OUT HERE by Ron Carr

They say public service is a high and noble calling.

It is also just a job. We hear politicians brag about their "38 years of public service" like it was a supreme sacrifice. They work for a government. You work in the private sector. They put on their clothes and go to work, they have good benefits, good retirement, lots of holidays and vacation time, and they want us to hold them in higher esteem than common workers because of something called public service.

"I've spent my entire life in public service" they like to crow. So what.

I've spent my entire life working. I've had two or three different careers, traveled the world, made a lot of money, lost a lot of money, bought and sold houses, traded cars, voted and paid taxes. I was married a total of 30 years to three different wives. Those unions produced five marvelous, wonderful, beautiful children.

I've had about every salary range imaginable and spent many of my working years without good medical insurance. I am not proud of everything I have done but overall life has worked out pretty well. I turn 65 in October. Those that bet against me ever reaching 65 will soon have to pay up. The Medicare mailings have already begun arriving.

I am doing something I enjoy, my mother and brother live nearby, there is no wife taking up my space at home, and I manage to peeve a few people on occasion. Life is good. The only way it could be any better I guess is if I had donated myself to public service.

Don't get me wrong. I appreciate the men and women who keep our highways drivable. I appreciate the Troopers that pa-

trol those highways and do their best to keep us safe, often risking their own safety.

I appreciate the public service employees that pick up stray animals and fix water leaks. And the ones that register our vehicles and collect child support. And the Railroad Commissioner and prison guards. We need public service workers.

What I don't appreciate is the attitude that a public service job is any more or less noble and important than all the rest of our jobs.

I appreciate the students that work afternoons at the drug store and grocery. I appreciate those friendly faces that hand me burgers through the drive-in window, the nurses at the hospital, and the clerks at the flower shop and department store.

The big difference between public service employees and the private sector is where the money comes from to pay salaries. When you work for the government your money comes from taxpayers. You are locked in to a pay scale that caps the salary in your pay grade. State employee compensation is authorized by the Texas Legislature. To get raises they have to convince politicians then hope the politicians can find the money.

Because of noncompetitive pay and sagging benefits, employee turnover has become a problem for Texas. We received a magazine and news release from the Texas Public Employees Association (TPEA). It has a few interesting facts in it:

There are around 240,000 state employees in Texas. Providing medical benefits for state employees will hit \$2 billion in 2004.

The legislature has granted only three across-the-board raises to state employees in the last 11 years.

It Is Just A Job

In 2003, the legislature faced a budget deficit and reduced the amount the state pays for employee medical premiums, costing state employees \$900 more to be insured.

The TPEA wants an across the board increase for state employees. A raise of 3.5% would require \$98 million. The TPEA wants 4.5%. And a guaranteed minimum monthly dollar increase in both 2006 and 2007.

The big reason? They say the state employee turnover rate last year was 17.4%. They say the 2003 turnover rate cost Texas at least \$267 million in recruiting and training costs. They don't like to lose employees. But in 2003 they offered state employees generous incentives to retire as soon as eligible.

Workers do need raises based on performance, seniority, job skills, and a variety of other considerations, including profit. I don't have much sympathy for the plight of public service employees. When you take a job that depends on taxes, and politicians, you take a career risk. You saddle up going in for a set pay scale. Sort of a financial straightjacket.

A lot of Texas citizens work hard, have no health insurance, struggle to keep patches on the old pickup's tires and feed the kids. Many of them make less than state employees and their chances of improvement are slim.

Here is the positive side: if 17% of state employees are quitting every year, that leaves a lot of openings for folks who want to get on the bandwagon and grab for their own public service gold ring.

A job as a public servant can be a good thing. But it is still just a job.

Lowering the Cost of Rx Drugs

Prevacid to treat your heartburn, \$161; Celebrex for your muscle pain, \$104; Zocor to combat high cholesterol, \$120...the next time you're at your local pharmacy calculating these costs for just a one-month supply of your prescription drugs, know that lower prices may be on the way. Last year the President signed into law the Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement and Modernization Act of 2003, bringing sweeping reform to an antiquated system desperately in need of an overhaul. The marquis provision of the legislation was a prescription drug program, which will go into effect on January 1, 2006. But Texas seniors don't have to wait until then for relief.

