BEHIND THE WALLS OF TEXAS STATE HOSPITALS

NOTE: This is one of a series of articles on our State Hospital System, prepared under the supervision of Dr. George W. Jackson, Medical Director of the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools, and sponsored by the Hogg Foundation for Mental Hygiene, University of Texas.

John L. Had an anniversary, but he didn't even know it.

Today was his twentieth anniversary. Twenty years since he had come to the State hospital, brought in handcuffed to the sheriff, brought in like an animal going to the stock yards.

There was hardly anyone left who remembered John L. back in the city where he used to live, time had washed over, leaving the sands of his existence naked and unmarked.

Twenty years ago he had been a young man, newly-married, hard-working. Twenty years ago there had been a wife with blue-black hair and a son, a son with blue eyes and a dimple on his chin. There had been work and love and laughter.

But love had died and laughter had disappeared the night the gay little wife had gone off with another man, leaving the baby crying and wet in his crib.

John L. had found that one couldn't be father and mother to an infant — and still drive trucks across the country. Without a mother, without sisters, he could not bring up the son who held his dreams and his immortality in his two fat hands.

The son had gone to strangers. And John had come, eventually, to this crowded, sweat-filled room.

Twenty years! The face of the world had changed. Wars consuming the earth (and John L.'s son fighting overseas), jet planes streaking across the skies, inventions making it possible to cross space, great and horrible men rising to power.

In twenty years nothing was the same — nothing but John L. and the men and women like him.

John lay curled up in his bed in the ward, curled up and motionless like a bear who has hibernated for the winter and forgotten it was spring.

Dr. M. stepped briefly into the ward. He could still feel the sun,

warm on the back of his neck. But in the ward the air was chilled. There was the feeling of hopelessness, of dark corners where sunlight would never touch.

He stopped at John L.'s bed and gazed at the middle-aged man in the khaki pants and shirt, the whiskered face, the helpless hands.

And Dr. M. clenched his fists and wished that he could will time back for John, that he could have him now as a newly-committed patient. Fr. Dr. M. knew that in mental cases, as in surgery, speed in treatment is essential. If John had been treated with electrocoma when he first was admitted, he would have had a 90% chance of recovery. After two years, the chance dropped to 25%. After five years to less than 5%.

Dr. M. did some quick arithmetic in his head. If cost \$2 per day per patient, the State had already expended almost \$15,000 on John. He shook his head. And some taxpayers complained that electrocoma and insulin therapy cost money!

He hurried through the rest of the ward. There were so many other wards, needing so much attention. He rubbed his hand wearily across his eyes. A little attention would mean so much to some of the patients, a little time

to talk. But there was no time. There were not nearly enough doctors, not nearly enough hours in every day.

The doctor crossed the stubby grass over to Ward 6. But there was progress being made. Patients were being processed faster so that treatment could start immediately. And there was more insulin therapy being gused more refresher courses for the doctors, more consultation staff or specialists, better laboratory equipment. And on the physical care side, the operating rooms were being improved, restraint curtailed, constructive activity for patients begun.

Begun! That was the word. Everything had only begun. And there was so much yet to do. Group therapy. Better treatment centers. More recreation. More trained doctors.

Dr. M.'s footsteps hurried a little more as he went to the next ward. His work, too, had only begun.

The overall re-evaluation and expansion of diagnostic care and treatment techniques has changed many phases of our State hospital operation.

But there are multitudes of things which need to be done to bring the best care and the quickest recovery to our State hospital patients.

Don't ask John L. He was too late.

But ask Dr. M. He knows.

