ABILENE, Jan. 22. Final plans for the Abilene Fat Stock Show, to be held here March 5-9, have been mapped, according to the show's General Superintendent, J. I. Moore.

This annual event, which is sponsored by the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, is open to all FFA 4H Club boys and girls in a 20 county region of West Texas. The large volume of early entries indicates that the size of this year's show will exceed last year's highly successful exhibition which set an all-time record of over 600 entries.

Organized Reserves Eligible For Duty

Enlisted men of the Organized Reserve Corps who meet the specifications below are now eligible to volunteer and will be accepted for a period of 21 months continuous active duty, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced here today.

Enlisted reservists without dependents will be accepted on active duty in their present Organized Reserve Corps grade. Those with dependents will be accepted on active duty only if they are in the first three grades.

Applications can be obtained from the local instructor's office and will be submitted through that office. Reports of medical examination and history will accompany the applications.

As this is the first time that extended active duty has been open to enlisted reservists and this tour of duty is a substitute for the draft under the Selective Service Law, it is expected that many reservists throughout the State will take advantage of this opportunity, Colonel Abbott concluded.

Forty-Two Tourney At Cross Plains Monday Night

Cross Plains, Jan. 22. A forty-two tournament, originally scheduled to be held in the Cross Plains high school gymnasium Monday night but delayed because of inclement weather, will be next Monday night, it was announced yesterday by Mrs. J. L. Bonner, president of the local Parent-Teachers Association which is sponsoring the event.

The P. T. A., Cross Plains' newest civic organization recently spent \$600 to modernize plumbing facilities in two buildings on the school campus, and proceeds from the forty-two party have already been "ear-marked" to help this obligation.

Texas Gains 237 New Businesses

Charters were issued in December to 273 Texas businesses with total capitalization of \$6,198,000, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

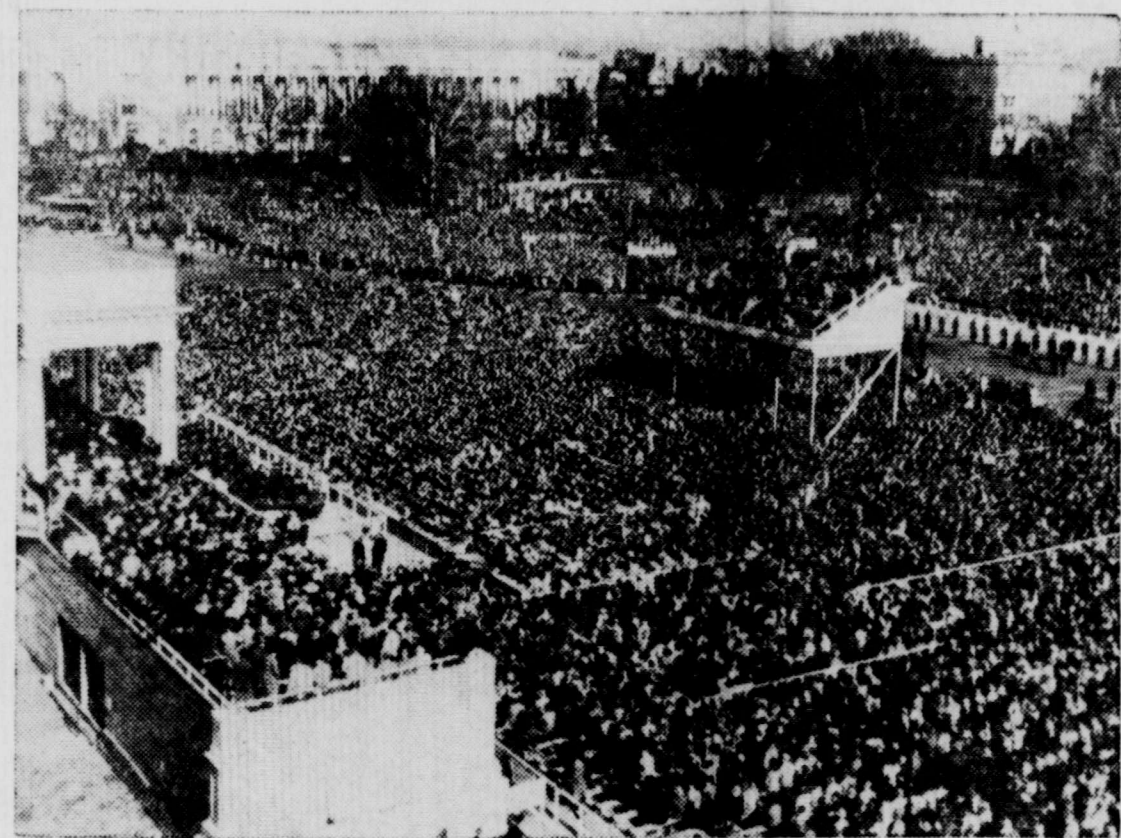
A total of 228 charters were issued in November, and 301 businesses were chartered in December 1947.

