


The R. A. F., early in the war, attributed their many mishaps to the Gremlins, a new word for an invisible little Elf, an offspring of Lady Luck and Father Evil, that would stow away on the wings or fuselage of their planes, and cause an often fatal miscarriage of their missions.

Our recent greatly increased motor casualties prompts one with superstitious lapses, to wonder if these Gremlins have not followed our boys home, to perch upon our fenders and steering wheels, and continue their bloody sabotage.

Twice in the last year, the Department of Public Safety have given out in published reports, a list of automobile mishaps, showing Terry county to nearly double in numbers, each, over Dawson, Lynn, and Hockley counties, our same size, and almost as much as Lubbock, four times our population. Why this difference? Some thought because the more alert highway patrolmen stationed here, reported every accident, while other counties, either not having the number, or having less alert patrolmen, overlooked many minor mishaps. Yet the many, too many, headstones in our cemetery, mutely evidence an awful truth.

One motor death per month seems to be the county's average this year. Following, on Dec. 14, the horrible death of young Shue, a recent discharged Marine, three miles south on the Seagraves highway, we have: Feb. 3, Hillard Fuller, near Meadow; Feb. 15, Dillard Graham, at the Deluxe Motor Inn; March 2, Mrs. Dunlay, an expectant mother, near Union; June 2, Robt. Howard Johnson, a mere boy, three miles out on the beck, just over in Yoakum, enroute home from Brownfield; In July, Felix T. Lea, ex-Navy man, who near Seagraves, was run over and killed; August 1, Mrs. Ritchey, 4 miles north on Lubbock highway; August 8, Aubrey W. 

Originally an attempt was made to contact every former PW immediately on his release from confinement and have him fill out a questionnaire, the answers to which would reflect his personal knowledge of war crimes, and its notential value as trial evidence. It was hoped that this would provide an adequate basis for the presentation of war crimes evi-

If a questionnaire indicated that the PW had information which would be of value, he was questioned further by trained investigators and his testimony reduced to writing.

However, as the trial's progressed, it became increasingly apparent that the statements available for use represented only a small percentage of the total number of Americans who were held prisoner by the Japanese and, further, that particular points needing coverage often were not included in statements that were possessed

by the prosecuting teams. The present plan was devised to avoid the necessity of having the prosecuting teams request statements or additional information from PWs as each individual case arose and, also, to complete the record of the war crimes trials in Japan for historical purposes.





Before October 1 every weekly newspaper in the country must file a sworn statement of circularesult of a new law recently approved by President Truman. The purposes of the measure were explained by Rep. McKenzie of the Committee on Post Office and Post Roads, when he said:

"H. R. 2543 would put all newspapers on a par; it would improve the standards of the weekly newspaper profession; it would result in giving advertisers and advertising agencies sworn statements of the paid circulation of weekly newspapers: it would cause publishers of weekly newspaprs to pay more attention to their circulation and to the keeping of proper records.

MAJORITY HONEST

"Unfortunately a few weekly newspapers, although they are in the minority by far, at the present time make fictitious and spurious claims about their circulation; they will pad or exaggerate their circulation in the hope of receiving more national advertising. The great majority of honest, reliable newspapers must suffer for the padding and spurious claims which are made by a small minority of weekly newspapers.

"This legislation will rebound to the benefit and advantage of all weekly newspapers."



Q. How can option under which National Service Life Insurance is payable be changed?

A. (1) By the insured at any time or, (2) upon death of the insured, by the beneficiary, before any payment has been made. Whatever form of payment is provided by the insured, the beneficiary may arrange for payments to be made over a longer period of time, provided benefit payments have not commenced.

Q. How long must a National Service Life Insurance policy be in effect before it can be con-

A. National Service Life Insurance must be in effect at least one year before it can be con-

Q. Is the veteran allowed any grace in the payment of National Service Life Insurance premiums?

A. A grace period of 31 days without interest is allowed for the payment of any premiums other than the first premium payable under the policy. The policy remains in force during the grace period.

Q. Can a veteran pay his NSLI premiums by deductions from compensation, retirement pay, or

A. Yes. The insured may authorize the monthly deduction of remiums from compensation, retirement pay, or pension that have been awarded him under any laws dministered by Veterans Adminstration.

Q. Can creditors make claims on a beneficiary of a National Service Life Insurance policy?

A. Payments of insurance to a beneficiary are exempt from the claims of creditors of the insured or creditors of the beneficiary, and are not liable to attachment, levy, or seizure, either before or after receipt by the beneficiary. How-

Q. What is the "National Service Life Insurance Fund?" A. National Service Life Insur-

ance is mutual insurance. All premiums paid on this insurance and all interest earned thereon are deposited in a separate trust fund in the U.S. Treasury, designated as the "National Service Life Insurance Fund." The Government derives no profit from its administration and acts in the capacity of trustee of the fund for the sole benefit of the policyholders and their beneficiaries.
