MUCH HAS BEEN written about the destructive cyclone that took some 20 lives and injured scores on April 28, 1933. Mr. J. C. Hoiton of Cisco loaned us a copy of The Cisco Apert many years ago. In its "Thirty Years Ago" column it reprinted the story of the storm.

THERE HAVE BEEN stories in The Press from time to time and space won't permit us to quote the article. But we enjoyed talking with Mr. Hoiton who lived in the country some southwest of town and remembers the storm well. His wife was awakened before it broke and packed their belongings in their trunks. When the storm broke, she went into the yard and held on to an oak tree. The wind blew their house away and ruined virtually all of their belongings.

THE ARTICLE tells of the big relief job after the cyclone. The damage was estimated to be in excess of \$350,000. The Texas Legislature appropriated \$10,000 and when the article was written, Texans had contributed to the tune of over \$30,000.

Mail Man Turns To In Plane For Holiday Delivery

Charles F. Coats, rural carrier on Route 1 out of the Cisco Post Office, celebrated Washington's Birthday, a legal holiday for federal employees, with an unusual demonstration of service.

Accompanied by a friend, he delivered copies of a daily newspaper to his patrons by airplane. Mr. Coats had previously notified his patrons of his intention and asked them to watch for the papers when he threw them from his plane, a Piper Cub. In instances where no one appeared in the yard when he flew over, he circled the house to arouse the patron. Of approximately 50 papers, he delivered forty.

Since he soloed in 1942, Mr. Coats has logged 260 hours, most of the time in his own airplane. Now 59, it is his intention to continue flying as long as he is able to obtain his license. Flying is his recreation and hobby.

Girls' Volleyball Now Included On School's In-Doors Sports Program

Cisco High School girls' volleyball went into the first week of training Tuesday afternoon in grand style, and Miss Lela Latch, coach, was "generally impressed" with the turn out of between 20 and 25 aspirants in the new field.

Strenuous drills once a day have left most of the girls pitting, Miss Latch said, but, nevertheless, all have shown signs of eagerness to get onto the game, something new for high school sport programs.

"It's just another move the athletic department decided to add to the ever expanding sports movement at CHS," she said. "Basketball season is over, and the good results have turned thoughts to volleyball.

During the first seven days of training Miss Latch said the girls were a bit green under the net, but the team, as a whole, played as though they were to meet Dallas the next day.

The volleyballers will test their strength in a net game with the high school faculty this coming Thursday. And on the following Wednesday, the girls will travel to Breckenridge in order to enter a tournament there March 2.

In district circles, the volleyballers will launch their bids for honors in a row with Brownwood, supposedly the strongest sextet in this area to date. The game will come off March 9.

Miss Latch, who teaches History as a profession, is hoping Cisco can hold a girls volleyball tournament here after the season gets underway.

Support Schools For Fight Against Foreign Influence, Teacher Says

Mrs. Bessie Carter, public school teacher here, told the 35 members and guests of the Cisco Rotary Club's Thursday luncheon that "the schools today stand in the way of foreign influence in this country, but do so only as long as the systems are supported substantially."

"One real method of ridding our country of persons who seek our downfall is to teach it in the schools, bringing the fight out in the open," Mrs. Carter said.

The speaker, who used as the subject of her talk, "Modern and Past Methods of Teaching," said in bygone days of teaching in the little Red School House, the teacher could do nothing more than assign lessons, since four to eight grades were packed into one class room.

"It was almost impossible for the students to concentrate on one particular subject since that many were being taught together. It was a strenuous task for both the teacher and the student," she declared.

Mrs. Carter, who was introduced by Rotarian Floyd Shepard, urged tax paying citizens to observe school bills that will greatly benefit this state which are up before the Texas Legislature for hearings.

Prior to the main address, Rotarians, in a business session, voted 25 to 3 to meet in the dining room of the Victor Hotel for the regular luncheons. A committee appointed by the board of directors went over the proposal before bringing it to a vote before the club. The club will begin meeting at the new location March 10, Rotary President Jess Proctor announced.

Guests at Thursday's luncheon included visiting Rotarians from Abilene, Eastland and Dallas.

Lone Star And Hickock Announce New Activity In Kleiner Field

Oil activity in the Cisco area was showing signs of revival this week after a virtual shutdown for more than a month due to unfavorable weather and the scarcity of drill pipe. The Lone Star Producing Company and the Hickock Producing and Developing Co. both announced activity in the Kleiner pool just north of the Cisco city limits.

Lone Star was acidizing their No. 4 Daniels, after logs showed oil saturation in the Mississippi lime formation. The well is a direct offset to their No. 1 Daniels, which was completed as a

large producer. The formation was running in a direct pattern with their other wells on the lease. The pay strata was said to be tighter than the other two wells but operators were optimistic over prospects for another addition to the field.

Plans call for the beginning of the Daniels No. 3 as soon as completion work on the present operation ends. The No. 3 location was passed up in an attempt to further define the pool.

Lone Star was re-working their Mary Phillips No. 1, a Lake sand producer, which was deepened to the Mississippi. No pay was found below the Lake and the hole is being plugged back to the original producing area.

Hickock was moving in on their No. 1 location on the Wright-Harrell tract in the Kleiner area. The test will go to the Mississippi and is to be a cable tool operation. It is some 1 1/2 miles east of the Lochridge No. 1 which was abandoned when tools were lost in the hole. The new location is north and east of the original well in the Kleiner field.

