Friona ISD Receives Awards

Nearly 60 percent (59.2) of school districts and 46 percent of the campuses in Texas were recently recognized by the Texas Education Agency with one or more Gold Performance Acknowledgments (GPA) during the first year of the new recognition program.

"In 2001 the Texas Legislature enacted the Gold Performance Acknowledgment system to acknowledge districts and campuses for high performance on additional indicators that do not affect accountability ratings," said Commissioner of Education Felipe Alanis. "We are extremely proud of these school districts and their campuses, for they have worked hard to maintain exceptional, well-rounded instructional programs while faced with the implementation of new statewide education reforms. The Gold Performance Acknowledgment System is one way that TEA can recognize our public schools for the strides they are making in numerous areas that are critical to the academic success of our students and therefore, to the future of our state."

Friona ISD campus-awards included the high school with 2 awards for attendance and advanced academic course completion, as well as the junior high campus for attendance rate and Algebra I exam results.

Local FHS '02 Grad Receives College Board Scholar Award

Roy Loya, a 2002 graduate of Friona High School, has earned the designation of AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of his exceptional achievement on the college-level AP Exams. Almost 14 percent of the more than 900,000 high school students in 14,000 secondary schools worldwide who took AP Exams performed at a sufficiently high level to merit the recognition of AP Scholar.

Students took the AP Exams in May 2002 after completing challenging college-level courses at their high schools. Loya qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP Examinations with grades of 3 or higher.

Most of the nation's colleges and universities award credit, advanced placement, or both based on

successful performance on the AP Exams. There are 34 AP exams offered in a wide variety of subject areas, each consisting of multiple choice and free response (essay or problem solving) questions.

The exams are scored on a scale of one through five with five being the highest. In the 2001-2002 school year Friona High School offered 6 AP courses in 3 subject areas. In May 2002 there were 56 FHS students who took 82 exams with their fees paid by Friona ISD. Of those 56 students there were 24 students who scored a three or higher on at least one exam.

The College Board is a national nonprofit membership association whose mission is to prepare, inspire, and connect students to college and opportunity. Each year, the College Board serves over three million students and their parents, 22,000 high schools, and 3,500 colleges through major programs and services in college admission, guidance, assessment, financial aid, enrollment and teaching and learning.

City Manager Opines About Tax Statements

In my last article to the newspaper, I discussed the rate increase for utilities and briefly mentioned the tax rate increase that would be coming. Well, it is here.

You have received your tax statements and understandably everyone is upset. The explanation is simple. The city borrowed \$3 million for water and sewer improvements. We expect to make the payments for this loan with revenues from the water and sewer departments.

But, this first year, until those revenues start coming in, we have to secure the loan with tax funds. This resulted in the tax increase for this year.

Next year when the water and sewer revenues have come in, we can make those payments and your tax rate will decrease dramatically.

The problem this year is that the tax rate and the utility increase both came at the same time. It seems that you are getting hit from both sides, all at once.

Friona, just like all other small cities, is constantly struggling to comply with unfunded federal mandates. The most recent is from the U.S. Environmental Protec-

tion Agency. As a result of new laws concerning the Homeland Security Act, each city must do a vulnerability assessment of their water system.

That is, how vulnerable is our water system to a terrorist attack and then to prepare a response plan that addresses the issues found in the assessment. By the year 2004, we have to have this plan in place.

It is still too early to tell but this could conceivably cost the city thousands of dollars to complete. We will have no choice but to pass these costs on to utility customers and to the taxpayers.

I am, however, including some information that some may find interesting as you sit down to write out your check for taxes this year.

The tax rate for the City of Friona is now \$0.8164 per \$100 valuation.

The average home value in the city is \$40,000. Using the \$0.8164 valuation on a \$40,000 home, taxes paid per year would be \$326.56, or \$27.22 per month.

The \$27.22 per month pays for the following city services:

24-hour police protection; 24-hour fire protection; 24-hour EMS services; maintenance of all public streets and alleys; street lights; library; cemetery maintenance; park facilities; animal control; building inspections and permitting; code enforcement; emergency and disaster management; municipal court administration; and recreational facilities such as the swimming pool, community center and utilities at baseball fields and tennis courts.

