Swindling Charge Is Filed Against Young Cisco Man

Charges of swindling in connection with giving a worthless check had been filed Saturday against O. M. Speegle, Cisco, 25, according to Sheriff J. B. Williams of Eastland County. The youth had been arrested in Ft Worth, and the sheriff left for that city early Saturday to re-turn him to this county.

Sheriff Williams said that Speegle had been the object of a search for three weeks after allegedly purchasing 38 cows and calves with a check for \$4,800 written on an Eastland bank. The youth then sold the cows in Ft. Worth for \$4,300. With two companions, whom he had met in Ft. Worth, Speegle began a threeweeks' tour of the south, going as far as Florida, the sheriff said.





### Independence Day, 1948.

One hundred and seventy-two years ago the ringing of the Liberty Bell announced to mankind the birth of a nation founded upon freedom and justice. To our forefathers freedom was a heritage so precious that, without it, life was not worth living.

But today, we in America must guard against taking liberty for vacancy). granted and regarding it as a natural state of man. We must face the fact that there are forces at work which are striving to deprive us of those fundamental rights for which many brave men have fought and died. They seek to return us to those dark days when our people were subject to the whims of tyrants.

The origin of these forces lies in foreign lands where people live in poverty, in misery, and in fear. They come from countries which call themselves democracies, but where a citizen may not own land He may not stay away from work without good and sufficient reasons. He may not employ anyone to work for him. He does not have freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, or freedom of religion and his press and radio are censored by his government.

Surely, with a knowledge of these facts, the American people are too wise, too alert and too intelligent to be taken in by the promises and propaganda of alien doctorines, no matter how subtle or cleves they may be.

This belief in our strength may, in fact, be our weakness. Many of our people simply do not realize that liberty is not a permanent possession but must be cherished and protected.

The subversive termites who are boring peristently at the foundation of our way of life are counting on our overconfidence to lull us into a coma of smug security so that they can pursue their plans to replace our republican form of government with a modern form of despotism. We think it can't happen here, but they think it can.

Now is the time for every American to take a long and searching look at the rest of the world and ask himself this question, "Is there any other country where I could be better off than here?" If 11:00 a.m. the anwer is "Yes," then he is free to go and live in that country. If the answer is "No." then he should take a more active and personal part in stopping the efforts of those who are trying to import some other country's way of life and impose it on us.

On Independence Day this year, let us consider the spiritual freedom, the personal liberties, and the material possessions which we enjoy. Let us compare our American way of life with that of people who live under other forms of government. Let us turn our thoughts to those founding fathers who risked their all to win for us the right to work, to worship, to speak and to live as we choose. And let us ask Divine Providence to instill into our hearts that dauntless spirit of 1776 so that we, too, will have the strength and the wisdom to preserve and to protect the priceless b ing of freedom for our selves and for the generations to come
