## Paratrooper Back Home For Keeps

Pfc. Sammy N. Riley Jr., of South Terry, who followed the long but not lonesome trail from North Africa, through Sicily, Italy, Germany, Holland and England, for 3 1-2 years, is back home for keeps. He was an Army paratrooper, making three combat missions, that is, with a regiment of 2,000 fully equipped for fighting, were dropped from planes at 1,000 feet altitude, behind enemy lines, and "hit the ground a shootin'". Food and munitions were also dropped in bundles. His Battalion was the Presidential citation, and he was awarded several medals and ribbons.

He took time off to marry an English girl, who with their baby boy is to come here, as soon as papers can clear through. When asked if he thought she would like the cotton patch he said: "It will be heaven to her" then related the sure 'nuff rationing over there, and extreme deprivations the people endure, so far behind the times as we have here. He said the English are slow, stubborn but sure. We had already observed how slow England is when it took them thirty days to find out how their election went. Over here we know it the day after, and sometimes weeks before.

Sammy small in stature, but hale and husky, will resume his farming here.

## Ralph Weldon Howell On USS Missouri

Aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay—Ralph Weldon Howell, Firecontrolman, ordnance, third class, USNR, Brownfield, Texas, is playing a role in a momentous event of American history. Serving on this mighty battleship, he was present when the Japanese envoys came aboard to sign the final surrender document. General of the Army Douglas MacArthur, Supreme Allied Commander; Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet who signed document for the United States; and other famous military and naval chiefs were present.

The 45,000-ton Missouri, named for the home state of President Truman, is one of the most powerful warships ever built. It is now the flagship of Admiral William F. Halsey, Commander of the Third Fleet.

## Texas State Guard Gets \$15,000,000 Worth War Material From Government



The Texas State Guard has received about \$15,000,000 worth of equipment from the United States Government, which is divided among the fifty battalions and two hundred and twenty-five companies of TSG scattered all over the State of Texas, according to Brig. Gen. Arthur B. Knickerbocker, Adjutant General.

An inventory would include .45 cal. revolvers, U. S. rifles with bayonets, .30 cal machine guns, .45 cal Thompson sub-machine guns, hand grenades, smoke pots, cargo trucks, command cars, ambulances, field telephones, radios, gas mask, uniforms, clothing, and miscellaneous bivouac equipment, such as field ranges, tents, etc.

The Eighth Service Command, formerly under the direction of Major General Donovan, recognizes the importance and necessity of the State Guard, and supplies instructors, educational equipment, and current information for the use of Guard units.

Texas is called upon to provide approximately twelve per cent of the Nation's total State Guard enlistments. Present enrollment is only ten per cent. The Texas State Guard, at the present time, has an actual strength of only sixty-one per cent of its authorized strength. While this is second only to New York State, Texas is not doing the job that they were called on and expected to do, said the Adjutant General.

## What Plans Has The City Made For Post War Employment Here

We informed the readers last week what the county, state and federal governments had up their sleeve for post-war employment. At the same time we had an article reminding the Board of Development that it was time for it to wake up and get busy helping prospective new people seek out places and locations where they desire to locate, and get in touch with others.

And we also reminded all, with surplus property to sell, that this was not the time to tie the property to a kite and hist in the air. If we are to make a town at all worthy of the name here in Brownfield, we must forget big profits and get down to earth. Yes, the Herald does have a bit of business property for sale, and if it is suitable for anyone's need, they can have it at what we and others consider a reasonable figure. It is not much, but some, and we can't be accused of advising others and putting a high price on our own.

Which all brings to mind that an official of the Board of Development this week stated that he approved all that we said last week concerning property, and making Brownfield a real trading center, as well as oil headquarters for this area of the Permian basin. He agreed that there was nothing to hinder such a development if all worked to that end, and forget about doubling and tripling profits on property. But he added something—

### What is the City of Brownfield Going to Do?

So far as we know, the City of Brownfield has put out nothing as to what steps they aim to take in post-war reconstruction and growth, and this man stated that he had heard nothing. So, it is only fair that people begin to ask what is to be done. So, far as we know, the city is in good circumstances financially; it has some of the best business men of the city as councilmen, and we feel sure that they have taken some thought of what they intend to do following the shooting war, even if they have put nothing out. The county and state have already made some plans, which have been announced. Has the city any?

The city, the Board of Development and the Jaycees can be an inestimable help in the post-war era in helping to locate new enterprises that may wish to come here. They can assist greatly in helping to estimate a price on property that will be fair to the buyer and seller, and at the same time keep out of the real estate field themselves. That is no place for the city council, or any of the organizations. But the city can at least try raising taxes on property that the owner has asked double and triple for. If the owner thinks the property worth what he asked, he will not object to the double and triple raise in tax, surely.

The Herald believes that our hustling real estate firms, who understand values more than anyone, will help the city, or the B. of D or Jaycees in estimating a reasonable price on real estate that is for sale. The City Council of our fine little city may have plans for expansions that they have not announced, and if so, the public would like to hear them.

In the meantime, there is no room for any criticism anywhere. But we do know this much. General MacArthur and Admiral Nimitz were both caught with their pants down, so to speak, when the Japs decided to quit long before they expected it, and it has taken much time, thought and arrangement and re-arrangement of occupation plans. None of our big industries were expecting a quick surrender, and they are far behind in reconversion. In fact, very few expected the capitulation of the Nips before late fall or winter at least, and we are just that far behind in post-war planning. The city may have its plans, and the citizens are ready to hear them when they are announced.