Starting this June, seniors can receive a discount card that will provide them with access to negotiated prices on prescription drugs. Enrollment is now open for the cards that will expire in 2006 when the more comprehensive Medicare benefit takes effect. More than 2.3 million Texans are currently Medicare participants, but a quarter of those beneficiaries do not have any prescription drug coverage. This program primarily benefits them by halving pay for the lifesaving drugs they need. Medicare estimates seven million beneficiaries, including 497,000 in Texas, will participate in the program. If participation reaches those levels, it will mean a potential savings of \$8.6 billion nationally and \$596 million for Texans.

Who is Eligible?

The cards will provide a \$600 annual credit to eligible low-income Medicare beneficiaries. Individuals whose income is less than \$12,569 each year or married couples whose income is less than \$16,862 may qualify for this additional help. Those with outpatient prescription drug coverage through TRICARE, FEHBP or other employer sponsored drug plans will not be eligible for the \$600 credit. Medicare will cover the cost of the enrollment fee for these low-income cardholders and the Department of Health and Human Services will work aggressively to reach eligible low-income beneficiaries and enroll as many as possible in the new program.

Texas has 46 individual drug cards, including 39 national drug cards, four regional cards,

and three Medicare Advantage exclusive cards. Using only their zip code, seniors can obtain information on plans available in their area, compare prices for drugs and identify pharmacies associated with the available card programs.

How to Choose a Discount Drug Card

This program offers a wide range of choices, which can be a mixed blessing. Numerous options enable Texans to find the card that best fits their needs, but it can also make for a confusing decision process. I encourage Texas seniors to do their research and take advantage of the right plan for them, because the choice they make now will last through the end of the year. Following these simple instructions will help:

1. Eligible beneficiaries will be limited to one Medicare-approved card. Toll-free operators and Medicare's Web site will assist seniors in selecting which card best fits their needs. (See below for contact number.)

2. Before calling or applying online, seniors should make a list of the medications that they take regularly as well as financial information to determine if they are eligible for the \$600 credit.

3. Medicare then will help seniors compare prices among cards, taking into account factors like frequency of medicines taken, possibility of generic substitutes, as well as preference for a local pharmacy or mail order depending on convenience concerns.

4. Once seniors have selected a card, they should request an enrollment form from the card sponsor. Card providers may charge an annual enrollment fee up to \$30. However, many sponsors have opted to waive the fee or have reduced its price. In addition, there is no enrollment fee for those beneficiaries who qualify for the \$600 credit.

5. Most importantly, seniors should always look for the "Medicare-approved" seal when receiving their card in the mail.

For help in comparing options of finding out how to enroll in the discount card program, Texans should call 1-800-MEDICARE and ask about "drug savings" or visit the information superhighway at www.medicare.gov and select "Prescription Drug and Other Assistance Programs."

Budget Shift Needed To Ease Textbook Crisis

When schools reopen for the fall, Texas schoolchildren may not have the textbooks and other educational materials they need, because the State is out of money.

The educators responsible for ordering and delivering textbooks are calling on the Legislative Budget Board and Governor Rick Perry to recognize the textbook crisis and reallocate funds.

"We are in a crisis, whether the Legislature meets again or not, whether any court decides a lawsuit or not. We're not talking about some hazy future problem," said Laurie Mankin, president of the Textbook Coordinators' Association of Texas.

"We're talking about right now—today."

Mankin said that unless the money for textbooks is found and orders are placed soon, either books won't arrive in time or local coordinators won't have enough time to process materials to get them into the hands of schoolchildren on that first day of school.

In the 2003 legislative session, lawmakers lopped off about \$218 million from the instructional materials request from the State Board of Education.

Of the \$434 million that was

appropriated, \$75 million was contingent on increased receipts of the Motor Fuels Tax after tinkering with its collection method and contingent on the Texas Education Agency shuffling \$15 million within its budget.

Last week, the State comptroller's office said the real figure from the Motor Fuels Tax is less than \$8 million, leaving the state's textbook bill about \$60 million in the hole.

If that doesn't change, that means there will not be enough state money for books for new enrollment or to open new campuses. There will not be enough money for new biology books. There will not be enough money

for English-as-a-Second-Language materials for Grades 3 to 5.

Mankin said, "At this point, there is no coordinator in the state who can look a parent in the eye and say for-100 percent-certain, 'Your kid will have all the textbooks he needs this fall.'"

Each school district and open enrollment charter school in Texas is required to have a textbook coordinator responsible for ordering, inventorying, and distributing textbooks and other educational material. The Textbook Coordinators' Association of Texas represents coordinators serving more than three million schoolchildren.

