Certain Reserves Eligible For Active Duty With Army

It was announced today by Captain Wayne Hall, Station Commander of the US Army and US Air Force Recruiting Main Station in Abilene, that all personnel other than Air Force, enlisted in the Organized Reserve Corps or in the National Guard, who meet the specified criteria are eligible to volunteer and will be accepted for a period of 21 months' continuous active duty. Enlisted men without dependents will be accepted on active duty in their present ORC or NG grade. Only those enlisted men with dependents who qualify for the first three grades will be accepted on active duty in their ORC or NG grade. Applicants must meet the physical standards, the general qualifications for enlistment, and achieve a GCT score of 70 or higher for acceptance.

Captain Hall further stated that promotion while on active duty will be permitted.

All 4-H boys and girls operating under the supervision of the Extension Service and enrolled in the current year's program may participate. State winners must have passed their 14th birthday and must not have reached their 21st on January 1, 1949 and must have completed three years of 4-H work including the current year.

There will be competition in rural arts works, meat animal program, poultry achievement program, health improvement, farm safety and better electrical methods.

Mississippi Lime Topped At 3,965 Feet

An extension of the Kleiner pool approximately 2 miles to the south was in prospect Tuesday with the announcement that the Huntley and Gilliam No. 1, N. D. Gallagher showed prospects of being completed as a good well.

The well topped the Mississippi Lime at approximately 3,935 feet and was still drilling in the prolific structure when operators stopped at 4100 ft. The bottom 70 feet showed heavy oil saturation and the well was cemented preparatory to completion.

Operators plan to drill the plug Thursday and to perforate the pipe about 15 feet from the bottom. After the perforation, acid will be administered and a potential test run.

Area oil men were elated with were of the opinion that the extension would open much additional operations in the field.

The operators were optimistic and felt that the well would be a valuable addition to the Cisco field. Frank Gilliam of McAllen and J. F. Huntley of Dallas who are the operators, indicated that they would develop their holdings further.

The English Drilling Co. who had the drilling contract, began the well on December 16 and were forced to drill through hard rock and sand most of the way. Oil showings were found in the Caddo Lime, the Lake Sand, the Ranger and the Duffer. Strong gas was encountered in the Mississippi.

The well is located on the N. D. Gallagher farm just east of the Cisco city limits. It is located 1,320 feet from the west line and 330 feet from the south line of the S. W. 1/4 of section 77, block 4, of the H. and T. C. Railway Survey.


RESTING FAIR


