C. L. Lincoln Conversion Of 5-Year Level

Premium Term Insurance R & PR 3433 provides that conversion of a Term policy must be affected within the term period and if not renewed or converted prior to the expiration of such period all protection shall

The assistant administrator has interpreted this to mean that all requirements for conversion must be met prior to expiration of the term period but that the effective date of the converted policy may be the day immediately following expiration of the current term period.

Example: Effective date of Term policy, Dec. 11, 1940; expiration date of Term policy. Nov. 30, 1948; premiums paid through Nov. 30, 1948; effective date of converted policy Dec. 1, 1948.

Requirements: Acceptable application for conversion Form 9-358 and remittance for converted policy postmarked not later than Nov. 30, 1948.

In cases of this kind it will not be necessary for the insured to submit an application for renewal form 9-1658.

These instructions do not apply to conversions which are to be effective later than the day immediately following the last day of the term period. In such cases it will be necessary that requirements for renewal be met before conversion may be effect-

### A New Bundle Grain Sorghum Developed

Seed of a new variety named Hi-Hegari has been released to certified seed growers for increase has been announced by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is a tall variety of Hegari, bred and developed primarily for forage and silage.

Hi-Hegari has the high quality and palatable forge of Hegari and the same maturity and adaptation, but yields approximately 20 per cent more forage.

The first grain sorghums were tall and late maturing. Hegari, one of the more popular, was imported from Africa in 1909 and was first grown at the Chillicothe station. In 1938 Texas sorghum breeders came up with Early Hegari, a dwarf drouth resistant, early maturing type which is still the principal variety of Hegari.

The labor shortage during World War II, the demand for grain and the development of the double dwarf grain sorghum brought the combines into the sorghum fields. In 1949, more than 85 per cent of Texas grain sorghums were combine harvested.

The popularity of the combine varieties in turn led to a shortage of bundle feed; the supply is expected to be shorter still in the future because of acreage re-

Plant breeders of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station foresaw the need for forage and silage and for the past several years have been working on the problem. Hi-Hegari is the result.

The entire supply of seed has been distributed for increase, and a fair amount of Hi-Hegari will be available for 1951 planting through regular trade channels.

### Quick Freezing Now

Done On Many Farms Texas farmers, ranchers and urban garden owners may soon quick-freeze their own fruits and vegetables by one of the best commercial methods.

A compact, portable quick freezer for homes and small locker plants will be perfected this summer by University of Texas Engineering Dean W. R. Woolrich.

The unit will have approximately the same proportions as a five-gallon ice cream freezer. Home quick-freezing of fruits and vegetables in two to 10 minutes will be a reality.

Woolrich has designed his new machine in a vertical, bucketlike shape. It may be operated only when needed and is easily

### Changes of Having Ringworm Are 50-50

It is a 50-50 bet that you have some sort of ringworm infection. Check to see. Chances are it will be in your scalp hair, on your groin, or on your feet-either on the soles or between the toes If you don't find it, you're lucky, because while it isn't serious, its itching and persistence is very

A fungus—the same one th causes food to mold-causes ring worm. It's one of the world's mos common ailments, with authorities estimating that half of the world's population is affected. It is more common this time of year than any other.

The scales which are formed can cause new infections on the body, so an infected person has to be careful to keep it from spreading. Advanced cases exude a clear, runny fluid-it "weeps," as doctors say, and the fluid can cause breaking out on whatever part of the body it touches. Children are especially vulnerable to scalp ringworm. Epidemics are usually started in schools or in-

Swimming pools, locker rooms and gyms are potent sources of in fection. Everyone has heard of "athlete's foot." It is nothing more than a type of ringworm. So is the so-called "barber's itch."

Preventive measures call for avoiding persons and animals known to be infected. Swimming pools, gyms, locker rooms and the like can do their part toward ringworm control by boiling towels, swimming suits and their other public facilities for 30 minutes. Foot baths are also worthwhile.

The best thing to do is to keep clean at all times. But if you happen to get ringworm, or if you have it now, it will be better for all concerned if you report to your family doctor immediate-. He'll recommend medication designed to shorten and lessen the severity of the infection.

Gov. Allan Shivers in formally announcing his candidacy for a first elective term as Governor, said he had done his best to carry out a program for Texas in manner acceptable to the people of Texas, adding:

Shivers, who assumed the governorship last July, had not held a full-time governmental job before becoming governor. He was elected to the State Senate in 1934 and twice re-elected. In 1946 he was elected Lieutenant Governor and re-elected to that office in 1948. Born in Lufkin, he spent his boyhood in Tyler county and later moved with his family to

Port Arthur. During his public career Shivers has given particular attention to public welfare, rural roads and improved educational facilities. He was a co-author of Texas' original old age assistance law and helped to write the tax bill which still meets the cost of old age assistance. Under his leadership last February, the Legislature approved a far reaching reform and improvement program for state

"Between now and the July 22 election I will continue to make known my views on important public issues," Gov. Shivers stated. "I will emphasize facts and record of accomplishment, instead of easy promises, and will address myself to all the people of Texas rather than to any special group.'

The Governor says he considers economy to be the State's top problem. "And that means economy of money, of our soil and of our water resources," he added.
