A Friend Who Has No Friends

Let he who would have friends be a friend. This advice is offered by orators, preachers, and practically every person who speaks about how to win friends.

It sounds like pretty good advice for the most of us.

But after observing one class of people, especially in Friona, it seems that this advice cannot be applied to them. The people in mind are the local peace officers.

For it appears that no matter how considerate they try to be they are condemned. Accusations of partiality are quick to come from those who are corrected. "You are just picking on me, and turning your head when somebody else does the same thing," is something that is heard too often by a peace of-

That Friona needs local peace officers who are conscious of their duty to uphold the law is evident. That Friona needs more cooperation with the local peace officers may not be too evident, but this is true.

For every time a person breaks the law and must be corrected, there is a chance that he will need the protection of the law enforcement officers just as many times. And when a person needs this protection, there is not a sight more welcome than the friendly peace offi-

Reports of effectiveness by the present officers in doing their job are heard from those who have seen the conditions much more unlawful in Friona. Reports of instances in which poor cooperation was given to the officers is discouraging.







Phosphorus And Nitrogen Team For Better Wheat

at the Walter Kaltwasser farm between Lariat and Oklahoma Lane this year indicate that nitrogen and phosphorus make an ideal "team" for increasing wheat yields

The tests, conducted by Al Pope of the Great Plains Experiment Station at Bushland, were completed three weeks ago, and figures on the results have been released. Here are the statistics:

Note that the unfertilized wheat yielded 27.5 bushels per acre. Wheat fertilized with 120 pounds of nitrogen per acre, per acre yielded 58.5 bushels. Variations of other formulas alone increased yields very little, but when teamed with nitrogen, the difference was very evident.

The wheat was also irrigated, and the figures shown with this tory are the result of an avrage of four replications.

The results are especially ignificant to farmers in the Lariat-Farwell area, plus some parts of Oklahoma Lane and some parts of the Lazbuddie Yield community. In general, the southern part of Parmer County is overlain with sandy-na-27.5 tured soil of the type involved

Watering down the row—instead of in the furrows between the rows—is sometimes practiced by area irrigators, especially where the land is steeply sloped. This is grain sorghum on the Conrad Nelson place, Lazbuddie. The plants retard the flow of the water, they have more moisture available, and tail water loss is reduced. There are some disadvantages, too, depending on individual circumstances. Sometimes weed troubles are increased, plant food is leached away and plants yellow because of "drowning."

Cotton insects are costly. Their sucking and chewing on tender plants may be cutting potential production.



Take notice that on the 15th day of July, 1957, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Friona did adopt the following motion-

Moved by Commissioner J. G. McFarland, seconded by Commissioner Oscar Baxter:

That the City of Friona pay a bounty of \$2.50 to any person who brings an unlicensed dog to the City Dog Pound at the corner of Sixth Street and Grand Avenue, effective August 1, 1957; and that citizens who have dogs impounded be allowed to pay the sum of the bounty, plus fee for registration and for vaccination for rabies, and have their dog returned to their possession.

Motion passed unanimous.

Adopted the 15th day of July, 1957, by the City Commission of Friona, Texas.

To collect \$2.50 bounty, contact the City Clerk at the City Hall of Friona, Texas, to arrange for leaving the dog at the City Pound.

Effective August 1, 1957, the City of Friona will pay \$2.50 bounty on all unlicensed dogs to any person who brings said dog to the city pound.

Licenses for dogs may be obtained at the City Hall upon showing a valid certificate of vaccination for rabies.


