Swollen Inventory Forces Shutdown Of Glove Industry; Boss Factory To Resume Operation Here On March 1

The Boss Manufacturing Company plant in Cisco has been shutdown for two weeks in conformity with an industry-wide effort to correct a swollen inventory situation, it was announced Monday. All plants of the Boss company and practically all other glove makers have ceased operating until March 1. The action followed a brief period during which the Cisco plant and others of the company were operating on a reduced schedule. None of the employees of the company have been laid off, according to Manager Anton White and the factory definitely will reopen March 1. Meanwhile a staff of employees is being maintained on full time duty to take care of shipments of gloves from the local warehouse, and to take care of other work which must go on at the plant. Swollen inventories in textile industries, and particularly in gloves all over the country, has brought about a situation that the industry has been forced to take steps to correct, it was explained, and the industry-wide shutdown was decided upon in order to give an opportunity to deal with the situation. Mr. White stated this is the first time in 11 years that any plant of the Boss company has operated on a non-consecutive schedule. Desdemona Takes Crown By Win Over Fighting Scranton Team In County Girl's Basketball Tourney Finals Here

Desdemona remained the undefeated contender in the annual Eastland County Girl's Basketball Tournament here Saturday and attained the championship crown after carrying through a sustained drive to crush unbeaten Scranton, 21-14. An hour prior to the championship playoff, the Cisco Queens were trounced 32-15 by Olden in the consolation runoff. Therefore, second place was to be decided by Olden, winner of the consolation, and Scranton, loser of the championship struggle. The game was played at Scranton Monday night. Desdemona spurted forth a sizzling assault just seconds after the start. Within four minutes, Desdemona was leading 10-3. At this point, Coach Bill Pope's Scranton combatants unleashed an all out barrage at the back boards with Sally Speegle, a real player, doing most of the shooting. Pope's offensive charm however, didn't take hold as it had done in the Rising Star squabble the previous night. Bullseye lateraling possible kept Desdemona in the head wind which never subsided for a second's time. Hazzard, at center forward, unwound as the battle neared the second quarter. A crowd of approximately 300 applauded the marksmanship ability so expertly by the Desdemona girl. A switch in Pope's strategy enabled Scranton to stall Desdemona for a time. Then the offensive side of Desdemona uncovered its prize stunt—the Stall, used successfully in previous encounters. The idea was to pass the ball back and forth between the three offensive players. In doing so, the opposing team's defense was forced to move away from the basket in an effort to retrieve the ball. Once the defense shifted, it was the center forward's task of whipping behind the opposition, take a pass and flip the ball in the net. It worked. Desdemona, by using the Stall, sailed to a 13-5 half time lead. Opening the third quarter, Scranton succeeded in breaking up the Stall, and Speegle, greatly aided by obliging teammates, jolted the bucket, time after time, arching with her favorite shots, rebounds. At last Scranton, on the defense for the most of the game, allied. The struggle developed into fierce, out right ball handling as both powers sought to batter the other into submission.

Girl Scout Group Meeting Called For Wednesday

Mrs. L. C. Heltzel, organization chairman of the local Girl Scout organization, announced Monday that there was to be a meeting of the officers, workers and mothers of girls wishing to become Scouts in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. Plans for the actual organization of the movement in Cisco will be formulated at the meeting. Miss Bobbye Wash, professional Girl Scout worker from Brownwood, will direct the meeting and assist in the organization work. She will talk on scouting work — discussing the proper manner in which the work should be carried on, assist in the selection of a meeting place and discuss qualifications, ages of scouts and all matters pertaining to the beginning of the local work. Troop leaders, assistant leaders and committee members will be selected from those attending the meeting. In a recent survey conducted by letter, 85 parents expressed a willingness to do personal work and 165 parents were willing for their daughters to become scouts. Mrs. Heltzel stated that the meeting would be over by 3:30 p. m. to allow those attending to be present at a meeting called at the West Ward School at that time.