Totaling 67, merchandising businesses received the greatest number of charters in December, followed by manufacturing, 35; and real estate, 34.

There were 3,801 businesses incorporated in 1948 compared with 3,247 in 1947.

Meet The People Cisco's Water And Friendly People Deciding Factor In Bringing Roy Westfall And His Family Here In 1937

The purity of Cisco's water and the more friendly attitude of its people were perhaps the contributing factors for tempting A. R. Westfall, 406 West 8th street, one of the town's leading businessmen and citizens, to reside here.

It was the winter of 1937 when Westfall, popularly known to friends as Roy, and his family of five moved to Cisco from Wichita Falls as district salesman for the Archenhold Supply Company.

Before deciding to locate here, Roy explained, he looked the town over "inside and out" particular noticing housing conditions and, above all, its water.

"After all," said Roy, "in Wichita Falls the hard water was making the entire family droopy and Cisco later proved to be the solution for our problem."

As a traveling salesman for the Archenhold Company and the Magnolia Petroleum Company for more than 25 years Westfall's territory covered a wide radius deep into West Texas and as far north as Wichita Falls. In his request to transfer to Cisco from his chief headquarters, his sales manager was willing, but didn't approve much of Westfall's idea of a location.

"We debated for more than a month over the proposal," Westfall recalled. "He wanted me to go to Breckenridge. Then finally my sales boss gave in and in one week's time we were packed and on our way to Cisco."

Two years later, Mr. Westfall accepted the opportunity to enter business for himself, and on May 1, 1939, he opened what still remains—Westfall & Son Magnolia Service, a modern service station on West 8th Street.

A slender man of medium height, Roy Westfall, who was born September 2, 1899, in Rush County, was the oldest of nine children born to a blacksmith and wood craftsman. As a boy Roy lived in Mt. Enterprise and assisted his father in the shop.

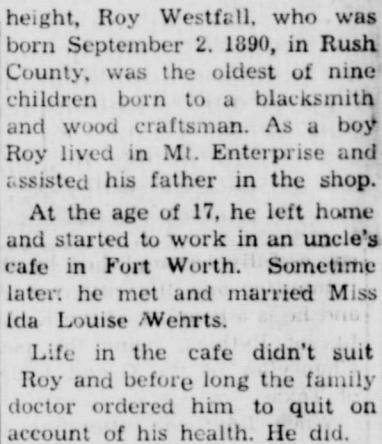
At the age of 17, he left home and started to work in an uncle's cafe in Fort Worth. Sometime later he met and married Miss Ida Louise Wentrts.

Life in the cafe didn't suit Roy and before long the family doctor ordered him to quit on account of his health. He did.

Westfall's association with the large petroleum company and others came into being after a friend recommended him to company heads. Roy applied for the salesman's position and was accepted.

Mr. and Mrs. Westfall are the parents of three children — Albert Roy, Jr., who served with the Eighth Air Force based in England during the past war; Christine Lee, now married, and Jerre, who is living with his parents while attending college here.

During the war, the Westfalls lost their fourth child, Billie L., who was killed in a naval engagement off the coast of Java. The Navy Department's notification of his death was received on November 25, 1945.

New Victor Hotel Will Officially Open Sunday

Local Man Assists In Rescue Of Motorists Stranded By Blizzard

A local man was on the ground floor at the blizzard which struck much of New Mexico last week and participated in the rescue of more than 500 stranded motorists who were caught out of Lordsburg, when their autos sailed in heavy drifting snow.

Ted Kiper of 104 West 4th, an employee of Gallagher Clay Products Company, was caught in Lordsburg by the storm while enroute to Globe, Arizona, with a truck load of flower pots. He spent the night there Saturday night and was unable to leave because of blocked roads.

When word reached Lordsburg of the plight of the stranded motorists on the highway out of the town, Kiper an one other man joined the crew of a Southern Pacific rescue train which was being dispatched to help the motorists. With them were three highway patrolmen.