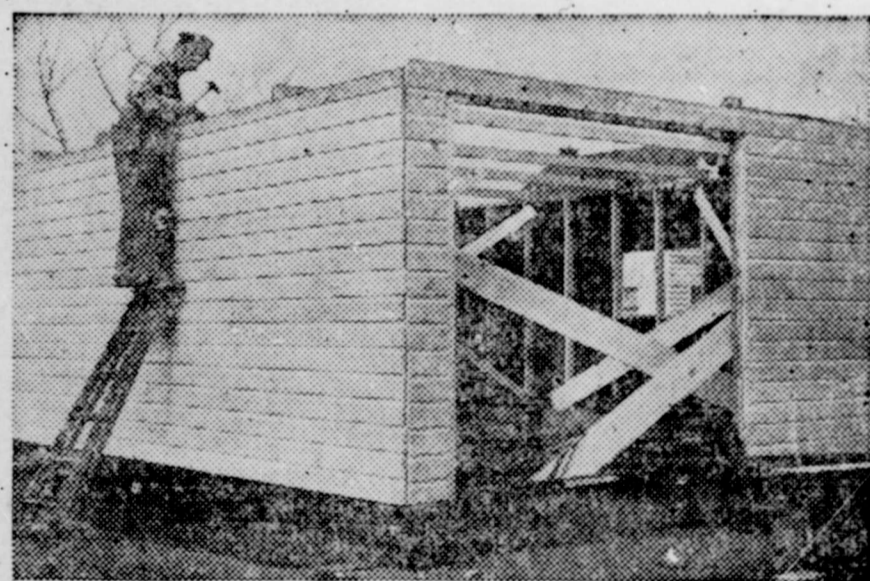

Charter Commission Election

ELECTION NOTICE
The State of Texas
City of Brownfield
County of Terry

An Ordinance ordering an election to determine whether a Commission shall be chosen to frame a new Home Rule

Charter and providing for a Charter Commission.

On this the 4th day of December, A. D. 1952, the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Terry County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall of the City of Brownfield, Texas, the following members present: Homer W. Nelson, Mayor, Herman Chesshir, Councilman, V. L. Patterson, Councilman, Henry Chisholm, Councilman, and Sam Murphy, Councilman.

Among the other business transacted, was the following: Councilman Herman Chesshir introduced the following ordinance calling for an election to determine the question: "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a New Home Rule Charter?", and if a majority of the qualified voters voting on said question shall have voted in the affirmative providing for the election from the City at Large of a Commission of fifteen members to be known as the Charter Commission, and after the same was read in full, on motion of Councilman Herman Chesshir and seconded by Councilman V. L. Patterson, the Ordinance was passed and adopted by a vote of five (5) for its passage, to a vote of none against its passage: Mayor Homer W. Nelson, Councilman Herman Chesshir, Councilman V. L. Patterson, Councilman Sam Murphy voting for its passage and none voting against its passage.

CHARTER, AND FOR A SECOND ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER THE CHARTER SO DRAWN SHALL BE ADOPTED, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas, on the 4th day of December, 1952, held at the regular meeting place thereof, in the City Hall of said City, on motion of Councilman Herman Chesshir, seconded by Councilman V. L. Patterson, it was resolved, by unanimous vote of the City Council, to-wit: Homer W. Nelson, Mayor, Herman Chesshir, Councilman, V. L. Patterson, Councilman, Henry Chisholm, Councilman, and Sam Murphy, Councilman, that an ordinance be prepared submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Brownfield, the question, "Shall a commission be chosen to frame a New Home Rule Charter?" for the City of Brownfield, Terry County, Texas.

SECTION II. That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, governing special Elections and all persons qualified to vote in said City shall be allowed to vote.

SECTION III. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas, governing Special Elections.

SECTION IV. That the form of ballot to be used in said election shall conform to the laws of the State of Texas, governing same and be substantially as follows: SHALL A COMMISSION BE CHOSEN TO FRAME A NEW CHARTER?

Answer "Yes" "NO"

For the following named persons to constitute the Charter Commission, not more than fifteen in number.

15. T. A. Hicks, Jr.

SECTION V. Those desiring to vote for the proposition: "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a New Home Rule Charter?" shall strike out the word "No" and those desiring to vote against the proposition: "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a New Home Rule Charter?" shall strike out the word "Yes".

SECTION VI. In either event the voter will then vote for a Charter Commission of the fifteen members to serve in case a majority of the voters at this election have voted in the affirmative. The above list has been selected by the City Council as a Charter Commission and should a voter desire to vote against any and all of the above named persons, he may do so by scratching the name of such person and writing opposite such name the name of the person for whom he desires to vote, provided that a failure to so name a Charter Commission shall not invalidate the vote as to the question "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a New Home Rule Charter?"

SECTION VII. That should a majority of the qualified voters voting at said election vote in the affirmative as to the question "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a New Home Rule Charter?", then, after the Commission has completed its work and submitted the new Charter, that a second election will be held, at the date designated by the Charter Commission in conformity with law, to determine whether the new Charter shall be adopted.

SECTION VIII. A copy of this Ordinance, signed by the Mayor of the City of Brownfield and Attested by the Secretary of the City, shall serve as a proper notice of the election to be held as herein ordered on the 20th day of January, 1953. The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause notice of said election to be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places in the City of Brownfield, Texas, for at least thirty (30) full days prior to the date of the election. 