THE CHIEF'S CORNER

Drug Arrest

There are no safe havens from the scourge of drugs—no communities, however affluent, no schools, and no families. Sometimes that fact of life is easy to forget. It's so much more comfortable to live with the fiction that drug abuse is someone else's problem, than to deal with the sad reality that it is everyone's problem. Good kids from good families, in good neighborhoods, are not exempt.

This is a community problem that affects the lives of us all, in some capacity; we must all do our part to rid our community of illegal drugs and of those who choose to sell illegal drugs.

Recently the Friona Police Department received information pertaining to a number of people selling illegal drugs in the community. Anytime the police department receives this type of

information we take it very seriously and intend to take steps to follow up on it.

A part of the information received was that Ernesto Manual Milles was selling drugs out of his residence at 911 Ashland Street. Lt. Salinaz, Officer Martin, and I went to the residence and contacted Milles. After talking to Milles, a search of his residence was conducted and items were seized from the residence for evidence.

Milles was arrested for the offenses of possession of marijuana, possession of a dangerous drug, and possession of a controlled substance.

Other arrests are yet to come, due to more information being gathered through the arrest of Milles.

This information and arrest is just one of many that are on the Friona Police Department's

list of people living in the community, trying to make a livelihood off of selling illegal drugs.

The police department intends to keep investigating each tip that it receives and make it very challenging for this type of goings-on to take place within our community; however, the entire community must get involved and keep furnishing beneficial information for the police department to be successful.

I would like to stress the necessity of greater citizen action. Vigilant residents and neighborhood watch programs are key enforcement tools that can help police to track down and arrest drug dealers and pushers.

Call the police department to

report suspicious activity. It could help prevent your child from getting hooked on drugs. Casting the net from all corners of the community—churches, schools, homes, law enforcement, and workplaces—can help make Friona drug-free. Working together we can make a difference, one person at a time.

The Friona Police Department knows who is selling drugs in this community, and will continue to work at arresting these unprincipled individuals. I am sure there are those individuals in the community who believe they can continue to sell and distribute illegal drugs, but it is just a matter of time before we knock on their door with a search warrant.

Friona PD Receives Grant From DOJ

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) will award a grant of \$1,408.46 to the City of Friona under the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program, U.S. Senator John Cornyn announced. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) approved the payment for the purchase of body armor to help protect local law enforcement.

The legislation authorizing the grants mandates that priority in awarding grants be given to jurisdictions with populations under 100,000. As a result, nearly all of the \$24.2 million in funding this year will be awarded to grantees in smaller localities.

"Texas law enforcement is the finest in the nation, and

I've been honored to work closely with so many of them on both the state and federal level," Cornyn said. "Through my travels in the state, and the roundtables I've held with first responders in cities large and small, I'm confident that local, state, and federal authorities must work together as partners to support and protect this critical layer of our homeland security."

More than 4,700 applications for vest grants will be funded nationwide by the BJA this year. Federal payment can provide up to 50 percent of each jurisdiction's costs, including costs associated with purchasing and shipping the vests.

The National Cotton Council is still looking for applicants interested in being part of the 2004-05 Cotton Leadership Class.

NCC will accept applications from qualified U.S. industry members through July 1, 2004 and anyone interested in applying can visit the Cotton Leadership Program's web site at <http://leadership.cotton.org> to review the program curriculum, eligibility requirements, and download the application.

The NCC's Cotton Leadership Program seeks to identify potential industry leaders and provide them leadership training.

The course is comprised of five sessions conducted across the Cotton Belt. Participants will visit with industry leaders; observe production, processing and research activities; and meet with lawmakers and government agency representatives during a visit to Washington, DC. Participants will also attend the NCC's annual meeting and its mid-year board of directors meeting.

The program, now in its 21st year, is supported by a grant to The Cotton Foundation from DuPont Crop Protection and is managed by NCC's Member Services department. The 10-member leadership class is comprised of four producers and one participant from each of the other six industry segments.

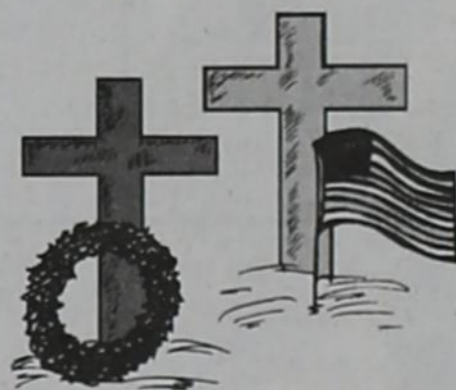
