In talking with him about the appointment, we were surprised to learn he is only 29. This probably makes him the youngest D. A. in the history of our area.

Bill says we aren't the first ones to get fooled about his age, though. Back in the early days of World War II when sentiment was so strong and so many young men were being called to the services, Bill had a disturbing experience.

His older brother was in the army, and his mother wrote to him regularly. Sometimes she would finish her letter too late to catch the dispatcher from the post office, and Bill would be sent to the station to place the letter directly on the train.

One day as he was doing this he encountered a train filled with troops, and they gave the big, mature-looking 175-pound boy of 13 a sound going over for being a "draft dodger.

Bill's feelings were terribly hurt and he refused any more direct mail deliveries for his mother.