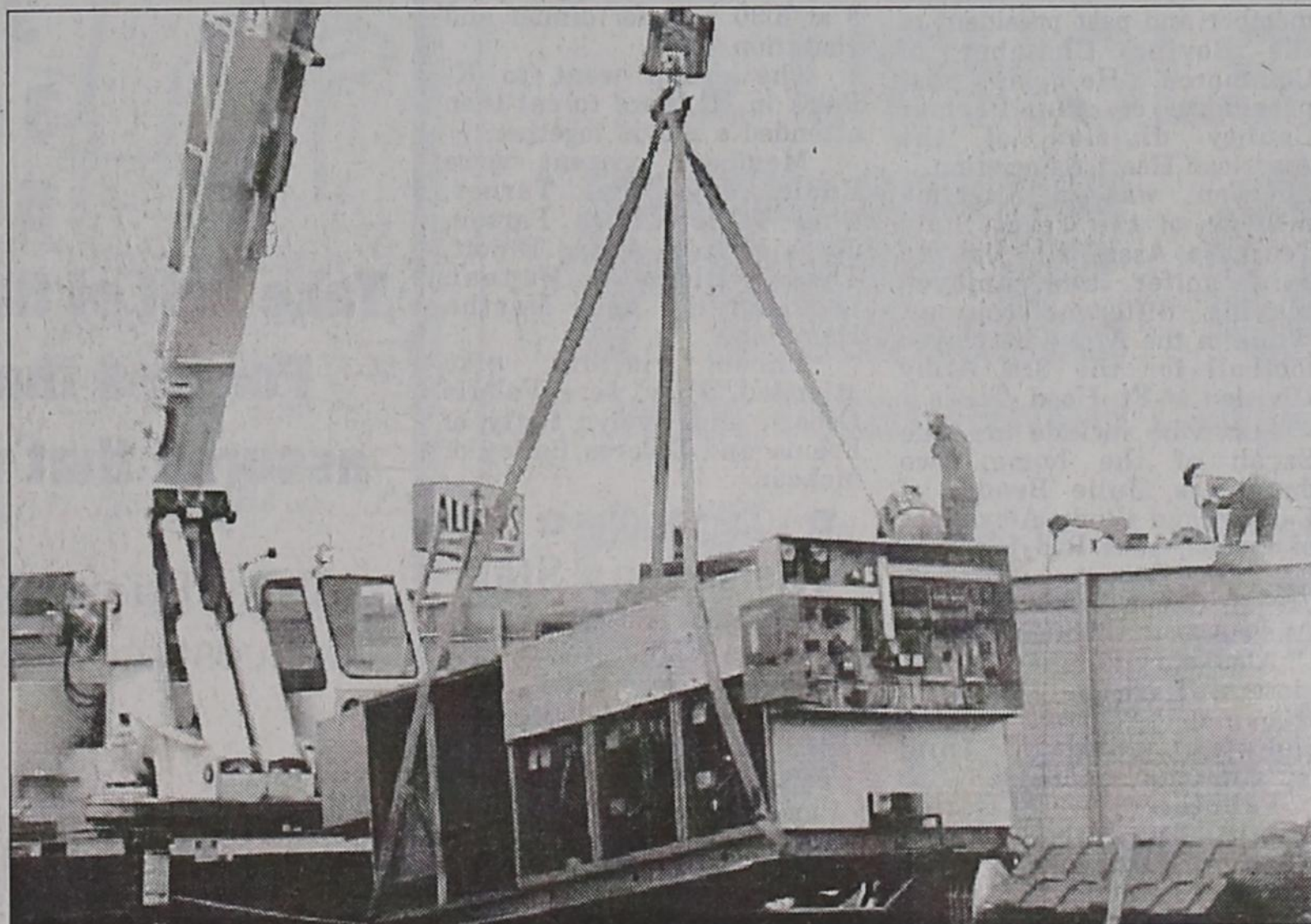
By comparison, basic cable TV services are \$30 per month.

Jones passed away Saturday, October 5, 2002, following a lengthy battle with cancer.

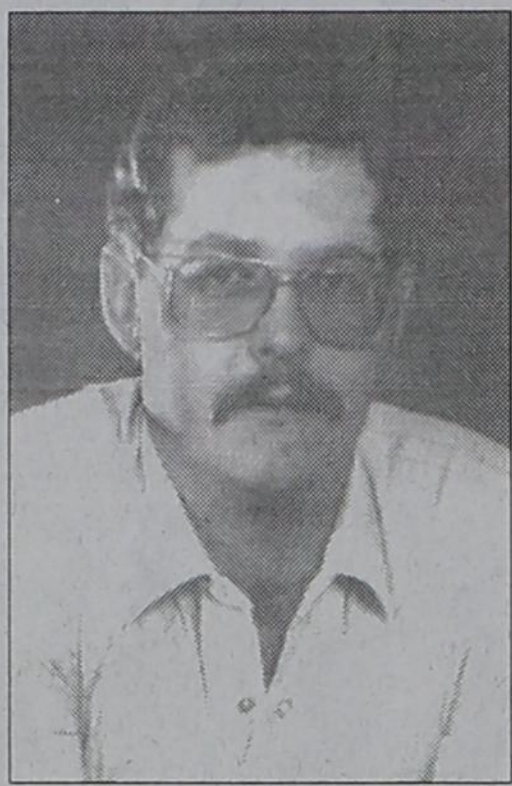
He was born July 19, 1958, in Tucson, Arizona. He married Donice Glover on December 1, 1984, in Friona.

