens Grocery Co., and moved into their building.

For the first time in many years the west side will be among the best business locations in the city, as it will have two dry goods stores, a grocery, a furniture and hardware, a drug store, a cafe, barber shop and beauty shop, rooming house, bank, abstract office, and the postoffice.

Adv., Selling Methods To Play Big Role In Coming Boom

A note of warning to businessmen who would pull profits from prosperity is sounded by Roger W. Babson, economist and statistician, in the Rotarian Magazine.

"To my way of thinking," he says, "advertising and selling are going to play a tremendous part in the coming boom. Your sales department should be drilled into a 'prosperity psychology.' The minute the low point of a depression is reached, and the turn towards better times comes, I become bullish on advertising. This bullishness develops into a white heat as business reaches 'the normal line. It is in the normal zone that all the constructive forces of your organization should work and work in harmony."

Mr. Babson further urges that businessmen consider these important factors: Credits should be kept in order at all times. As prosperity proceeds there will be increasing shortages of skilled workers and executives so investment in your personnel now should pay handsome dividends. Doing business in the prosperous days ahead without sound accounting and finance methods would be like fighting a fire with gasoline. If you must borrow, at least be free from debt one day of each year. Practical research in your business may mean the difference between profits and just breaking even.

Strange as this may sound, less than 10 per cent of the businessmen of the United States actually pulled profits from the great 1929 boom! Remember this: warns Mr. Babson, "Whereas depression hits everybody, prosperity is always selective. Profit tickets are not passed out to all that enter the Big Tent of good times. In a period of business expansion you must work just as hard to assure profits as in a period of depression you must work hard to avert losses.

"Only four times during my 35 years of studying business conditions has the Babson-chart, on which I have spent over a million dollars in research, crossed the 'normal line' on its way upward. The first of these was in 1902-12, the second in 1915, and the third was 14 years ago, in 1922. The fourth has just occurred.

"At the start of this impending boom," he says in conclusion, "you all have a new set of books to open. This is the time when everybody starts from scratch but some only scratch. The way to eliminate competition is not to meet it but to keep ahead of it."

McNew Thanks Officials Who Helped WPA

Success of the WPA program in District No. 18 is due in a large measure to cooperation of the people through their public agencies, R. H. McNew, District Director, declared today.

Since work projects must be sponsored by governmental agencies other than WPA, cooperation on the part of these agencies throughout the district has counted for much in the accomplishment of a worthwhile program, said the Director.

He expressed gratitude to public officials for their appreciation of problems confronting the WPA in the administration of its work. McNew said that a fine spirit existed toward WPA in the 13 counties of this district.

The Director recited some of the permanent benefits accruing to the area as a result of cooperation with WPA. Among them was 200 miles of lateral road work, including 11 miles surfaced road by WPA and 20 miles topped by the state highway department, five school campus beautification projects, a series of tax, water well and mineral surveys in many counties, and 100,000 garments processed by WPA sewing room projects and distributed by the surplus commodity unit of the program.

County Agent's Notes

The County Agent's office has just received the following article from the U. S. Department of Agriculture with reference to Pink Boll Worm Control which gives the counties in the quarantine area.

We have been more or less inclined to think of this quarantine as having little significance to our welfare, and have not perhaps given it as serious thought as we should have. We are told that unless the farmers lend their whole-hearted cooperation that drastic measures might be taken to enforce it. We are also told that any person caught transporting seed or selling them out of the quarantine district is subject to a fine from \$50.00 to \$500.00. The highways are being patrolled to see that no seed are taken out.

Movement of Cotton Seed From the Pink Bollworm Regulated Areas Restricted

The interstate and intrastate movement of cottonseed from the counties of Andrews, Cochran, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Hockley, Howard, Martin, Midland, Terry, Yoakum, and the regulated parts of Bailey and Lamb counties in Texas, and Lea, Roosevelt counties in New Mexico, is prohibited under Federal or State pink bollworm quarantine regulations respectively except when consigned to designated oil mills for treatment unless the seed is treated under supervision of an authorized inspector, in which case it may move to any destination under certification. Violations of the regulations of the Federal and State quarantines are subject to prosecution under law.

The pink bollworm hibernates within cottonseed and it may be spread by seed movement to non-infested areas. Therefore, the danger of movement of such seed except through the prescribed channels cannot be over emphasized.

In this section cotton is planted late and therefore harvested late. The peak of the ginning season is usually reached by the middle or latter part of October. The average frost date is about November 2, with the winters rather severe. From experience it appears that nature has been of considerable aid in preventing the establishment of the pink bollworm in this territory. We do not know whether the worm will be able finally to build up a damaging infestation. However, insects have been known to overcome climatic disadvantages and we cannot be sure that the pink bollworm will not be able to do so. Certainly cottonseed grown in the area, referred to above is an element of danger when shipped outside.

If all persons concerned will cooperate with us in safeguarding seed movements as outlined above, it is believed that it will not be necessary to adopt more drastic measures in this area.

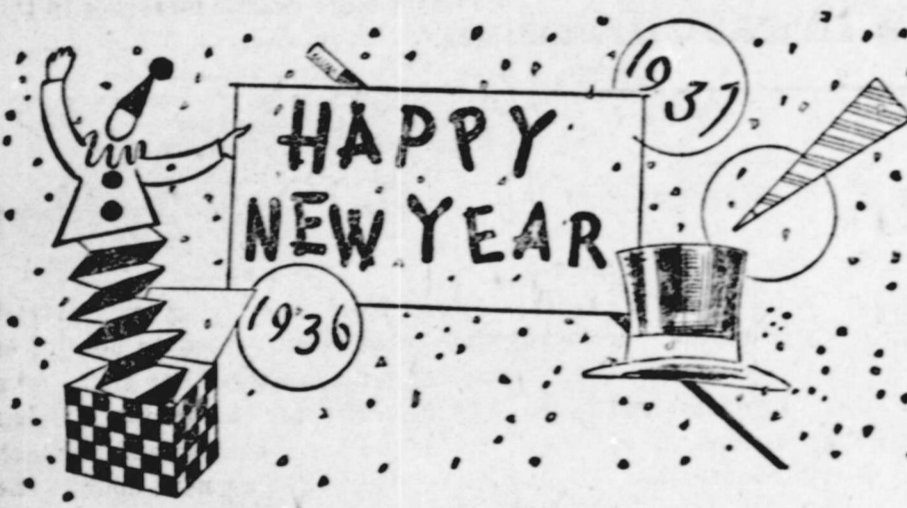
