Maize Days Heads For "Grand Finale"

Friona's 46th annual Maize Days celebration heads for its final weekend, with a number of events yet to be held.

Starting the weekend out is the Friona-Post football game at Chieftain Field, with kickoff time set for 7:30 p.m.

The game will feature perhaps the highest-rated team (statewide) to ever visit Friona for a game. The Antelopes are currently rated fourth in the state, with numerous players back from a team that went to the state quarterfinals in 2001.

The last time Friona played a team rated that high was in 1996, when the Chieftains upended Vernon in the Regional finals. Vernon was rated first in the state entering the game!

Saturday's schedule kicks off with a pancake breakfast at the Friendship House, with the

community invited. Serving will be from 6:30 to 8:30 a.m. Cost is \$5 for adults and \$3 for children.

The Dixon Six-Mile Run will begin at 8 a.m. six miles north of town on Highway 214. In addition to the six-miler, a two-mile run and walk will also be held. Register at the starting point Saturday, or call Jim Dixon at 295-6392 for details.

The art and photo exhibits will be open to the public all day Saturday until 4 p.m. at the Depot in the City Park.

The annual Maize Days Parade will begin lining up at 9:30 a.m. on Euclid Street (in front of the elementary-junior high buildings). The parade will move out at 10:30 a.m.

Everyone is invited to attend the annual barbeque at noon at Friona City Park, catered this year by Desperado's of Amarillo (the successor to Sutphen's BBQ). Cost for the BBQ is \$5.00 per plate.

A YEAR CHURNS BY pretty fast and can seem like just a few short weeks once you become a member of the "over the hill" generation. It has been a very short year since a band of fanatics killed three thousand of our people and took away our freedom to feel safe in our own homes, in our own country.

Those people are gone forever, and we'll probably never get back some of our freedoms that also disappeared in the billowing smoke of the World Trade Center Towers. Television networks can run stories of those families who lost loved ones non-stop all day every day from now on, if it will insure that no one in the world ever forgets the events of that September day last year.

America was not prepared for what happened because civilized people cannot understand, much less predict, the actions of purely evil extremists. We simply can't comprehend the depth of hatred that they have against our nation or understand the reason why. We only know that this enemy must be destroyed and their capacity to strike must be eliminated. But who are they?

After the Oklahoma City bombing, there was Timothy McVeigh. At Pearl Harbor, the enemy was Japanese imperialism. In WWII Germany, the enemy was Hitler and his Nazi totalitarianism.

Now we are in a war against terrorism without a clear-cut enemy. Bin Laden is only one small fish in a teeming sea of dedicated Islamic fundamentalists, extolling faith, mindless obedience, primitivism, sacrifice to state or God, theocracy. They are against everything we stand for: reason, individualism, pursuit of happiness, secularism, capitalism. Their plan is basically to force their religious dogma on nonbelievers--us--by spreading their doctrine, via appeals and rational arguments, but by violence, gun and suicide bombers.

I don't know what our leaders have in mind when it comes to destroying this unpredictable enemy, but I hope the Islamic fundamentalist nations of Iraq, Iran, Saudi Arabia and Pakistan are at the top of the hit list. Bipartisan bickering and blathering over the minuscule details of homeland security are certainly not going to win a war against anything.

America has the courageous military and the weapons to take on this enemy and defeat them. We've just gotta find them first and then have the will to practice self-interest and safeguard American lives. . . and not be squeamish about stepping on anyone's toes in the name of right and reason.

Okay media, news magazines, networks, talking heads... keep running those stories and memorials about nine-one-one. Some of the more cynical folks among us may get tired of hearing about it. But I don't want anyone to ever forget. It must never be "out of sight, out of mind." I want Americans to stay mad as Hell about this, until every last terrorist is wiped off the earth. . . in memory of those three thousand vibrant intelligent young folks who died last year in New York City. They'll never have the opportunity to become a part of the "over the hill" generation.

City Council Adopts Flat Rate Sewer Fee

The Friona city council met in regular session at 7:30 p.m. Monday, September 9, 2002 in the council chambers at city hall.

At 7:36 p.m. Mayor Taylor opened a public hearing concerning the Fiscal Year 2002-2003 city budget. Comments about the proposed rate increase for water and sewer were received from Billy Joe Mercer and Joe Reeve. The public hearing was closed at 8:07 p.m.

The council then reviewed a report from the Friona Economic Development Council (FEDC) concerning terms of office for some of the members. The council will vote on FEDC members at the next regular meeting.

The council reviewed the Prairie Acres report and requested that at the next regular meeting all department heads be present for reports.