Light and Owen turned the Friona grid program around, and when Light resigned to go into private business, Owen was elevated to the head coaching position, where he stayed seven years. He is third on the all-time winning list at Friona with a 32-23-1 record.

Owen came to Bovina in 1979, to become Superintendent of Schools. He was a member of the Bovina United Methodist Church, serving as church treasurer, and past chairman of the Administrative board.

He was a member and past president of the Bovina Lions Club and was a member and past president of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce. He was past president of the Parmer County division of the American Heart Association.

Owen was a lifetime member of the Texas State Teachers Assn. He was an avid golfer and enjoyed playing different courses. While in the Army, he played football for the 3rd Army Division at Ft. Hood, Texas.

Survivors include his wife Sarah of the home; two daughters, Julie Bender of Canyon and Cindy Alexander of Friona; sons Rod Owen of El Paso, Robert Alexander, Jr. of Corpus Christi; and Andy Alexander of Friona.

Also surviving are three sisters, Barbara Hobbs of Phoenix, Arizona; Betty Langford and JoAnne Wright, both of Olney.

70 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 12, 1932

The local board of school trustees is finding it a hard task to meet all financial obligations of the district and at the same time keep the school in operation until the current taxes begin coming in. It has been suggested that the board try to pay one-half of all salaries of teachers and bus drivers until more funds are received. It is hoped that all taxpayers who can possibly do so will meet their tax payments as soon as possible after November 1.

60 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 9, 1942

Ray Landrum, proprietor of the Regal Theatre, who is now employed at loading bombs at the Pan-Tex Ordnance Plant, came home Saturday evening and spent the weekend here with his family.

While in Friona this week, H.C. McCandless of Santa Anna, California, sold his residence pro-party here to Frank A. Spring.

50 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 10, 1952

Committeemen representing the 13 counties in the Hi-Plains Water Conservation District voted to require permits for drilling water wells and to leave well spacing in the hands of county committees. The action, taken at a meeting in the Hotel Jim Hill at Hereford October 2, was a followup of recommendations made at recent county meetings in the district. Only one dissenting report was presented against the well permit and spacing action. Parmer County farmers, committeeman Bruce Parr

reported, are opposed to any rule which would limit their freedom in drilling wells.

45 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 10, 1957

Easements for 7.2 miles of new farm-to-market road right-of-way has been arranged with property owners bordering the proposed road, reports E.G. Phipps, county commissioner. The road is planned to start at the Clyde Goodwine corner, extend to the Elmer Euler corner a mile east, then a mile south, and then about six miles east to the Claude Blackburn intersection.

40 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 11, 1962

It was a case of "almost but not quite" for the Friona Chiefs in their bid to snap the 21-game FHS losing streak last Friday at Happy. 10 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 10, 1992

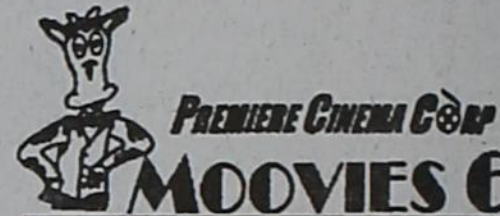
For the past several months, Friona's Excel Corporation has been wrestling with a touchy problem-one of bomb threats. Thanks to arrests made Wednesday by Parmer

