



Extensionist Advises Rest For Dairy Cows

The dry cow has three impor- | lactation. tant jobs to do, says A. M. Meekma, assistant extension dairy husbandman of Texas A&M college. She must recover from a heavy milk-producing period, build a calf and store up reserves for the next milking period. How well she does these jobs depends upon how long a dry period she gets and how well she is fed during the dry period.

During heavy peak production, a good cow will deplete her body reserves of nutrients and minerals, says Meekma. And unless she is given sufficient rest and proper care to rebuild these body reserves lower production during the next lactation period will result. The health and condition of the calf will also be affected.

The problem of feeding the dry cow is practically solved if she has access to good pasture. If good pasture isn't available, hay and silage should be fed liberally, says Meekma. The amount of grain to feed will depend upon the con-12.