Jarrett Atkinson of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) gave a report concerning the city's application for a Texas Community Development Program (TDCP) grant. The grant being requested is for

\$250,000 with the city matching with \$158,256. The money would be used for a ground storage water tank, one well and 7,000 feet of 8" line to loop into the water system.

The Chiefs go to Muleshoe next Friday, Sept. 20, to play their earliest opponent still on their current schedule. The last several years the Friona-Muleshoe games have produced a lot of fireworks--some on the field, and some in the form of weather.

We've played so many of the games at Muleshoe (now three of the last five games), that their field should feel like a "second" home field to many of Friona's players.

The last two times the teams played at Muleshoe, neither game was finished on the game date. In 1998, the game was called in the early part of the third quarter due to dangerous lightning. It was finished the following afternoon. Muleshoe won that one, 21-6.

Friona has already had one game (at Dimmitt) suspended this year, and probably doesn't want another one.

The 2002 Mules have only six lettermen and five starters returning from their team that went 10-2 and made it to the area round of the playoffs.

However, one of their returnees is junior running back A.J. Flores, who gained 1,293 yards as a sophomore, and made a lasting impression on Friona by scoring three touchdowns and gaining well over 100 yards in last year's game.

Friona will be missing Adam Bandy in their starting lineup. Bandy was Friona's sparkplug in last year's

DESPITE TURNOVERS Chieftains Topple Hornets By 31-6

Although not playing flawless football, the Chieftains did enough things right to come away with a 31-6 win over the Hornets at Tulia last Friday night.

The Chiefs and Hornets put on a fumbling contest, and fortunately, Tulia "won" that battle, 4-3.

"We're going to have to learn not to turn the ball over so much," stated Coach Bob Ferguson.

The first-year Friona coach said the turnovers may have been partly caused by learning a new offense.

"It has taken a little while, but the kids are starting to understand our offense," Ferguson said.

The Chieftains fumbled the football twice in their first three possessions, the second one coming when they had a second down at the Hornet ten.

But on Friona's fourth possession, Brock Field hit Andy Carthel in the end zone on a 19-yard scoring play. Brian Wiseman's kick gave Friona the lead, 3:44 into the second quarter.

The next time Friona got the ball, Field connected with Cody Grimsley for a 16-yard gain. Field then gained seven on a roll-out play. Brock tossed to Jason Gutierrez for seven yards to the Tulia eight. But Field was sacked on third down.

Fortunately, Wiseman came in to nail a 32-yard field goal with 32 seconds remaining in the half, staking Friona to a 10-0 halftime lead.

Nathan Haile staked the Chiefs to a good start in the second half by stripping the ball after sacking the Tulia quarterback.

But on their first offensive play, Friona handed the ball back.

On defense, Bobby Gonzales had a fumble recovery. Emmanuel Vega, Jonathan Nava and Chris Carillo also stood out.

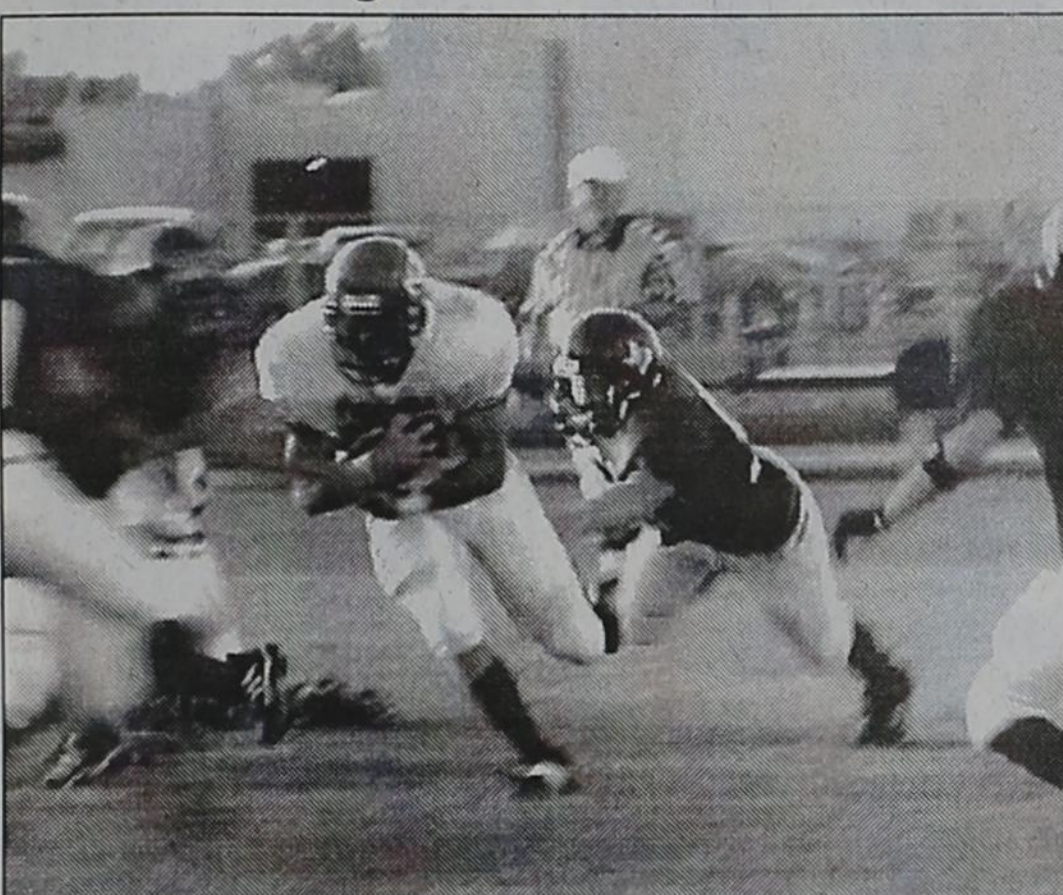
Friona led in yardage, 285-58, and in first downs, 11-4.