Local National Guard Unit Prepares For Federal Inspection

Last minute preparations for federal inspection has kept National Guardsmen of the 961st Field Artillery command here close at hand before the arrival of Army inspectors from Ft. Sam Houston, who will review the unit at the armory Wednesday night. Captain O. O. Odum, Jr., commander of the battalion here, will meet the inspection party, sometime Wednesday morning and will go to the hill top armory soon after their arrival by car. Following a brief staff meeting, the inspection party, composed of four officers, will inspect the office files and records for neatness and accuracy. Sgt. Frank Schlaepfer, administrative assistant, will conduct the tour through the offices. A second phase of the inspection will include the quartermaster department and equipment. To date, approximately \$300,000 in equipment has been received by the local National Guard unit. Most recently shipped here were fifty carbine rifles and small side arms for marksmanship practice. The tour through the quartermaster depot will be in charge of Sgt. Bobby Woods, head of supplies. Woods and Schlaepfer are full time National Guardsmen, both being former Marines in World War II. Later Wednesday afternoon, the inspection party will observe the condition and care of the two troop carrier trucks and staff cars (jeeps). An additional mobil unit of trucks and smaller vehicles are expected to be issued to this unit when a full quota of five officers and 93 Guardsmen has been attained. The fourth and final phase of the annual inspection will take place at seven o'clock at which time troops of the 961st Field Artillery Battery A will be reviewed. Two companies, as officer personnel company and a radio company will make up the command to be inspected. At the second hour of the review the party, instructed by the commanding officer will observe the efficiency of the gun crews as each crew runs through a mock firing drill. Non-commissioned officers will be in charge of the gun crews. After an inspection of the radio company and arsenal, which includes the setting up of 50 caliber machine guns, the troops will be dismissed for the night. A report to the commanding officer by the visiting inspection party will then be made. Captain Odum said here today that all enlisted personnel had been instructed to assemble at the armory before seven o'clock in full dress, and that no absentee leaves would be granted. For the coming months, Captain Odum said, the command would begin preparations for summer camp after the full quota has been reached. Weekend training will also be a part of the drills to be conducted in the next 30 days and includes a trip to San Angelo for small arms and rifle practice. The captain listed the names of two executive officers to be assigned to the local unit. Listed were C. J. Ritchey, manager of the Layne-Wells Company here, and Jack Lauderdale, insurance salesman. Both Ritchey and Lauderdale were war time officers.

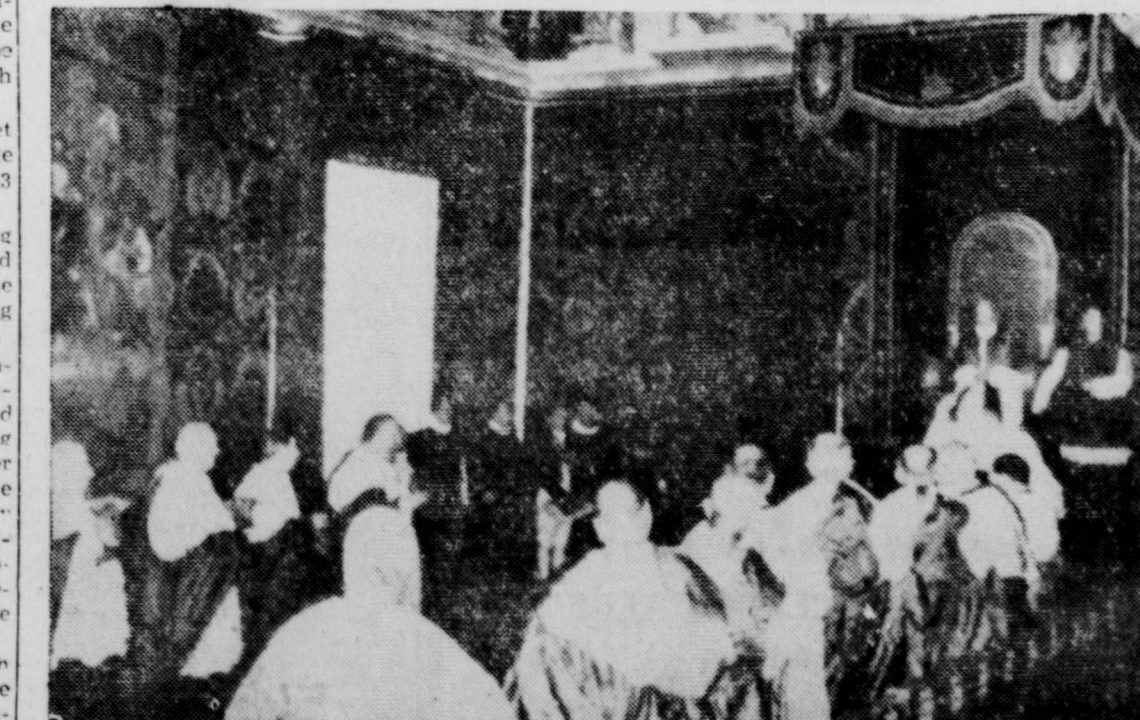

"Love The Child," W. R. Smith, Noted Abilene Educator, Tells PTA Monday

"Much of the education and most valuable part of that education is not found in the text books used in our public school system," W. R. Smith, prominent West Texas educator told a good crowd of PTA members and visitors at a special meeting of the group Monday night at the Church of Christ. "Love is the lesson parents and teachers should strive to impress upon those entrusted to their care," he said. Smith, an instructor at Abilene Christian College, came to Cisco at the invitation of the West Ward Parent-Teacher Association to discuss the relationship of the home and the school in the proper education of the child. He came to Cisco from Houston where he had participated in a week's lectureship on the subject. Stressing the fact that love is the basis of living, he said: "If a teacher does not love the children entrusted to her something should be done about it. Love of the parents and the companionship between the child and the parent is the most important thing in the world." He concluded his remarks by stating that the parents and teachers were at fault in a large majority of cases of juvenile delinquency and through a lack of understanding of the problems confronting the child they were driving him elsewhere in the home or school.

