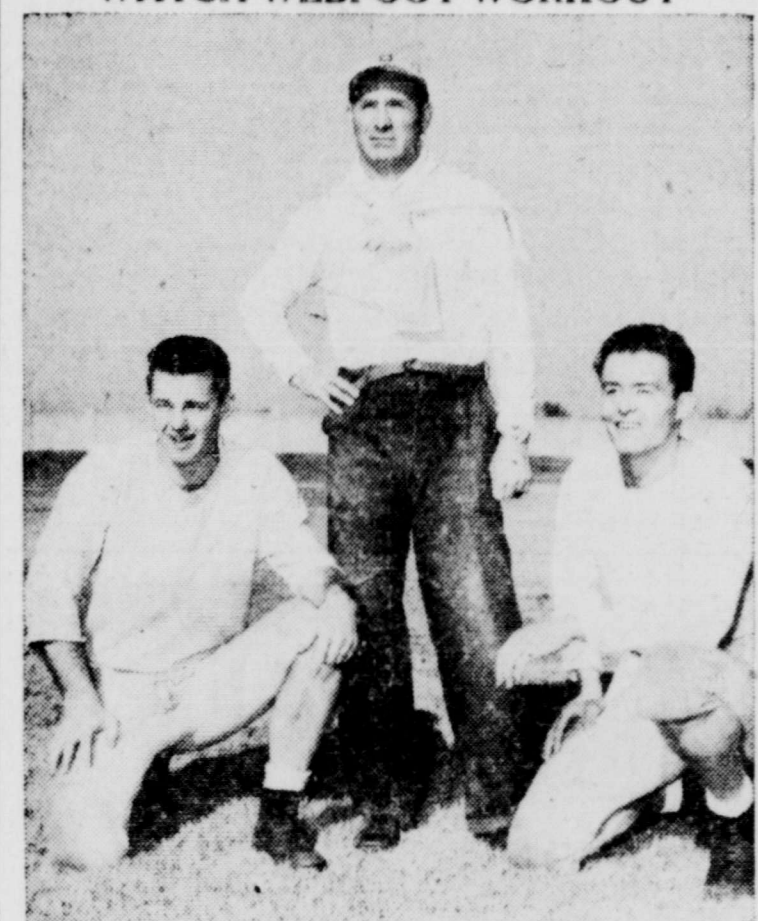

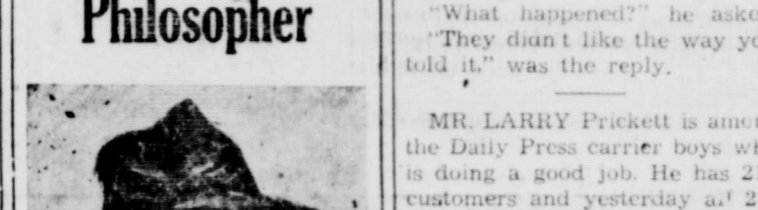

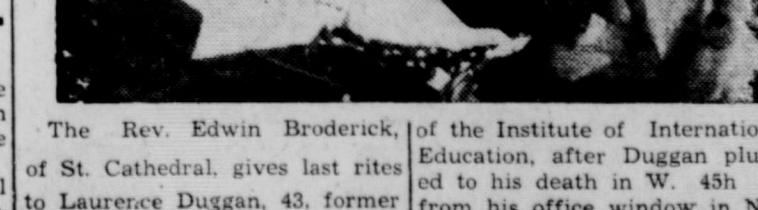

Cisco Soldiers To Return Home From Overseas Duty

PARIS, France, Dec. 22—Private First Class Robert B. Carswell, of 707 East 23rd Street, Cisco, Texas, is expected to return soon to the United States having completed his European tour of duty, it was announced here today. Private Carswell is currently assigned to the U. S. temporary Military Cemetery at Neuville-en-Condroz under the First Zone of the American Graves Registration Command, with headquarters at Liege, Belgium.

The First Zone, American Graves Registration Command, is responsible in northwestern continental Europe for the United States Army's searching and cemeterial operations, and its present program to return to the homeland those U. S. dead of World War II whose next of kin request. The First Zone which includes the battle fields of the 1944-45 campaign covers Belgium and The Netherlands. In these countries were established seven temporary U. S. World War II Military Cemeteries in which 51, 155 American dead were formerly interred. From the First Zone were returned the first U. S. dead of World War II from the former European Theater area—5,600 who left Antwerp on October 4, 1947.

Private Carswell is the son of Mrs. Willie M. Carswell, who also maintains residence at the Cisco address.

National Guard Unit Gets Gun

155mm howitzer arrived by caravan Monday morning for the 961st Field Artillery battery located on the Cisco Junior College campus a spokesman for the armory said here today.

The gun was dispatched to the local command from the San Antonio supply depot and will be used by guardsmen for gunnery training. The 155mm, one of the largest field pieces made for the army, is capable of projecting a 5-inch shell eight miles away.

Here through the Texas National National Guard program, the howitzer will be one of three to be assigned for training at the armory.

Recent Rains Are Beneficial To Grains and Pasture

Prospects for small grains cover crops and pastures were improved over most of the eastern half of the State as drought conditions were partially relieved by light to moderate rains. Moisture was sufficient in these areas to germinate small grains that were not yet sprouted and crops that were up to a stand were making some growth. More rain is still needed over much of this area. The wheat crop was holding out well in the northern three tiers of counties in the High Plains, but in the southern High Plains and most of the Low Rolling Plains, the crop was suffering as the dry weather continued.

Winter pasture feed prospects improved over the eastern half of the State as light rains temporarily relieved the critical drought. Rain was generally too light to be of lasting benefit except in central Blackland and northeastern counties where some run-off partially replenished stock water supplies. Clovers, rescue grass and small grains were making renewed growth in the area favored by rain, but more rain as needed over practically the entire state. Wheat was supplying fair to good pasture in the northern two tiers of Panhandle counties, but elsewhere in the main wheat areas wheat pasture was limited. Supplemental feeding continued over most of the state.

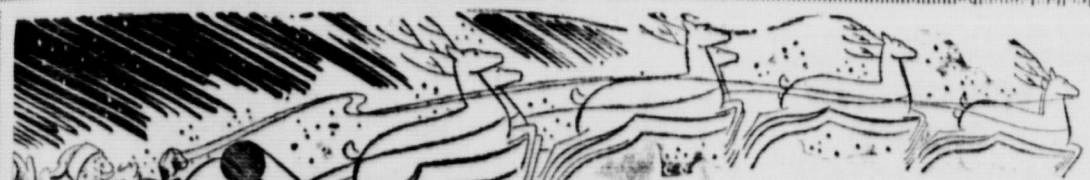