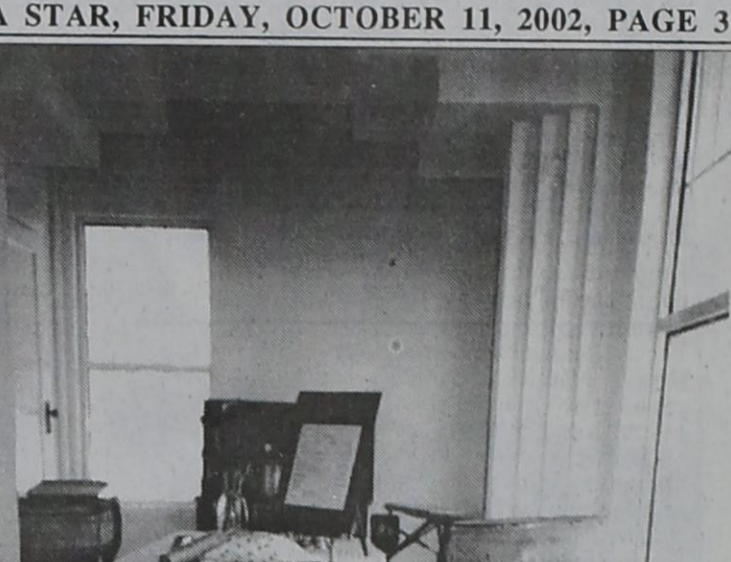
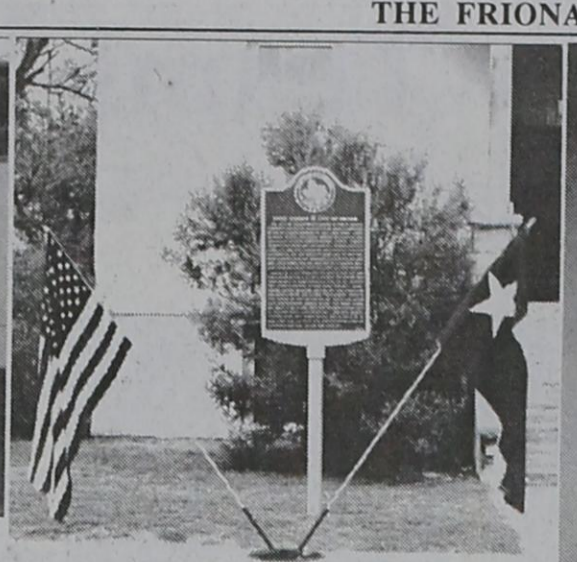
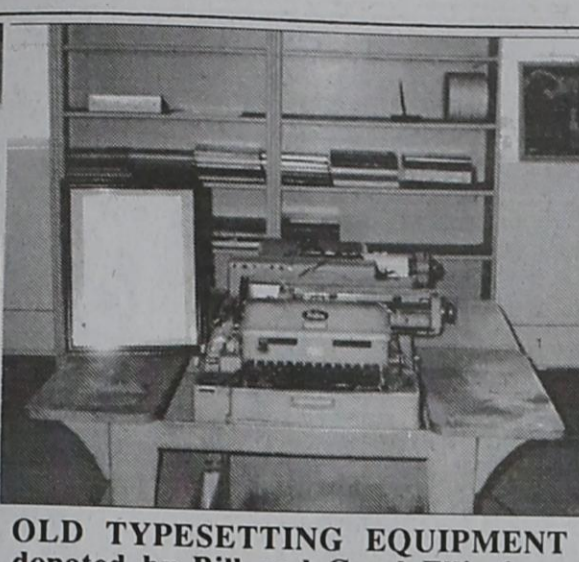

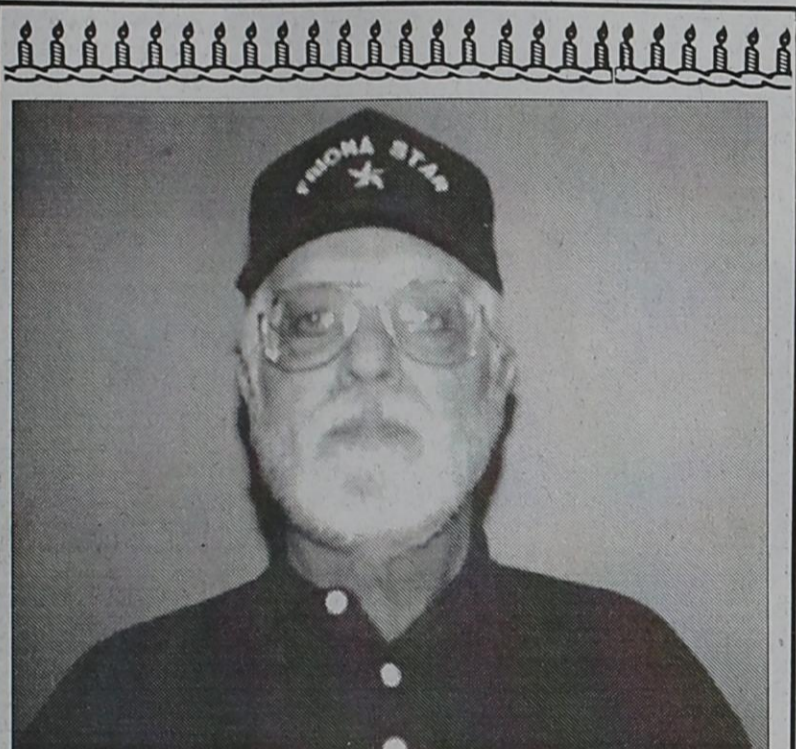

Nathan Haile Honors In On Rushing Mark

With one or two good runs on Friday night, senior running back Nathan Haile can become the all-time leader in yards gained rushing for Friona High School.