The tie-up in highway traffic resulted when two cars skidded on the pavement and blocked the road. Before they could be removed and traffic stopped there were some 300 cars, trucks and buses held tight in the drifting snow. Among the travelers were babies less than six months old and men and women over 80 years of age.

The rescue train consisted of a diesel engine, one baggage coach and five cabooses. The train was forced to stop approximately one fourth mile from the stranded people and much hardship was encountered in removing them to the train.

Snow drifts and a partially dry lake bed had to be crossed in removing the people from their cars to the train and since some of the stranded motorists had become ill from exposure it was necessary to evacuate them with stretchers.

Postal Receipts Register Increase

Texas postal receipts climbed 44 per cent from November to December, The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

December receipts of 57 Texas cities totaled \$4,735,362 or 13 per cent above a year earlier.

Leading the state, Dallas postal receipts totaled \$1,148,861. Houston receipts registered \$841,510; Fort Worth, \$488,180, and San Antonio, \$471,675.

Although the monthly rise was greater than was seasonally expected, it was below the 52 per cent increase recorded in a like period in 1947.

November to December gains ranged from 24 per in El Paso to 104 per cent in Corsicana.

The entire family of an Army Sergeant had to be transported to the train on the stretchers and one truck driver was unable to make the trip alone.

When the rescuers reached the scene they transferred all the women and children to three busses that still had a supply of gasoline and were able to keep heaters going. The men were taken to town on the first trip and then the train returned for the remainder of the sufferers.

Many were suffering from frost-bite, hunger and exposure when they were brought to Lordsburg for treatment and rest. Some were so numb from cold that they lost their shoes in walking over the boggy lake bottom and did not realize it until they were safe on the train.

Mrs. E. L. Graham and Mrs. Charles Sandler of the Band Parents will accompany the selected musicians to Galveston, it was stated. Co-managers Charles Beene and Emmett Graham will also journey with the group.

Miss Hazelwood is one of two students graduating from the University at mid-term.

Lobo Band To Give Concerts At Olden And Eastland Thurs.

## RADIO WITHOUT MUSIC SPEEDS STEEL HANDLING



To speed the handling of materials in and between their Canton and Gambrius, O., plants The Timken Roller Bearing Company has installed two-way FM radio equipment in straddle trucks, cranes and locomotives. To call a truck or other equipment into action, the operation foreman at the spot where it is needed calls the dispatcher by telephone and lists his requirements. This information is then relayed to an operator over the 30-watt station. Since some of the materials must be processed through as many as 15 operations, the time saving element alone makes the radio worthwhile.

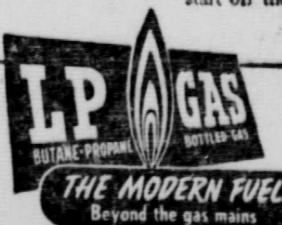

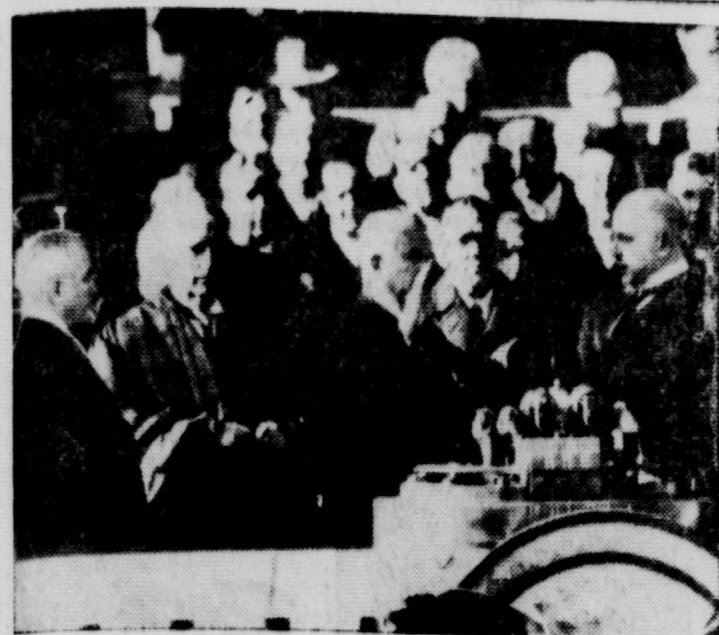

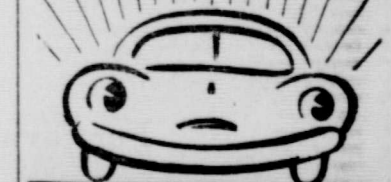