Elsewhere in the county, activity was slow but scheduled to pickup early in March. In the Gorman sector, A. W. Gregg completed his No. 5 Phillips with a potential of 64 barrels of 42 gravity oil at a depth of approximately 2,900 feet.

Jaycee Basketeers In Final Drill For Game With All-American Red Heads

The Cisco Junior Chamber of Commerce basketeers go into their final drill at City gym tonight before tangling with the All-American Red Heads at the community building at 8 p. m. Friday; and if advance notices are correct the word "tangle" is appropriate.

The Nationally famous all-girls team from Caseyville, Missouri, was organized in 1935 and has been playing since that time. They did not play during the war years of 1942-43-44-45 but have played professional and semi-professional men's teams since that time and have set an enviable record. During the 1947-48 season, they won 125 games and dropped only 77.

They boast an average height of 5 feet, 10 inches and range from 5 feet 2 inches to 6 feet 4 inches. The squad of seven players will arrive in Cisco sometime Friday for the encounter. Coach Leon Betty, Assistant Coach Walter Stubbie, Walter Muehl, and Juanita Coleman comprise the Red Head traveling squad.

Jack Everett Moves To High School, Stormy Davis Takes Over College

The board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School System Thursday announced wide changes in the coaching staffs of the public school system and of Cisco Junior College and, at the same time, released plans for a wide spread athletic program designed to reach every boy and girl enrolled in the schools.

Changes in the coaching staff placed Jack Everett as athletic director and head coach of all the city schools and made Stormy Davis coach and athletic director at Cisco Junior College. Everett has served as coach at the junior college for the past two years, and Davis was assistant coach at the college this past season.

School board officials were reported to be well pleased with the changes and were high in their praise for the manner in which both coaches cooperated in working out the new program.

Coach Everett will have complete charge of the athletic program of the school system and will direct sports activities in the schools from the first grade through high school. Under his direction will be the coaches of both West Ward and the junior high school, as well as the high school. Buck Overall will remain as head coach of the Lobo basketball team and will assist in other sports activities.

A new full time coach is to be employed for the Junior High school and plans call for the beginning of a full sports calendar for the school. The program calls for a full schedule of sports in the ward school under the direction of competent instructors.

A complete physical education program for boys at the

high school was started Thursday under the direction of Carlos Turner and Coach Everett. It is the first time in the history of the school that a program of that nature has been offered to boys.

Everett's duties call for the supervision of girls' athletics as well as boy's activities. It is the hopes of the board and school officials to have a complete athletic program designed to build better teams for the future and to stress character and sportmanship.

Coach Davis will supervise all sports activities of the Cisco Junior College and will serve as head football and basketball coach.

The changes went into effect Thursday and the shifting of the teaching duties of each coach was complete.

Lions Hear Talk On Alcoholism At Wed. Meeting

The program of Alcoholics Anonymous, an international organization that has helped some 70,000 persons recover from the disease "Alcoholism," was outlined in a talk at the Cisco Lions Club luncheon at noon Wednesday.

The talk was made by a man identified only as Perry, who said he had been sober for 412 days through the help given him by Alcoholics Anonymous. Previous to that, he said he had been using alcohol for 15 years.

In the way of statistics, Perry said that 65,000,000 Americans drink — 4,000,000 to excess. He said that there are 800,000 chronic alcoholics in the nation. Alcohol Anonymous operates 1,249 units in 24 countries, including 43 in hospitals.

Perry said that four of every five chronic alcoholics who enter their program stop drinking and resume their places in society. Before the organization can or will help a chronic alcoholic the victim of alcohol must admit to himself that "he is a hopeless drunk." He described alcoholism as a disease.

Perry said the organization was interested in setting up an AA unit to work in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Moran.

Lion Jack Lauderdale was in charge of the program. A near record crowd turned out for the luncheon.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CISCO:

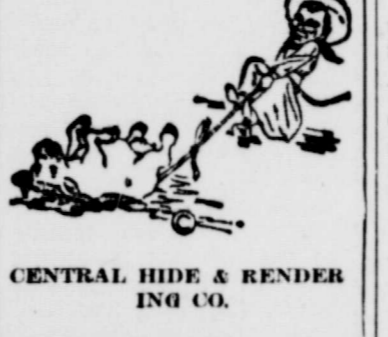

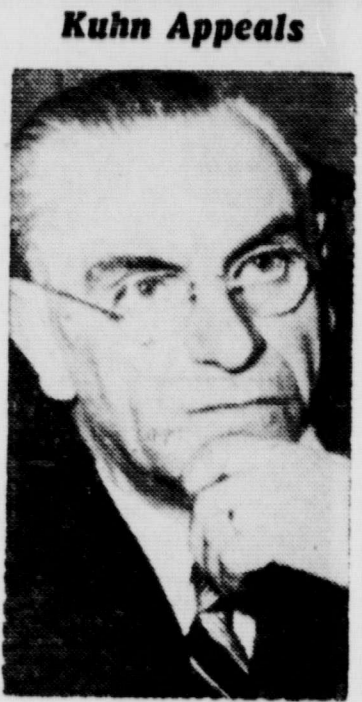