When Matthew Kendrick set the present record of 2,899 yards following the 1998 football season, the record had stood for 30 years.

Conversely, Nathan started to high school the following year, and began laying the groundwork for a new school record.

Kendrick set the record in basically two years on the varsity, having played just one game as a sophomore in 1966.

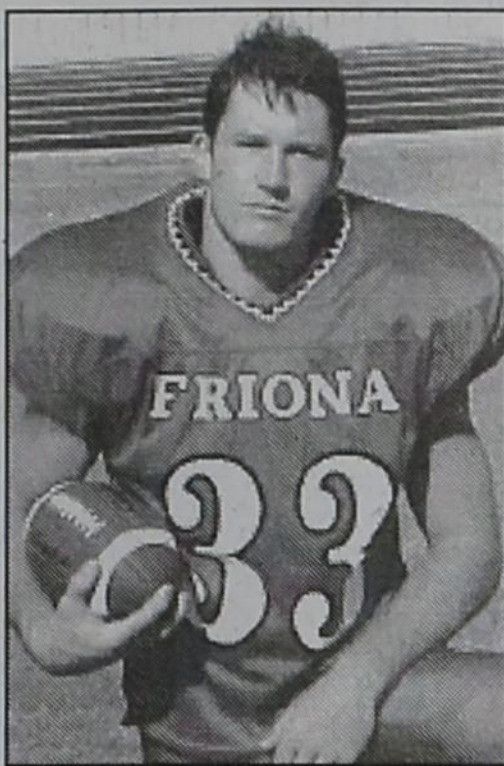
Haile has been in the starting backfield for three years, and has been the team's workhorse all three years. Haile has toted the pigskin 452 times going into Friday night's game.

Kendrick carried the ball 364 times in his varsity career, averaging 8.0 yards-per-carry.

Tony Perea, who held the school rushing record from 1968 until 1998, still holds the school record for a single season in the rushing department, gaining 1,761 yards in 1968.

Matt Kendrick is second to Perea in the single season category, gaining 1,624 yards in his junior year of 1997. Kendrick missed a couple of games down the stretch in '98 due to an injury.

On the accompanying chart are the top 13 rushing leaders, ranked by their total yardage gained.

It is striking that of all of those players, who represent a few hundred "ball carriers" at Friona High School, two of those listed are in the current Chieftain backfield.

Besides Haile, Adam Bandy also is listed as the number seven player on the list. Bandy has missed the first half of the season, due to a knee injury in pre-season play.

Not including Haile and Bandy, there are three other players from the 1990s, four from the 1980s, and two from the 1960s. None made the list from the 1970s, and rushing records are not available prior to 1962.

Chiefs/Whirlwinds: Favorites Tee Off

Back in August, the prognosticators had picked Floydada and Friona as the favorites when it came to District 5-2A this season.

Most of those "specialists" picked the Whirlwinds to finish first when the district season is over. The "Top of Texas" football book picked Friona as runnerup. Floydada was ranked 12th in the state pre-season by the Texas Football Magazine.

Others, such as the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, chose the Chieftains to finish third, behind both Floyd County teams--Floydada and Lockney.

Indeed, all three teams hit the "bye" week with identical 4-1 records. So now, something has to give.

The two teams face each other Friday, October 11, at Chieftain Field. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

"We think we're ready. It seems like a long time since our last game," said Chieftain coach Bob Ferguson. "We should be in better shape by having the time off. I hope there is no 'momentum loss'

because of the off week," he added.

"It should be an exciting, close game. That's the way it shapes up. There should be a good crowd for the game," Ferguson added.

As to playing the Whirlwinds in their first game, Ferguson said "Playing them later might have made for a more exciting game, but we'll just take what we get."

Adam Bandy, who was expected to be half of Friona's 1-2 running punch with teammate Nathan Haile, will suit up, and "we'll just see what he can do," Ferguson says.

Bandy sustained a knee injury in the Sanford-Fritch scrimmage and hasn't played as yet.

