Ola Belle Brown Receives Book Machine

Miss Ola Belle Brown, blind since she was nine, has recently received from the Library of Congress Foundation for the Blind, a talking book machine. These machines were made under the Federal Works Project and by people who were formerly on relief and the distribution is confined to the blind only, free of cost, also the records, of which you have access to fiction, drama, history, science, literature, poetry, or sublime passages of scripture. These records are recorded by some of our foremost speakers in voices so clear and distinct you would think the speaker was in the room. The machine has volume control like a radio, also speed control, has head phones if you want to use them, with the volume cut off. It's electric and is said to be one of the biggest boons to the blind since braille was first used some one hundred years ago. Only two thousand of these machines have been sold and the government has ten thousand, but the output is not adequate to meet the demand, however, the last term of Congress appropriated \$75,000 for records and machines to be made this year. The machines sell for \$50, but many blind are unable to pay this amount, is the reason of free distribution. One book "East to the Orient by Ann Lindbergh, was played over to many of Ola Bell's friends who have called in to see and hear this wonderful machine and her many friends will be glad to head that after some six months in bed she seems to be a bit improved and as always, cheerful. FARMERS WARNED TO PRE-SERVE THEIR COTTON SALES SLIPS

Texas cotton growers are warned not to lose or misplace the sales slips on their 1937 cotton already sold, or to be sold in the future. Secretary Wallace has notified members of congress from Texas that the sales slips will be used as evidence when benefit payments are made for the 1937 crop next year to bring the price up to the guaranteed 12 cents a pound, as approved by President Roosevelt.

BOND ISSUE FOR \$50,000 ROAD PROGRAM IN DAWSON VOTED

LAMESA, Sept. 11.—After all voting boxes except two small ones had reported late tonight, the \$50,000 road bond issue for improvement of farm-to-market roads in Dawson county, which was voted on today, carried by a margin of 415 to 176.

The vote was light throughout the county, said A. G. Beard, secretary of the chamber of commerce here. The two boxes which late tonight had not reported were Hagen and Plainview.

Federal government has made funds available to be issued through the Texas State Highway commission for improvement of lateral and "feeder" roads when Dawson county puts up a like amount, authorities explained.
