

But some of the big unions say no union, no work. And it seems that the Wage Stabilization Board is going along with these union bosses. Just how long can our nation retain its freedom when we have such overlords in the labor field? Or maybe the people as a whole, and they still constitute the vast majority, will arise in their might and voting privilege, and set down on these union bosses so hard that they will not possess the freedom they now enjoy, or the protection of the laws of the land. Such things have happened before, and can happen again. When any minority group becomes so strong that they control the destinies of a nation, then that nation is getting ready for a downfall. Nearly all tightly organized groups will finally go to the extreme. They reach the point that they are not satisfied with the many benefits to their organization. They become ambitious to control everything and everybody. That is when danger lurks.

Since most poult diseases require the use of a microscope or laboratory facilities for an accurate diagnosis, he suggests calling in a trained veterinarian at the first sign of medium for the growth of this trouble. 

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
