Which reminds us that most of the settlers from those sections must have come from Snuffy Smith's Big Smokies in east Tennessee.

It is reported that Japan has lost 92 admirals since the war started, and judging by the size of her fleet left, the Japans would not need a lot of them now. Just how this near 100 Nips with the braid and brass disposed of themselves, or were bumped off is a mooted question, but there are a lot of practical mind-Americans—yankees if you like—who are disposed to think that most of them played that little game of hari kari that the little shovel-tooth brown men seem so efficient in performing. Anyway, their number, according to the size of their fleet reminds us of some of the O. Henry stories we read some thirty years ago about Kings and Cabbage. It seems, according to O. Henry, that about every other man in some of the central American republic's armies, was a general.

Last Saturday Gaines county for the second time in the past year turned down the proposition to legalize beer and wine in that county. This followed four years of beer and honkytonks, which the more religious element of Seminole and Seagraves considered a disgrace to their fair cities. Not all the trouble for officers centered around Seagraves so far as other places were concerned. Here in Brownfield the two highway patrolmen as well as county and city offices were busy every night and especially Saturday as the "loaded celebrants" not only from here, but up the Levelland, Lubbock and Tahoka highways passed through Brownfield to reach their homes, and many of them in a fair way to fading out. And some had reached the point where safety to themselves, other drivers or pedestrians were of little regard. So, even those here who like to take a bottle of beer occasionally, and go about their business, became disgusted with what they saw and heard of after effects of a souse at Seagraves.

It seems that some of our friends misunderstood our front page editorial about redistricting, two weeks ago. That, or we just didn't make ourselves plain. We never have accused the people of east Texas as a whole of trying to deprive this section of having equal representation. Our blast was at the east Texas politician and he alone. Personally we know a lot of good folks in east Texas, and we have friends here who know hundreds of others, who have talked with the mine run of east Texas folks, and to a man, they say the state should long ago have been redistricted. Last week the Dallas Morning News came out with as fine editorial as we ever read, which called on the legislature from a patriotic as well as a sense of duty to the constitution to redistrict the state. Many of the men in east Texas, and we call east Texas such from Fort Worth east, say they would vote for a constitutional amendment to take redistricting out of the hands of the legislative politicians, and authorize the governor to appoint a disinterested committee after each census to redistrict the state according to population without regard to "ruining" anyone's district.

**Jones Asks For Top Food Production**

War Food Administrator Marvin Jones asks for all-out production of food this year. In a statement received by the A. and M. College Extension Service, Judge Jones declared that there is need for all of the meat, milk, vegetables, grains, and other foods which farmers can produce. To help get the biggest production possible farmers are being asked to plant more acres to crops this year.

There will be need for every garden and for all the home canning which can be done in 1945. These are home jobs. But the Administrator said that if they are done in a large way they will allow more food for people who cannot grow their own. More home grown and home preserved foods will also help to relieve the burdens on railroads and trucks. The surest way to guarantee a full supply of fruit and vegetables for home use he added, is to grow a garden and to do all home canning possible.

There will be need throughout the country for millions of people from the cities and towns to pitch in and help farmers to grow and harvest their crops. Judge said that all who can work on a farm for a season will perform a patriotic service—And even those who can work only a few days when neighborhood crops are ready for harvest will help to meet a serious war time emergency. During 1944, men and women from Texas cities and towns, and high school pupils and college undergraduates set a fine record in aiding farmers to save their crops.

Judge Jones pointed out that the amount of food now required by the armed forces is greater than ever before. Civilians with more purchasing power want more of many kinds of food—And our allies must have American food to maintain their full fighting strength. This indicates that no one will be able to have all he wants nor all the kinds of foods he is willing to buy. But Judge Jones believes that the total of what all persons can do to help out will assure plenty of good food for the armed forces and civilians, and supplies for our allies.

(Uncle Bill) Kellis, 89, who for many years was editor and publisher of the Sterling City, News Record, had passed on. He died at Riverside, Calif., where he retired to rest from his years of labor. The body was shipped back to Sterling City for burial.

