ORDINANCE NO 1154
AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE ISSUANCE OF A PERMIT AND THE PAYMENT OF A LICENSE FEE, AND PROVIDING FOR THE FURNISHING OF REPORTS BY ALL PERSONS, FIRMS AND CORPORATIONS HEREINAFTER ENGAGED IN THE OCCUPATION OF BUYING AND SELLING USED MOTOR VEHICLES AND EXEMPTING CERTAIN BUSINESSES, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF BROWNFIELD:
1. That from and after the passage of this Ordinance, any person, firm or corporation, before engaging in the occupation of buying for the purpose of re-sale, and of selling used automobiles, trucks or other motor vehicles within the corporate limits of the City of Brownfield, such person firm or corporation shall first apply to and obtain from the City Secretary a permit or license to engage in such occupation for a period of one year. Such permit shall be in writing, numbered, contain the name of the applicant, the location of place of business, and cover a period of one year from date, signed by the City Secretary under the City seal, a duplicate of which shall be filed in the office of the City Secretary.
2. The Annual license fee for such occupation shall be \$500.00 payable in advance, at the time the license is issued and before such occupation is pursued or carried on.
3. Such person firm or corporation from and after the beginning of such occupation shall thereafter file a monthly report with the city secretary of all used motor vehicles so purchased for re-sale, and such report shall contain a full description of such motor vehicles, including the name of the manufacturer, model, engine and license number and the name and address of the person from whom it was purchased.
4. This ordinance shall not apply to nor effect any person firm or corporation, who are authorized by manufacturers to represent them as sellers of new cars, in the City of Brownfield as a dealer or agent selling new automobiles, and who, in connection with such automobile agency or dealership business, trades for and sells used motor vehicles, nor shall it apply to such person, firm or corporation who have been regularly and in good faith engaged in the business of buying and selling second hand motor vehicles within the Corporate limits of the City of Brownfield continuously preceding the passage of this ordinance. PROVIDED, HOWEVER that said exemption from such license fee does not apply to any person, firm or corporation whether an authorized dealer or

agent of a manufacturer of new cars, or person, firm or corporation who has been regularly and in good faith engaged in the business of buying and selling used or second hand motor vehicles continuously preceding the passage of this Ordinance, who purchases used motor vehicles outside of the limits of Terry County and transports them within the limits of the City of Brownfield for the purpose of re-sale.
5. Any violation of this ordinance shall immediately work a forfeiture of the license issued in accordance with the provision hereof, and no portion of such license fee so paid shall be refunded.
6. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each violation, and the pursuit of such occupation on each and every day without a permit, as provided herein shall constitute a separate offense and subject to punishment as such.

Mr. and Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Virgil Galloway and children spent the week end with their sons and brothers William and John Anderson. **HOW ABOUT THE "ACCIDENT PRONE" LOCATION?** "Accident prone" means tending to produce accidents. We have heard a lot about the "accident prone" driver and the efforts being made to control him by legislation, education and enforcement. The "accident prone" location, as the National Conservation Bureau reminds us, must be considered with equal seriousness. Where communities are far enough advanced in the process of traffic control to keep accurate and scientific records of their traffic health, they have learned that accidents tend to happen most often at certain locations. We call these bad spots "accident prone," and in a few places we are doing something about them. We have pointed an accusing finger at the reckless driver, but have too often overlooked the public carelessness which allows accident breeding hazard on our streets and highways to exist as a threat for all of us—the careful and the careless alike. In the majority of cases it is the location itself and not the motorist that breeds the accident. It is simple work for traffic engineers to improve the design of such locations and build in safeguards which make accidents virtually impossible. We must deal with the "accident prone" traffic location as we deal with the fire trap—by applying proper safeguards to the location itself. We can transform a location that is "accident prone" to one that is accident proof." In doing so we can not only reduce accidents, but we can ease traffic congestion and speed up the movement of both motorists and pedestrians. That is the dual purpose of traffic control: To move all traffic to its destination with a minimum of danger and a maximum of speed.

Several Lamesa citizens conferred with Mr. Spaulding in O'Donnell Wednesday afternoon on problems connected with the location of the new Cyanide plant. The wells are located nine miles west of O'Donnell on Section six, which is the property of Mr. C. H. Doak of O'Donnell. How-

ever the warehouse will not necessary have to be located at the wells. They report location of the \$200,000 extraction plant was assured them by unquestionable sources. This Lamesa body was working with Mr. Spaulding relative to problems of transportation. Some interesting features were noted at the scene of operations. Two holes or wells have been bored down into the cyanide beds. A small boiler is used to heat water which is forced under pressure into one hole and after some 30 or 40 minutes the hot water has dissolved the chemical and the blackish solution is forced up from the second well, much the same as sulphur is obtained in East Texas. A large open pit has been dug near the wells, presumably for evaporating the water from the chemical. The new plant will require approximately 150 men working in eight-hour shifts. This naturally will carry a pay roll of approximately \$3000 a week, and local men will be used where possible. Mr. Spaulding left for New York Wednesday on business, leaving Mr. Reed and Mr. Sturgess in charge of the test operations.—Lamesa Reporter.




