Eddie Gauna Wins Weekly Contest

Betty Reeve reported that she and Mary Johnston recently gave a program at Lazbuddie Young Homemaker's, and it was well received.

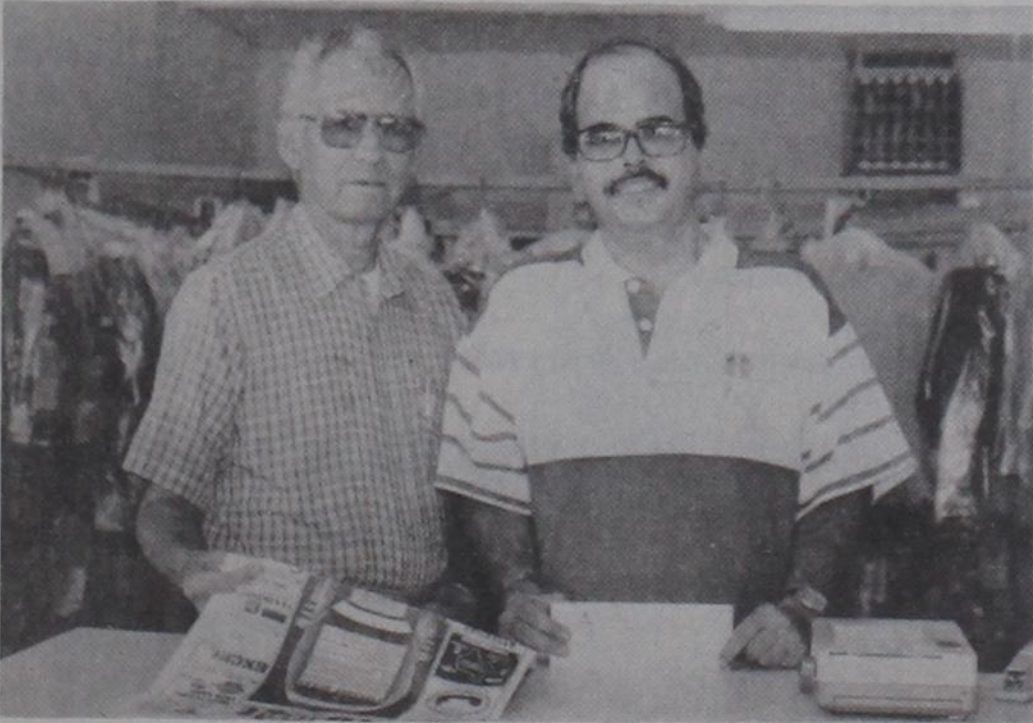

Emergency Farm Loan Apps. Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought, wind, hail and tornado are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 109 Third, Farwell, FmHA county supervisor, Thomas S. Taylor, said this week.

Parmer County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, wind, hail and tornado.

Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 per cent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 per cent.

Light Turnout Seen For Amendments

A light voter turnout is expected next Tuesday, November 2, when 16 proposed amendments to the state constitution will be presented to the voters.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren said Thursday morning that only about 20 people had bothered to take part in the "early voting," which has been underway since mid-October and ended Friday.

The propositions include four proposals concerning general obligation or revenue bonds for projects; three issues concerning county surveyors; changes in the amount of time to redeem real property sold at a tax sale, a proposal for a state exemption on some new property tax burdens for businesses.

The issue drawing the most attention is Amendment 4, which would prohibit a personal income tax without approval of the voters, and dedicate funds from an income tax to education and reduction of local property taxes.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday. Polling places are as follows: Pct. 101: Calvary Baptist Church; 201: Bovina EMS Building; 202: Friona Community Center; 203: Rhea Community Center; 301: Courthouse; 302: Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church; 303: Ridgelea School; 401: Lazbuddie School; 402: Friona Fire Station.

Area Dodges Bullet; Winter Bears Down

The Friona area managed to escape a hard freeze for the second time on Wednesday morning, when the temperature bottomed out at 33 degrees.