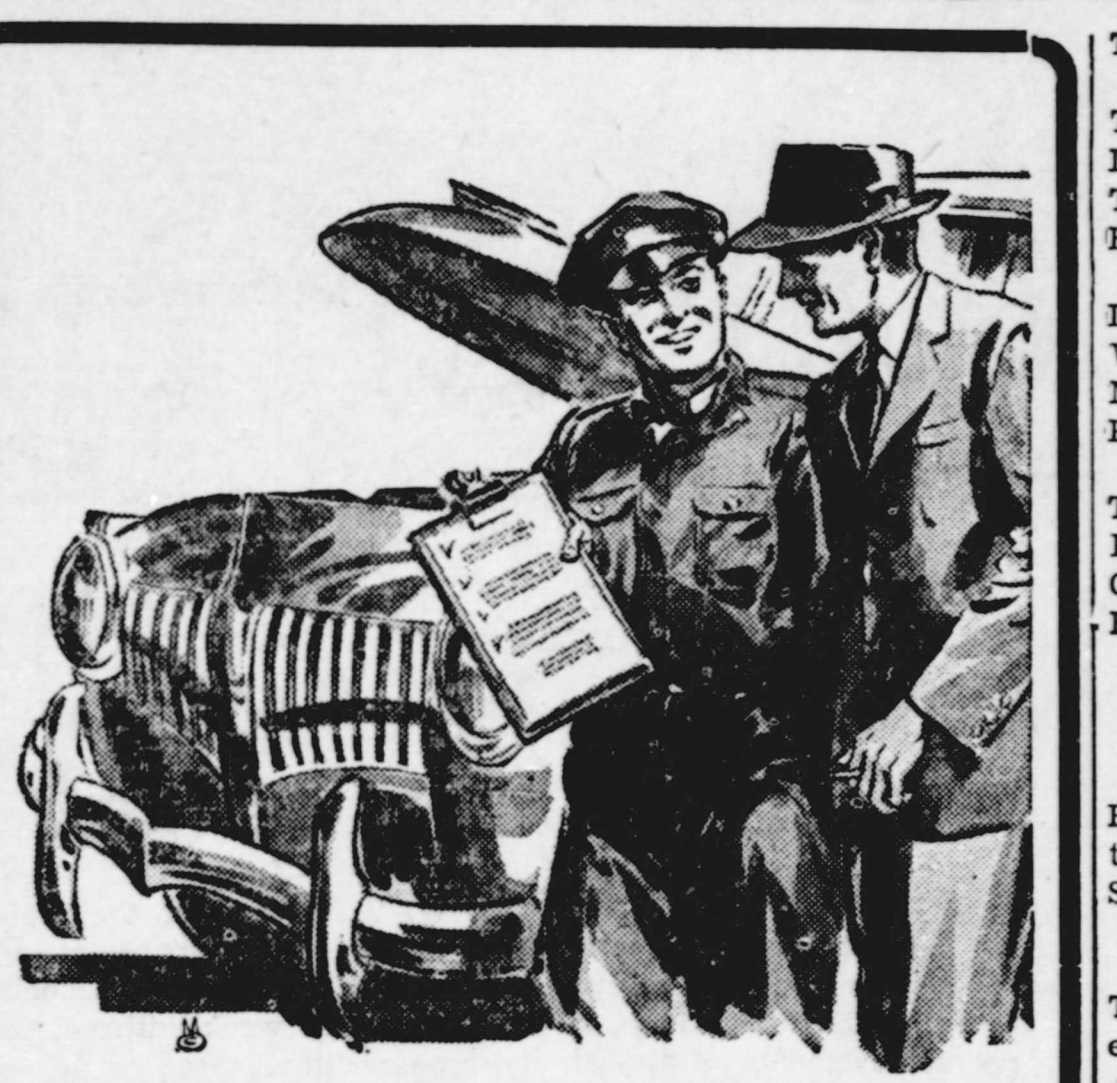



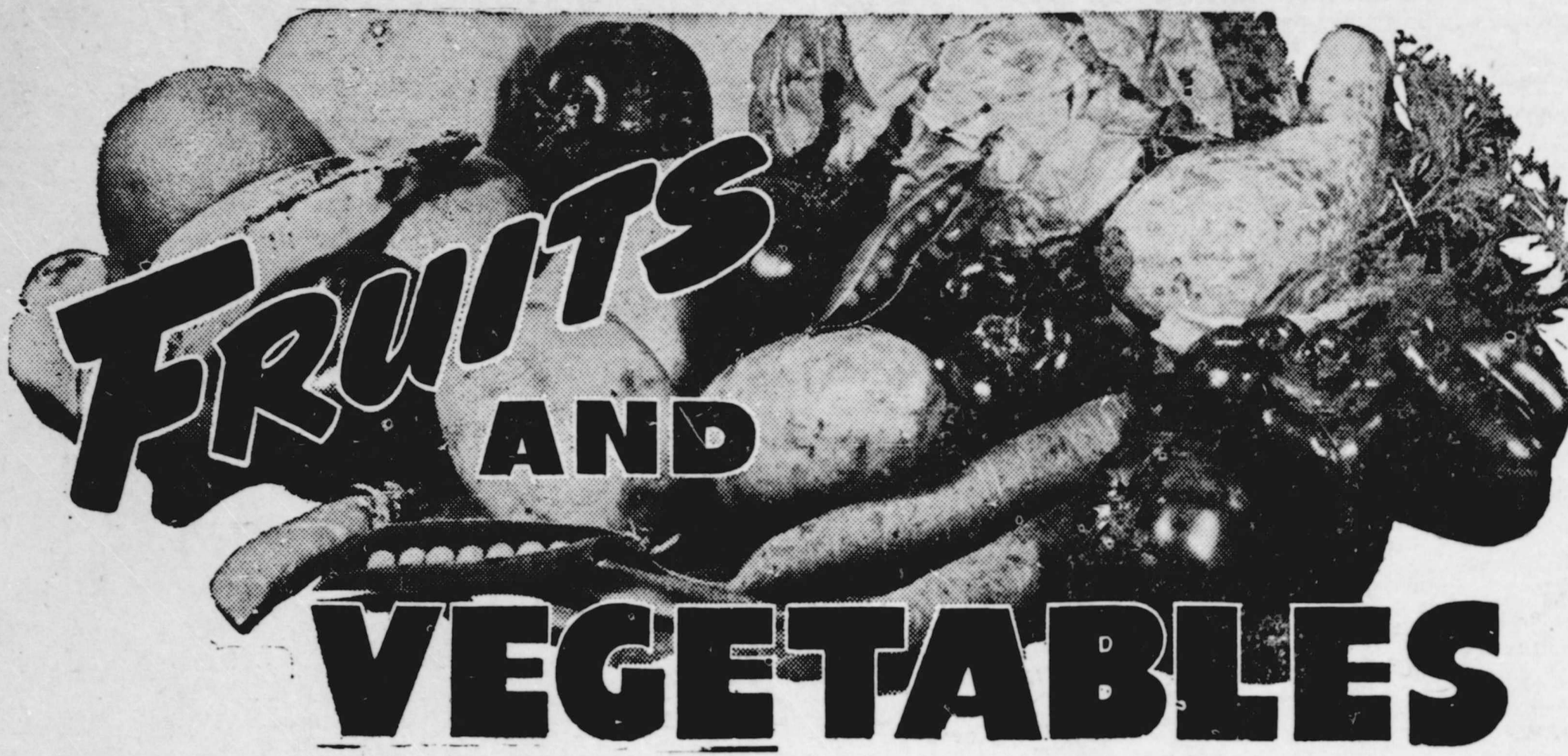

**ONE WAY TO STOP EPI-DEMICS**

Austin, Texas, March, 16.—In Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, states that if doctors, nurses, householders, and others would report the occurrence of any communicable disease immediately to the local health officer, many epidemics could be prevented or greatly curtailed.