Otherwise, lineman Chris Wiseman is questionable, after being hurt on the third play of the Dalhart game. Sophomore lineman/linebacker David Mendez, who missed the last game, is ready to go.

Floydada started the season with 17 returning lettermen, nine offensive starters and nine defensive starters back from 2001.

The Whirlwinds are led by

senior quarterback Tyler Helms, who passed for 659 yards and nine touchdowns last season. Running back Dustin Covington rushed for 659 yards and nine TDs.

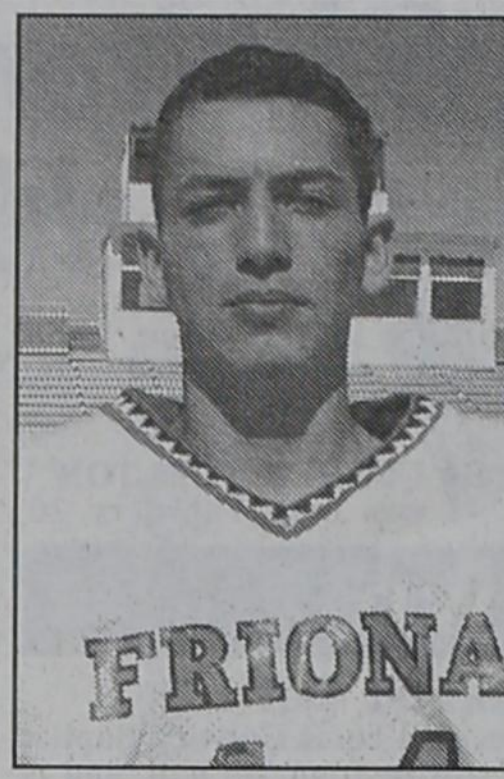

I was born February 10,

1911 in Merritt, Texas, to John W. Shelton and Estella Clapp Shelton. They had six children: Eula Insley, Luther, Nellie Ray, Tom, Ralph and Erma Ruth, two of whom are now deceased.

Dad had a farm in Hunt County, near Greenville. He raised cotton and corn. We always had two milk cows. Mom always raised a big garden. We had to help with the farming and help mom with the canning. During the Dust Bowl Days we didn't have much money but we had plenty of food to eat.

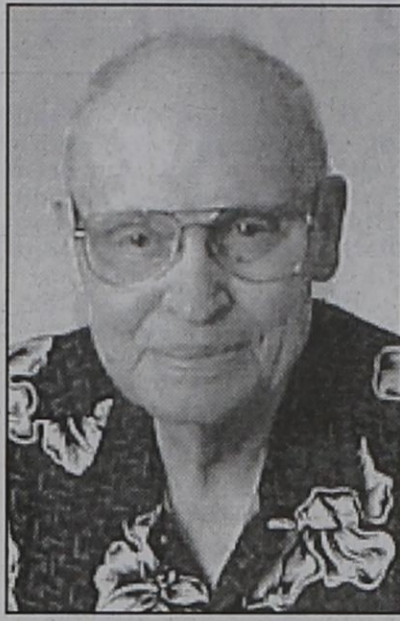
While I was in basic training in El Paso, I met a young lady named Thelma Ruth. Her mother owned a cafe in Amarillo. I was discharged from the Army after nine months. I was at Greenville visiting my parents when I heard Pearl Harbor had been bombed. I went back to Amarillo, first to re-enlist in the Army. It took six weeks to get back into my old platoon.

Then I went to see Thelma Ruth. We were married on January 16, 1942, in Clovis, New Mexico. I was shipped out on January 20th. I was in the Army 3-1/2 years, 2-1/2 in Hawaii and one year in Guam.

After I got out of the service, we moved to Greenville, where we farmed for a while. On February 6, 1954, we moved to Friona, where we farmed for five years, which is the land that Jarrell now owns. Then I worked for Doyle Cummings for ten years, Friona Feeders for six years and the High Plains Feedlot for six years. I retired in 1987.

We had two boys: Jerry and Tom Dale. Jerry lives in Wisconsin and works for Parkerland, a packing plant. Tom Dale lives in Amarillo and teaches at the college. I have two grandsons, two great-grandsons and one great-granddaughter.