Supplements Reduce Age-Related Macular Degeneration

Antioxidant vitamins and zinc may reduce the impact of age-related macular degeneration (AMD), according to a study by researchers at ten U.S. universities. Among people at high risk for late-stage AMD, a dietary supplement of vitamins C, E and beta-carotene along with zinc, lowered the risk of progressing to advanced disease by about 25%. The supplements reduced the risk of vision loss by about 19%. They had no effect against cataract development and for people without AMD or early AMD only.

The findings surprised Susan B. Bressler, M.D.: "Until now, there has been no proven treatment to slow the progression of the disease and possible vision loss in people with the non-neovascular or dry form of AMD. The benefits of dietary supplements seen in our study was modest, however, provide an exciting preventive measure we can offer patients."

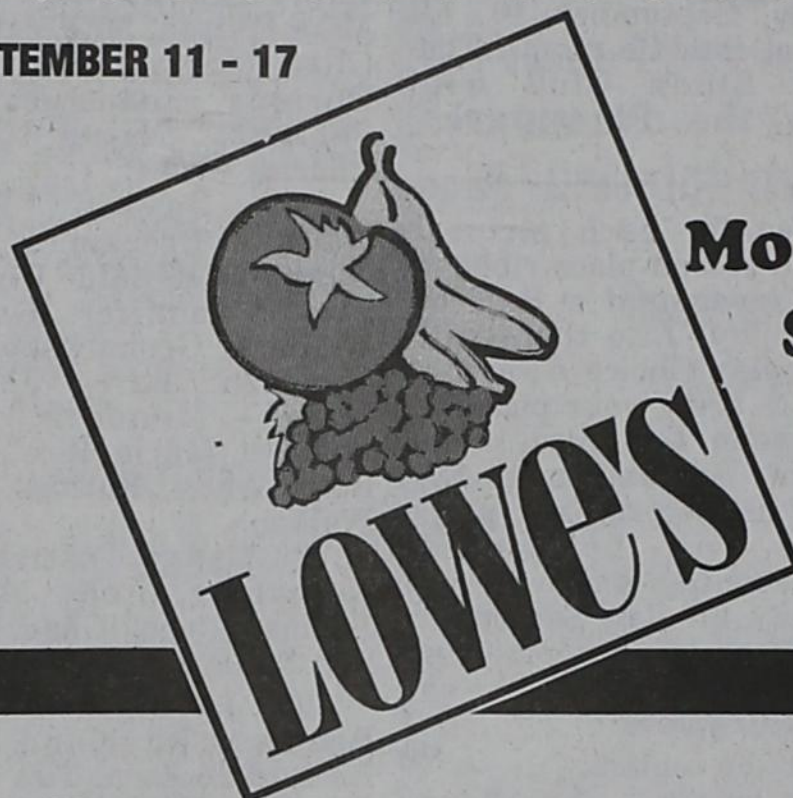
Supplements contained 500 milligrams of vitamin C, 400 milligrams of vitamin E, 15 milligrams of beta-carotene, 80 milligrams of zinc as zinc oxide and 2 milligrams of copper as cupric oxide. AMD is the leading cause of blindness among older adults.
