Our Pacific Trust.

Saipan, Truk, Bikini are familiar names, but who has heard of Lib, Ngoli, Kapingamarangi? They are all within what is now the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. This Trust Territory, compris ing the Marshall, Caroline, and Mariana groups of islands, extends about a thousand miles north from the equator and includes a great part of the area from Hawaii to the Philippines - two million square miles of water surrounding a myriad of tiny and larger tropical is lands. Only 117 of them are inhabited by a total of 50,000 natives of Polynesian or Micronesian extraction. Formerly under German control, they were mandated to Japan following World War 1 and are now under our official wing.

Placed under Naval Military government following the conclusion of World War II, a program for bettering conditions was immediately started. Every village, no matter how small, over this vast area, was officially visited and complete data gathered.

It was determined that what was needed was not military domination but friendly aid and cooperation to help these people become self-reliant, establish better health and sanitation, elementary education, safeguard their lands and resuorces, develop their trade, industry and agriculture, and the physical restoration of war damaged property.

For the past two years, this plan has been materializing under the able guidance of Rear Admiral C. H. Wright. Dubbed as the "Admiral of the Atolls," he is highly regarded by the natives of the whole

Vaccination and immunization is provided. Yaws is under control and anti-tubercular work is progressing. Native medical and dental practitioners and nurses are being trained. Seven dispensaries of from 25 to 80-bed capacity are located throughout the area. A training program is supplying native teachers for island schools. A trading system provides them with needed goods, while at the same time marketing their produce - principally copra and handicraft. These are just a few of the things accomplished or underway.

A most admirable phase of this whole program is that the natives are not asking for or getting handouts. We are giving them medical assistance and help in instances of calamity, but otherwise they are rapidly getting on their own.

A truly commendable operation, the Navy is carrying it out speedily, efficiently, without fanfare, and withdrawing its official hand as rapidly as circumstances permit

Doing The Job.

According to news reports and statements by leading authorities, world production of oil is catching up with demand. From the stand point of personal comfort and convenience this means more to the citizens of the United States than to those of any country, for the is lights and water.

Our country's ability to cope with the petroleum supply, now and in the coming winter, is viewed with cautious but definite optimism today by government official and the industry's spokesmen. There seems to be general belief that the margin between steadily increasing demand and full-scale production is slim, but that the critical petroleum situation appears to be "over the hump" barring unfort-

World supply will keep pace with world demand if several assumptions work out. The most important is that crude oil can be refined and shipped where it is needed. There must be peace in the great producing areas of theworld. Enough equipment must be available for drilling and expanding crude production to meet the goals. Refining capacity must be increased, particularly abroad. Tankers must be built; oil pipe lines must be laid.

American oil companies can and will do their part of the job unless they are prevented by conditions entirely beyond their control.