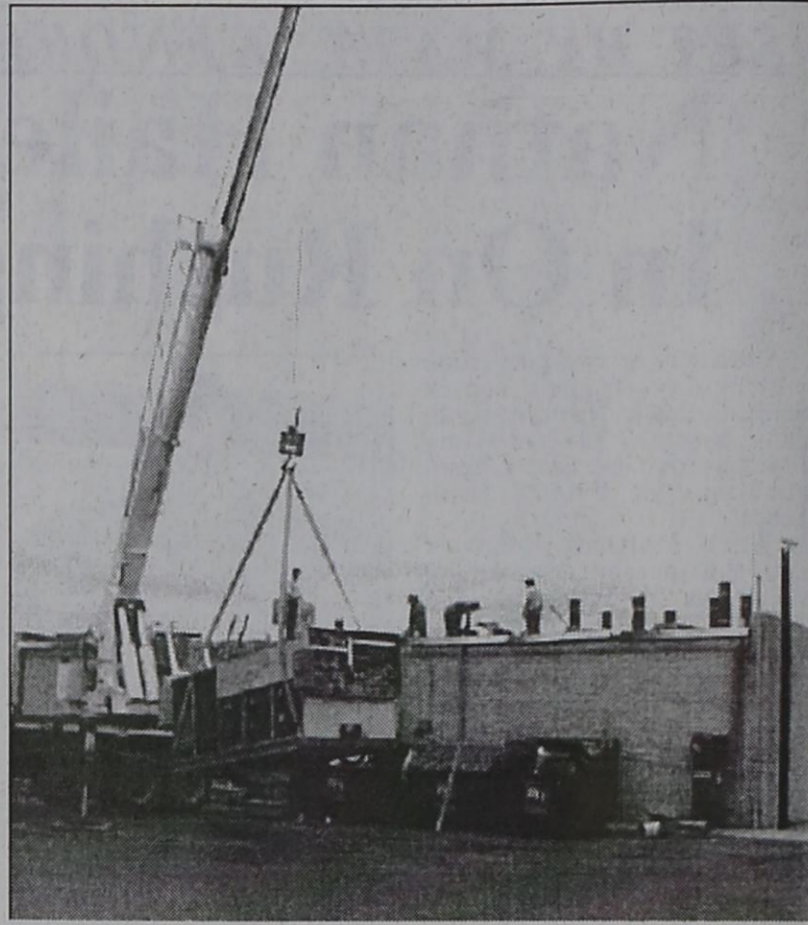

- The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

But then there are a lot of things in life I don't understand.