## Blevins At Tokyo On USS Alabama

On the USS Alabama in Tokyo Bay—Bernice W. Blevins, seaman, second class, USNR, 517 South 2nd st., Brownfield, Texas is serving on this battleship, which is part of the powerful Pacific Fleet completing the first stages of the occupation of Japan.

Under the operational control of Admiral William F. Halsey, USN, the Alabama, with 11 other battleships, 17 aircraft carriers, six escort carriers, 20 cruisers and more than 200 other U. S. ships, is helping take over control of the Nips' big naval bases.

The explorer, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, USN retired, was on board temporarily during a shore bombardment near Tokyo shortly before the end of the war. He called this bombardment "a milestone in warfare" because the ship was "able to hit the target accurately without being able to see it."

## Terry County Road Bonds Sold Monday

The Commissioners Court Monday, sold the \$375,000 road bond issue, voted week before last, on the following terms and to the following purchasers.

- 1 3-4 percent interest for the first five years.
  - 2 percent interest for the next five years.
  - 2 1-4 percent interest for the next five years.
  - 2 1-2 percent interest for the next five years.
- The money will be paid into the county just as soon as the attorney can approve the proceedings, and bonds are printed.

Bonds voted to run for 20 years but may be redeemed in 10 years at the option of the county.

The commissioners are getting busy locating the various gaps to be filled in, and expect to start work before January first.

## Judge Lincoln Resigns H. Winston Appointed

C. L. Lincoln, now serving his third term, tendered his resignation Monday as county Judge of Terry county. The Commissioners Court accepted it, to take effect October 1st, next year. They promptly appointed H. R. Winston, a former Judge to fill out the unexpired term, from above date, which term ends December 31, 1946.

Judge Lincoln, who was first elected in 1940, succeeding R. A. Simms, who became Secretary of the Local Draft Board, re-elected in 1942, and again in 1944, has been active in aiding the Veterans of War No. 1, for many years and practically serving as Service officer for Veterans of War No. 2, without pay, was by the Court appointed County Service officer, which carries salary and office equipment equal to other county officers. It is expected that Yoakum county will also command his services, sharing expenses.

Terry county people are advised by their government to keep pegging away at paper saving and fat collections. We are still mighty shy on paper, as much food and medical supplies must still continue to go to our men overseas, packed in paste board boxes, as well as to many starving people in both Europe and Asia, and whether we like it or not, the USA must furnish much of this stuff, either free, or by making loans—that will never be paid. As to tin, we are so far from raw, that no effort has ever been made here to collect that waste. It is a thousand miles from here to the nearest tin salvage plant.

They are rolling back to Texas and other states from the west coast, with the car, and fairly good tires, and the dependable three-wheel trailer. Some with some money ahead; some flat as a post-war tire. Many of them worked hard, and sometimes put in overtime hours, saved money, and will have something to live on, or to set themselves up in small businesses. Others, interviewed by the dailies en route, some, acknowledged they had a high-heeled time out there, and were coming home broke. Some had appealed to the Red Cross for help in New Mexico and Arizona. Such people deserve pity but little sympathy. They had a chance to make something while the overseas boys were laying in fox holes at \$50 per, and chuck if they could get it. But even if they the "good timers" have made an ass of themselves in war time, Terry county, for one, will try to get them on an even keel again.

If we keep men in the armed services that has been drafted longer than six months after the war has ended, and the shooting part is ended, let us see to it that they get the same wage that union men get in the United States. That will cost too much, says one. Yep, it will cost, but we as a free nation have no right on earth to sentence one young man, just because he happens to be physically sound, to some foreign country at \$50 per month, and leave the other man's boy here

with his family in the United States to make from \$6 to \$10 per day. And while we are at the matter, let's try to solve our own matters here at home, and not try to play Santa Claus all over the world. It is not our place to bed down the world once a day, and see that they have their bottle of milk three times daily. Some of the Europeans will never go to work as long as Uncle Sam will feed and clothe them. Many of them have had ample time since surrender to get into production, but they have been depending on us instead. Who fed the South after the Civil War? It was just as badly laid waste as Europe; farm homes burned, horses and cattle and poultry taken or stolen. But the south went to work and came back by its own help and its own help alone. Let the Europeans call us old Shylock if they wish, and then go to work.

The world is amazed that Japan would surrender while it still had one of the largest armies any nation ever had. These soldiers hate to quit, since they have no idea as to what has taken place in the home islands. But two atomic bombs, on top of the destruction already done by the B-29's was too much for the emperor and his gang. No war has ever been won without the use of infantry. The Japs would not have been whipped so soon without the wonderful success of the doughboys under MacArthur in cleaning up the islands for the air bases. But this time it was the air force which gave the final knockout blow to Japan.—Canyon News.

You are right in the final analysis, Editor Warwick, but let us not forget that it was the navy that slugged it out with the Nips, made it possible for landing on the beaches of Leyte, Ima Jima, Okinawa and other places, so that Marines and GI's could clean up and make landing strips close to Japan for the air forces. It took all, and to all should go the honor of the knockout punch. For that reason, many people and their representatives in congress are going to demand that all war forces be under one head—the War Department — instead of three, from now on.

The British people are howling because President Truman has stopped lend-lease. We have given the British billions of dollars worth of war goods, for which we shall never receive a dime. The British are a poor financial risk. They defaulted on the debt of World War I; they refused to allow our ships to pass through the Suez Canal as a charge against their debt to us, while we gave British ships free passage through the Panama Canal; they overcharged us on hauling our troops across the Atlantic. Yet they expect Uncle Sam to still continue as Santa Claus and pour out billions more of lend-lease, which we shall never collect. President Truman learned practical politics in Missouri, and found that "no" is a popular word in the vocabulary of the popular politician.—Canyon News.