However, the forecast was for the 1993 growing season to perhaps come to an end either Friday or Saturday morning, as a wintry blast was aimed at the area, with a threat of the first snow.

Tuesday's slow mist amounted to .18 inch of moisture, bringing October's total to 1.47 inches, and the year-to-date total to 18.08 inches.

The yearly total is impressive when you consider that the total for the first four months of the year came to only 2.25 inches. October will become the seventh month out of the first ten of the year when rainfall amounted to at least an inch.

Farmers and gardeners have enjoyed a growing season of just over six months, as the last killing freeze was registered locally on April 21. Although two heavy frosts had been received as of this week, most plants were still in the green stage.

Farmers were hoping for more open weather, for the harvest of sugar beets, and cotton, which is right on the brink of being ready to strip.

"Mark your calendars and join us Sunday, November 7 from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.," the spokesperson concluded.

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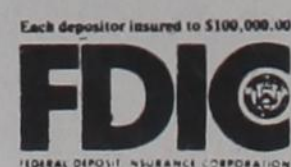

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


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AT HOMECOMING

Mustangs Fall In Heartbreaker 18-12

Bovina's Mustangs had their first victory of the season within their grasp, only to have the Farwell Steers score twice in the final five minutes of the game and make off with an 18-12 win last week.

In fact, the final Steer score came with just 47 seconds remaining.

The game was Bovina's Homecoming contest. In ceremonies, Melecio Marrufo and Kim Kirkpatrick were honored as king and queen.

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"The kids made a good effort. We just made some mistakes at a bad time, and they cost us. We need to learn to eliminate those kind of mistakes," said Coach James Russell.

Bovina amassed close to 300 yards total offense, and Farwell had about 150 yards. It was one of those games where Bovina won everywhere except on the scoreboard.

Bovina had taken the lead in the first quarter when Luis Ortiz ran a yard for a 6-0 Bovina lead. Farwell's Garza kicked a 26-yard field goal, but the Mustangs still enjoyed a 6-3 halftime lead.

The Mustangs stretched their lead in the final quarter when Marrufo caught a five-yard scoring pass from Lance McClaran, for a 12-3 lead. The running try for points again failed. "Our kicker was hurt, so we had to run for the points," Russell explained.

Farwell stormed back with scores by Haseloff and Brock Anderson to snatch the victory.

This week the Mustangs visit Kress, with yet another chance to get into the win column. The Kangaroos only have a 1-7 season record and are 0-3 in district. After that, Bovina only has potent Sudan left on their schedule.