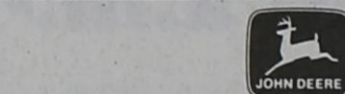

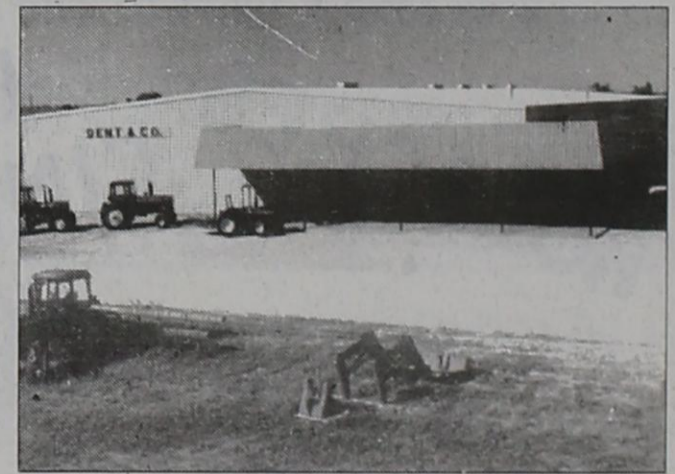

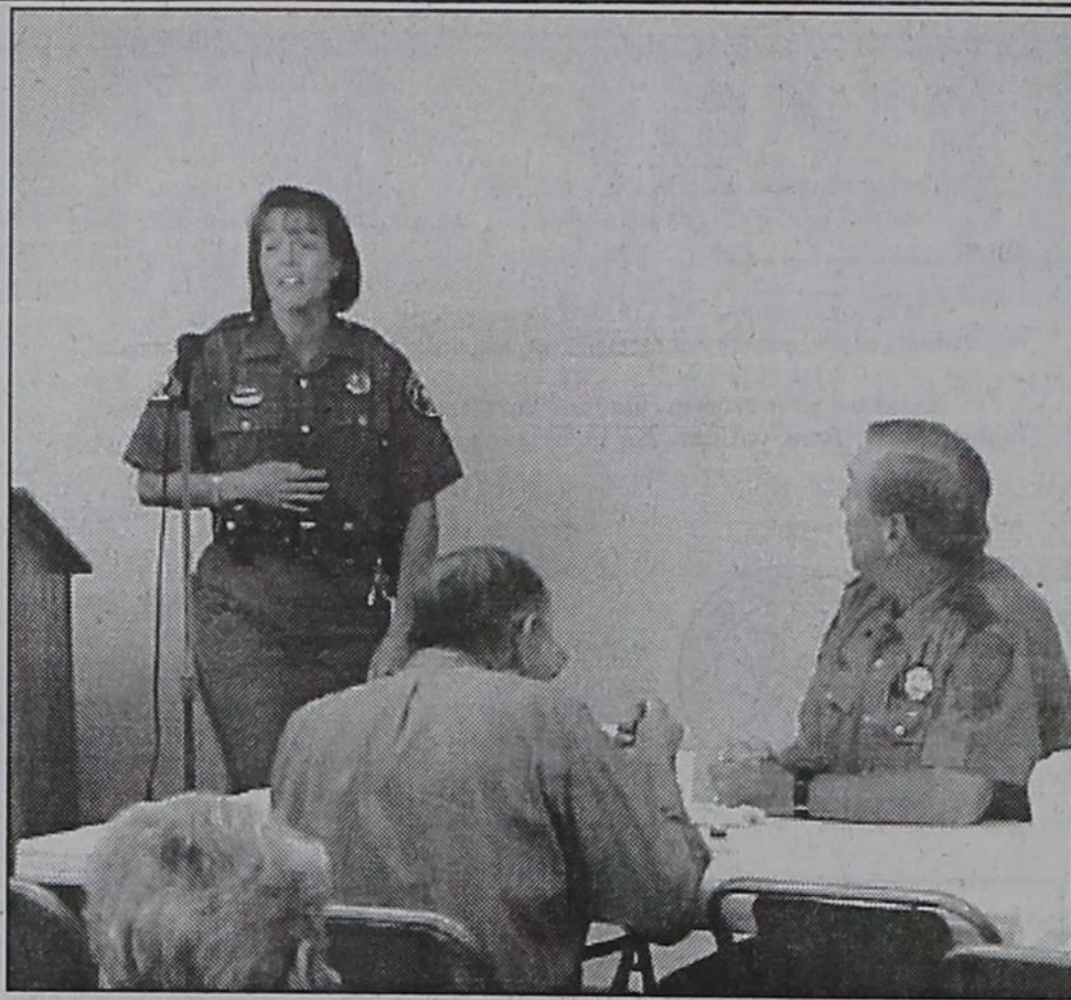

YOUR EYES

That Itching May Be Pink Eye!

Pink eye, or conjunctivitis, is a common condition caused by an infection or inflammation of the thin, clear membrane over the white of the eye. If you have ever had pink eye, you probably remember how much your eye itched or hurt. To treat your condition, the doctor will have to determine which type of pink eye you have:

•Viral conjunctivitis causes significant eye watering and a light discharge in one eye. •Bacterial conjunctivitis normally leads to a heavy and sometimes greenish discharge out of both eyes. •Allergic conjunctivitis causes itching, considerable tearing and redness in both eyes.

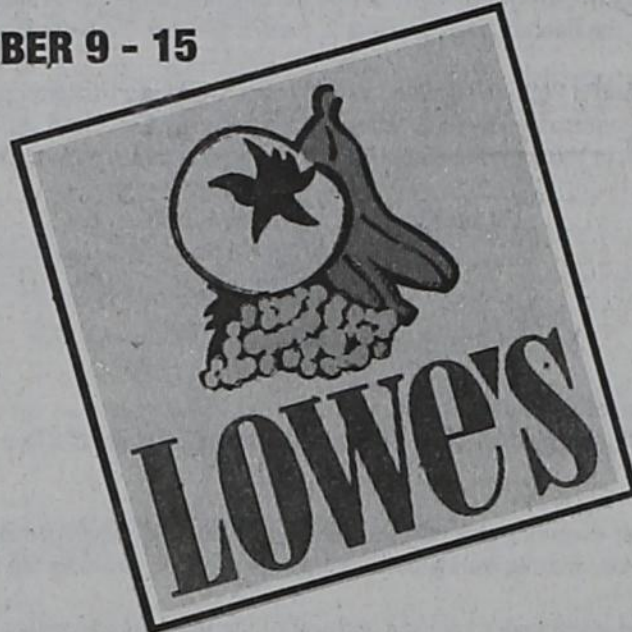
The doctor will probably take a swab of the infected area and ask you some questions to help pinpoint the primary cause. Providing as much information as possible can help in the diagnosis. Viral conjunctivitis normally clears up without medication. Antibiotic eye drops will treat bacterial conjunctivitis and antihistamine allergy pills or eye drops will help eliminate allergic conjunctivitis symptoms.