The control of preventable disease depends upon the perfect reporting of all cases. It is necessary to secure information as to when and where cases occur before the proper steps for the control of these cases can be taken. Every epidemic starts with one case and the doctors engaged in protecting the public health are interested in locating this first case to prevent its spread to others.

Some of the contagious diseases are quarantinable. This is done not to punish the person involved for having the disease but to protect the well. The quarantine sign is not a disgrace but a badge of good citizenship, as it shows what household is trying to protect others from contracting a contagious disease.

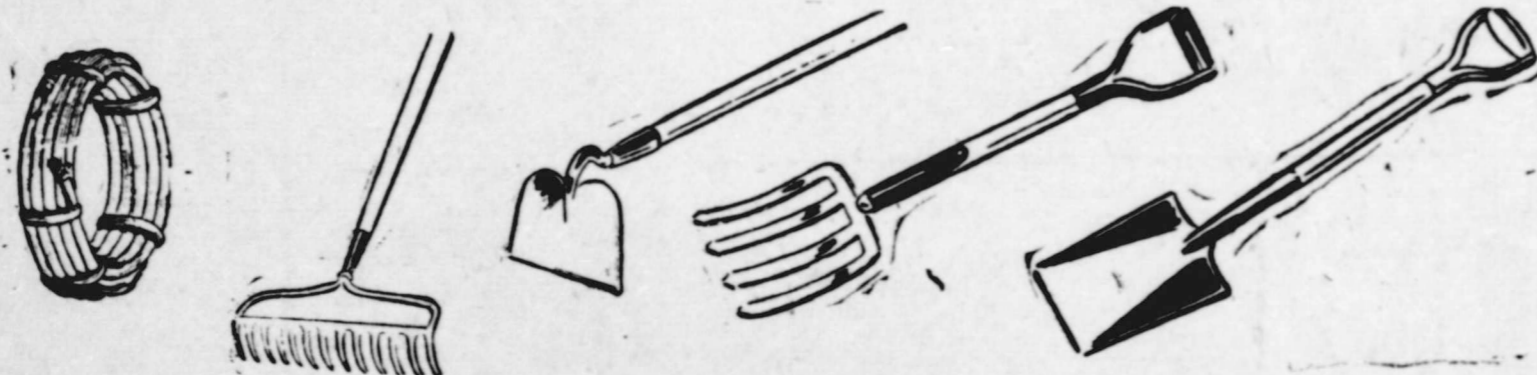

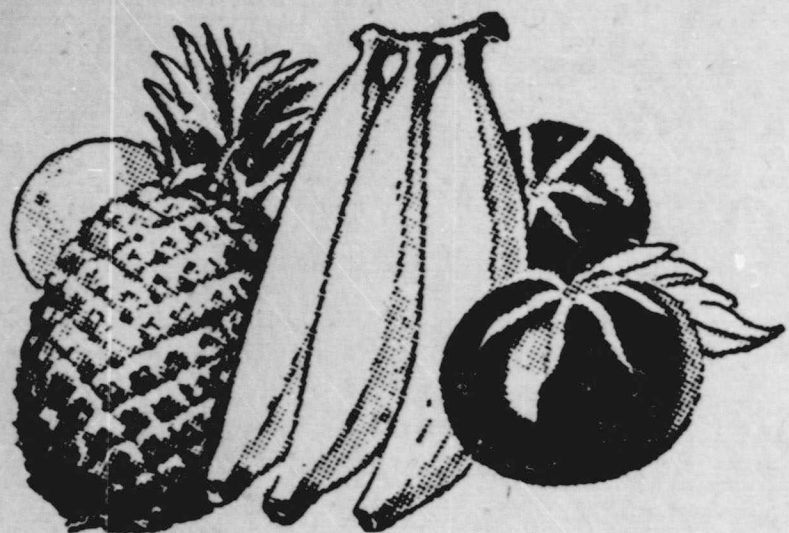