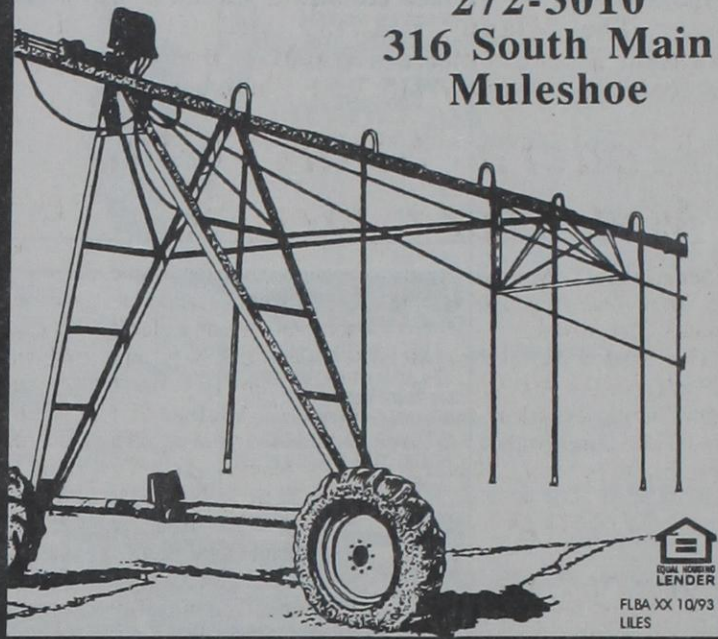

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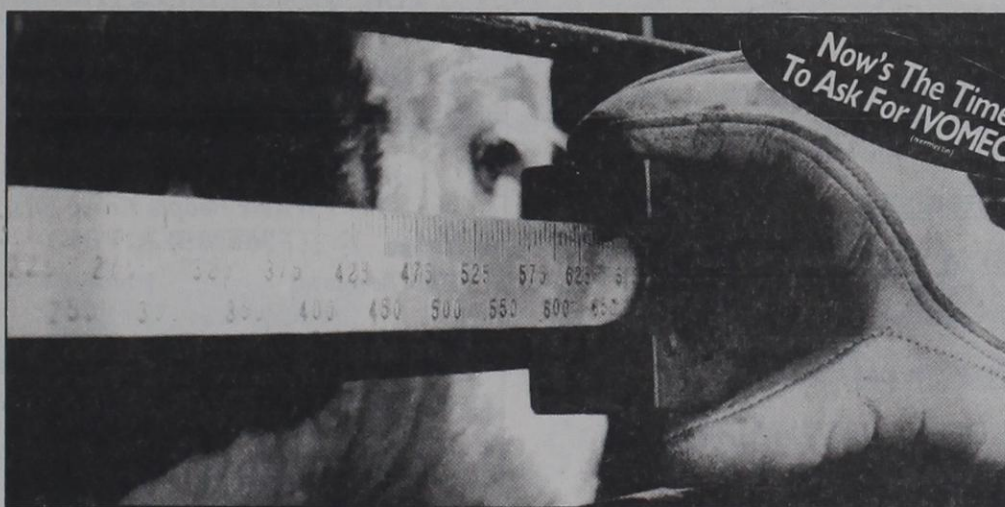

WILDCATS WIN, 28-7

Chieftains Carry Fight To Littlefield, But..

"We had pretty good intensity going into the game. We really wanted to beat Littlefield," said linebacker/offensive line coach Bob Ferguson. "But we gave up the big play. We didn't make them drive it down the field." And that was the story behind the 28-7 loss to the Wildcats.

Littlefield scored its first touchdown in the first quarter on a one-yard run by #37 Rene Espinoza. The Wildcats had the ball 10 inches from the goal line, and the Chiefs pushed them back on the third down. It was pretty impressive. The Chieftain defense did a terrific job of holding the Wildcats, but they gave up the big play.

In the second quarter, Littlefield scored a second touchdown on a pass play. "The Chieftain offense showed a lot of character when it came back from a 14-0 deficit score to make a touchdown," said head coach James Morton.

Jay Belcher had two key catches to keep the drive alive. In fact, Belcher had a good night with four receptions totaling 72 yards.

Quarterback Blair Burney scored from one-yard out with 1:16 left before the half, making the score 14-7. The Chiefs were ahead 7-6 on first downs after the second quarter.

The beginning of the third quarter brought a revitalized chieftain team. In the first series the offense came out and moved the ball downfield.

Due to the tremendous kicking power of Wildcat Danny Vargas, the drive started out at the Friona's 25-yard line.

Juan Gamboa had two big runs on crucial third-down plays. Gamboa consistently ran the ball well. But the Chiefs were unable to score.

The Wildcats got possession of the ball and Rene Espinoza scored again on a one-yard run.

The fourth quarter brought an offside penalty on a punt that hurt the Chiefs. Littlefield scored again on a one-yard run by Espinoza. At the end of the game, Littlefield had 14 first downs and a total of 257 yards, to Friona's 11 first downs and 200 yards.

Penalties have plagued the Chiefs since the beginning of the

year. "A lot of those penalties are due to aggressiveness, but many are also because sometimes the guys are just not thinking. We made a lot of mental mistakes last Friday," said Coach Kevin Cooper.

According to Coach Morton, "The defense played well and did a better job shutting down Littlefield than any other team the Wildcats have played. The big plays hurt us. The offense turned the ball over four times. If we could have held onto the ball, we could have moved it against the Littlefield defense."

Statistically, the Chieftains stacked up well with the Wildcats. They held unbeaten Littlefield to 239 yards, which was 92 yards below their season average.

