In order to vote in the Demoreached the age of 21, either have paid his poll tax or obtained an exemption certificate. No exemption certificate is required for persons over 60, and veterans of World War II who have been discharged from service less than 18 months need have only their discharge certificates.

Anyone voting, however, must have fulfilled the residence requirements in the county in which he votes. He must have lived in the state at least one year and in the county at least six months. Exservice men as well as others must have fulfilled this requirement, either prior to entering the service or afterwards.

Voting by absentee ballot thus far has been considerably heavier than was expected, according to H. M. Pyeatt, County Clerk, with 75 votes cast in person and marked ballots returned by mail.

The new variety, which has been ! tested experimentally at College Station for the past two years, produced 4,692 pounds of green pods per acre as compared with 1.966 pounds per acre of the common variety, according to R. O.

Dunkle, county agricultural agent. When the peas began coming into production, recently, club members and their families reported the new variety had a much more desirable flavor. Donald Nix, 4-H Club member of the Sunset community, described the flavor as "less tangy" than the common variety, and he found them to be less stringy.

All 45 members plan to save the seed of Early Ramshorn blackeyed peas to sell to their neighbors for 1947 planting. Market price for the edible peas has been 30c a pound, and if this price is maintained, the boys will receive a substantial profit from their demonstration, Dunkle says.

GI Question And **Answer Department**

Q. Last year I attended school under the G. I. Bill and received subsistence payments of \$75 a month for me and my family. The amended Servicemen's Readjustment Act, passed in 1945, increased the amount to \$90 a month. Am I entitled to retroactive payments for the increase?

A. No. Payment of increased subsistence allowances for veterans with dependents went into effect Jan. 1, 1946. It provides specifically that the increased amount is payable as of the first day of the first calender month immediately following enactment of the amended legislation. Date of the enactment was December 28, 1945.

Q. I am 23 years old and would like to know what my premium will be on a 20-payment NSLI policy?

A. The monthly premium on such policies at your age is \$2.05 a month per \$1,000.

Q. How long do I have before I have to convert my term insurance to a permanent form?

A. You can keep your term insurance for eight years from the



ARE NEEDED FROM WEST TEXAS EACH DAY BY GILBERT C. WILSON

> LABORATORIES AT PITTSBURG, TEXAS

We will need 1,080,000 pounds of blackeyed peas per day. Our plant will have a miximum daily production capacity in excess of 30,000 cases per day.

Our plant is now operating, canning peas from South and Central Texas. West Texas blackeyed peas harvest will begin after harvest season in East Texas is over. We will start buying here when peas are first available, and will continue to buy until the first killing frost.

We will set up receiving points at convenient places throughout the Brownfield territory, and peas will be paid for when they are received. We will pay market price for the peas, which should be in the vicinity of \$65.00 per ton.

The demand for canned blackeyes appears to be far in excess of what canners can supply this year.

According to the experienced blackeyed pea growers in West Texas, less moisture is required for producing a good yield of blackeyed peas than cotton, and they can be planted 20 to 30 days later than cotton and yet still in time for maximum yield.

Blackeyed peas, being a legume, will serve to build up the soil, and will also serve somewhat as a cover for the soil to keep down errosion during the winter months.

We will also buy dried blackeyed peas this year

The location of our buying points in the Brownfield territory will be announced in the near future.



SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS IN NORTHWEST EUROPE By General Dwight D. Eisenhower



The broad strategy behind our main effort against the German war machine included as a highly desirable preliminary the successful conclusion of operations in North Africa and their extension across Sicily to the Italian mainland. With these accomplished, with the Mediterranean "flank" freed for Allied shipping, and with the necessary special equipment built or in sight, we were at last in a position to prepare for the final cross-Channel assault which had been agreed upon since April 1942 as our main operation against Germany. It was correctly believed that only on the historic battlefields of France and the Low Countries could

Germany's armies in the west be decisively engaged and defeated America and England—the Western Allies—could not be sufficiently strong to undertake the assault against France until June 1944, but the broad tactical plans for the operation were completed and approved by the Combined Chiefs of Staff in August 1943, prior to my assumption of command of the European Theater in February 1944.

As part of our basic strategy, and in accordance with the task given to the Strategic Air Force under the Casablanca Directive in January 1943, the bombing of Germany, begun early in the war by the British Bomber Command, was intensified in May 1943 and continued with mounting strength to the end of the campaign. Neither the contemplated invasion of Europe nor the direct attack on the German Industrial and economic system would be feasible until we had achieved supremacy over the German Air Force. This struggle for air supremacy, which had been going on throughout the was, was given added impetus by a new directive (known as POINTBLANK) in January 1943 which aimed of subjugating the enemy air force by the spring of 1944. In the event, German air might was thoroughly dominated by D-Day and we were tree to apply the immense strength of the Allied air forces in the manner we wished and to launch the invasion confident that our plans could not be seriously upset by the German air force. In addition, air bombardment had disrupted the German communications system, immeasurably aiding our ground forces by impeding enemy movements.

Our main strategy in the conduct of the ground campaign was to land amphibious and airborne forces on the Normandy coast between Le Havre and the Cotentin Peninsula and, with the successful establishment of a beachhead with adequate ports, to drive along the lines of the Loire and the Seine Rivers into the heart of France, destroying the German strength and freeing France. We anticipated that the enemy would resist strongly on the line of the Seine and later on the Somme, but once our forces had broken through the relatively static lines of the beachhead at St-Lo and inflicted on him the heavy casualties in the Falaise pocket, his ability to resist in France was negligible. Thereafter our armies swept east and north in an unimpeded advance which brought them to the German frontier and the delenses of the Siegfried Line.
