"Elliott further supervised and personally conducted the wounded from the hill and then returned to his own position while under mortar and artillary fire. enemy fire and displayed a high degree of professional skill by calmly calling for and observing mortar fire which inflicted hea-

"The following morning the defense was shortened and his left flank was secured with a unit of fifty men. During the night his left flank again was exposed due to extremely heavy enemy fire which forced members of that flank to withdraw to new positions. With his left flank exposed. Burton G. 

The milking machine attached to the cow, at left, brings the white stuff up to a plastic tube near the ceiling. The tube extends into an adjoining milk house, at right, and enters vacuum sealed cans. When one can becomes full, the liquid automatically flows to the next. This fluid, never exposed to the air of the milking parlor or milk house, can't be contaminated by air-borne bacteria. Any number of cans may be placed in the series, making it unnecessary for the farmer in the milking parlor to stop his work to replace the filled containers.

WINS CORN GROWING HONORS



Hereford, Texas (Special)-DeKalb Corn King William Pittner (above), Deaf Smith County farmer, won top honors in Texas with his yield of 115.50 bushels per acre in the 1950 National DeKalb Selected 5-Acre Corn Growing Contest. Entered in the Junior Division of the DeKalb Contest, Pittner is the first Junior entry to win top state honors in the history of DeKalb's Corn Growing Contests.

Pittner's winning crop was produced on a selected 5-acre contest plot that had been in cotton the year before. The land was watered and listed, and DeKalb Seed Corn Variety 1002 was drilled in 371/2 inch rows. Even though it was dry all through the Winter and Spring, the use of irrigation and commercial fertilizer - plus good DeKalb Corn—produced the championship yield—over 5 times the size of the average corn yield produced in Texas in 1950, according to U.S.D.A.

The National DeKalb Corn Crown in the same contest was won by Horace Stanley, McClain County, Oklahoma farmer, with a yield of 175.32 bushels per acre. The average yield for the 3,441 entries in the 1950 DeKalb contest was 94.95 bushels per acre, all made on selected 5-acre contest plots.

Garbage Collecting Is A Cooperative Affair

AUSTIN, TEXAS-"All citiens must cooperate with their neighbors and local authorities if Texas' towns and countryside are to be kept free of unsightly and health-menacing accumulations of garbage and rubbish," warns Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Of-

"Since garbage, rubbish and other types of refuse are of no value to the producer, by the same token they are of no value to a neighbor. Everyone is responsible for the waste materials which he produces and is under obligation to collect, store and dispose of these materials in a sanitary manner. The officials of every municipality or other political subdivision encounter the problem of collecting and disposal of waste materials discarded by their res-

"Improper disposal of refuse presents definite hazards to public health for such material create breeding places for rats, flies and other vectors of disease transmission. Odors, smoke and disagreeable appearance are other important considerations.

"The State Health Department and County Health Units are vitally interested in proper storage, collection and disposal of refuse and stand ready to aid towns or individuals in solving their problem. Receptacles for storage should be of water tight metal with lids that fit. Final disposal is a serious and difficult problem which individuals and communities must solve according to local conditions. Waste materials should never be dumped on property belonging to another person or or-