Having played perhaps their toughest three district games, the Chieftains ranked seventh in the region in total defense, allowing an average of 263 yards per game.

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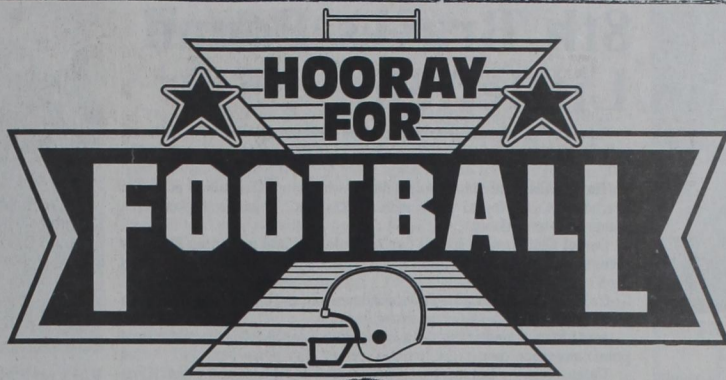

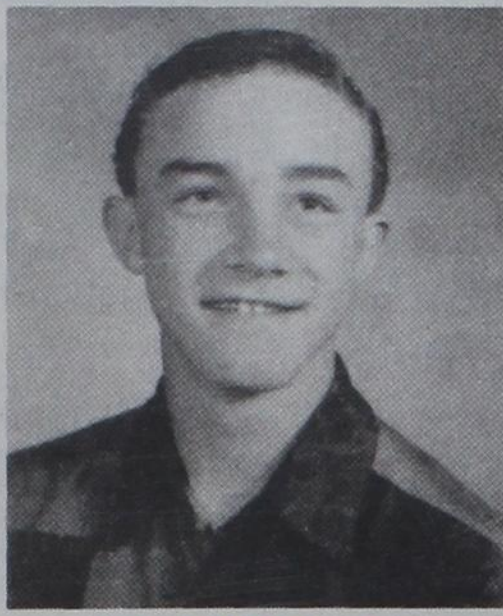

Students May Win Cargill Scholarships

A pastor asked one of his congregation what he thought the biggest problem in the church was, apathy or ignorance? The layman replied, "I don't know, and I don't care!"

Evaluating Income Mutual Fund Performance

One reason investors choose mutual funds is to receive regular income, in the form of dividends. In recent years, however, as interest rates have declined, income funds have been forced to reduce their dividends. Does this mean these funds are performing poorly?

To answer that, you must first understand how income funds invest and pay dividends. As an example, let's look at a mutual fund that invests primarily in U.S. government securities. These funds typically seek high income consistent with prudent risk and preservation of capital. They are further obligated to invest only in securities for which the timely payment of principal and interest is guaranteed by the U.S. government.

When fund managers buy securities, they are limited to what is offered in the market. If interest rates decline, as they have for some time, income brought into the fund from newly purchased bonds will be less, and your dividend will be affected. Therefore, you should not expect the fund to maintain the same dividend level it offered when overall interest rates were much higher.

On the other hand, as interest rates rise, the reverse happens. New, higher-yielding bonds are added to the portfolio, bringing added income that is paid out in dividends to shareholders.

The change of income in relation to current interest rates is relatively easy to understand. As interest rates fluctuate, so does the value of your fund shares. Bond prices and interest rates generally move in opposite directions. A decrease in interest rates usually signals an increase in the value of the bonds in the fund's portfolio. When this occurs, the value of your shares usually also rises. This combination of income and gain or loss in the value of your fund's shares is your total return.

People who invest in mutual funds for income seldom worry about day-to-day fluctuations in share value as long as their income continues. If your mutual fund becomes the victim of a dividend cut, don't panic and redeem your shares. Instead, consider where you can reinvest that money. Typically, other investments with similar objectives are experiencing the same fate.

Normal market fluctuations should not disturb you if your investment has been carefully selected to meet your financial needs. Understand your investments and how they work. When something happens that you don't understand, consult a knowledgeable professional.
