Second War Veteran **Killed In Car Wreck**

Hillard Fuller, 24, discharged two months ago from the U.S. Navy after three years service mostly in the south Pacific, was instantly killed, about 2 o'clock

a. m., last Sunday morning, when the car he was driving careened head on into a Butane gas truck on the highway, just south of Meadow. His two sisters, Ethel, 12, and Thelma, 14, sustained lacerations and bruises necessitating hospital treatment. One of them is in the local hospital, in a critical condition.

Fuller had been to Brownfield visiting another sister, Mrs. Hazel Madden, a waitress in a local cafe and was returning to his parents' home, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Fuller, a few miles northwest of Meadow. The truck was coming south. It was thought a tire blew out on the Fuller car, causing it to make the sudden turn in path of the truck.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church at Meadow, Tuesday at 3:30 p. m., followed by burial in the Meadow cemetery. Military honors were accorded the

Plant Trees Soon As Possible

If you plan to set out some new trees or shrubs on your place this year, don't wait much longer. Before you know it, the sap will be rising and buds will be swelling with a spell of mild weather.

And once spring has set in for good, your good intentions may be wasted. For trees set out late don't stand much chance of survival, says R. N. McClain, County agent. If you can, do that planting or transplanting job as soon as possible and preferably after a rain. That way your trees and shrubs will be well established before leafing out time. And in case you didn't know, leafing out uses up a good deal of a plant's vitality:

College Station-Meat may frozen at temperatures as low 40 to 114 degrees F. below zero in the future should the resulting tenderness prove worth the extra cost of such very low tempera-

tures, Roy W. Snyder, meat specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, has predicted.

Beef frozen at 18 degrees and then thawed is about 9 per cent more tender than comparable unfrozen sbeef, he said. The usual freezing temperatures now in use are from zero to 10 degrees. Agriculture ^o research ^o workers which showed that beef frozen at

114 degrees below zero was 29 per cent more tender than unfrozen beef by pointing out that the ncreased stenderness, was due sto eaction of ice crystals.