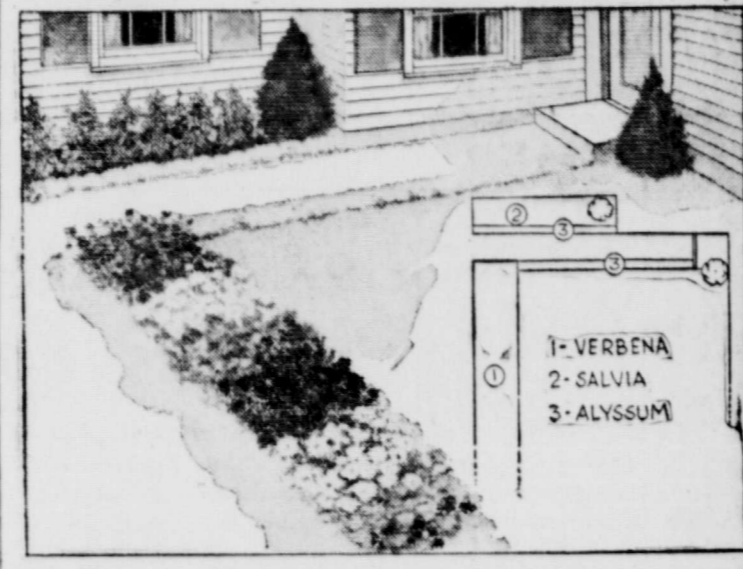

## Gay Ninety Gardens Back But with a Difference



Differing from parterre planting of the nineties, modern doorway gardens emphasize beauty of the flowers, and not a pattern.

Back in the days when women wore bustles, flowers in front yards were in fashion. Now that bustles are coming back, doorway gardens are returning, but with a difference from the fashion followed in the nineties. Then, flowers were used to work out elaborate designs in beds of geometric shapes. This was an ancient fashion, dating back to the middle ages, known as parterre work. The beauty of the parterre was in its pattern, with the flowers used only to supply the color which developed it. Few examples of this method are now seen in this country. Modern doorway gardens are as simple as possible in design, in order to center attention upon the beauty of the flowers. These are grouped in masses of one color, so arranged that each mass harmonizes with and sets off the others, and all provide a pleasing decoration for the house. For these beds, annual flowers of low, compact growth are most suitable subjects. They will flower without ceasing from July until freezing weather, even in the northern states, and are easily grown from seed, when started early under protection, or in the garden itself as soon as the weather permits. The garden illustrated is a simple arrangement of border plantings for a small house where the walk leads from the private driveway to the front door. Both house and lot will be made to seem larger by this arrangement. Bright red, or pink salvias, and the clear vivid red, pink, blue and buff verbenas will provide a brilliant decoration for a white, or grey house. Both salvia and verbenas are slow growing, and seed should be started early in a hot-bed or greenhouse, so that plants of good size can be set out as soon as danger of frost is over. If seed is sown directly in the garden, flowers may be delayed two or three weeks. Sweet alyssum, however, will grow quickly from seed and either a dwarf white variety, or the dark purple Violet Queen Alyssum may be used. If the plants are sheared when they grow too tall, flowers will be increased, and a low growing border constantly maintained.

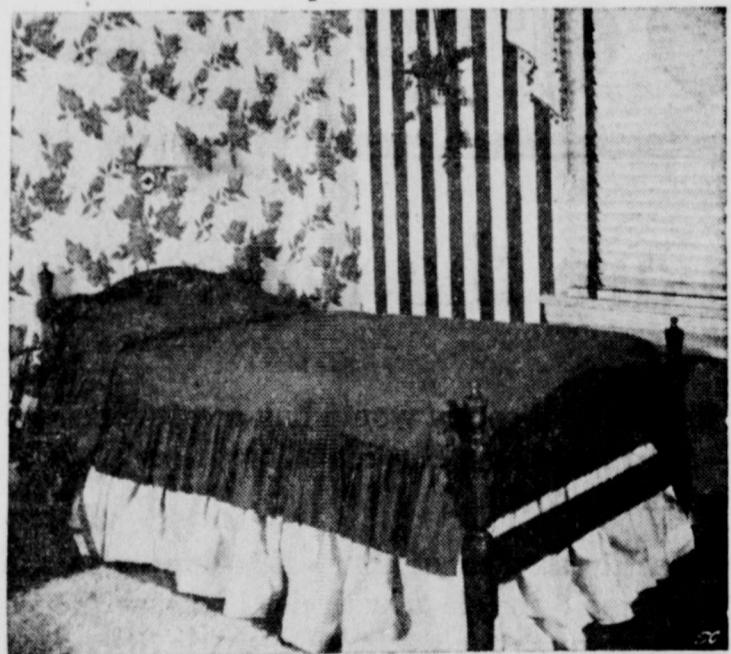
