At this week's luncheon, for example, Lion Jack Anderson had to pay off for volunteering to haul band instruments to Mineral Wells in a Chevrolet carry-all.

And Lions Clyde Baker, who also was offering a truck, had to pay off because somebody mentioned that he was with White's Builders Materials Company. Lion N. C. Huston was fined 50 cents because the cowgirls - Peggy Swartz and Bobbie Kerley - of Cisco Junior College, dedicated a song to him.

The heaviest fine of all is \$2.00 for failing to provide a program. Lions are fined 10 cents for anything from being late, failing to wear their club pin or smiling at the wrong time.

It's all in fun. And everybody enjoys it. Lion Fleming Waters introduced Lion Everett Plowman of Eastland, who is that club's tailwister, as a prominent grocer of that city. And Plowman was fined for advertising.

CISCO JUNIOR College is getting ready to observe annual Ranch Day. And all Cisco should turn out for the big event. The school is Cisco's biggest payroll. They have 195 day students and 450 night veterans. The night students come from all over this section.

Seventy students drive over three nights a week from Abilene. Just about any town you want to mention is represented. Thousands of dollars are paid the veterans in subsistence each month by the Veterans Administration.

New Shallow Field For Eastland County Is In Prospect

Prospects for a new shallow well near Eastland were indicated this week when the Bob Gilchrist Drilling Company took a drillstem test of his No. 1, J. L. Brashear, and discovered 100 feet of free oil.

The well was bottomed at 1,489 feet. It is on the Brashear farm about two miles southeast of Eastland.

Gilchrist had pipe set in the well Friday, and planned to move in a cable tool rig for completion, but bad weather prevented the project.

The test was drilled with a rotary rig.

The condition of Mrs. I. J. Davis, who has been quite ill the past week, is reported improved.

Continued Rains Hamper Field Work

Field work was practically at a standstill another week because of continued rains, many of which were very heavy. Considerable acreage of early planted cotton and corn was damaged by standing water. Open weather was urgently needed for harvest of flax, hay and south Texas oats, and for planting and cultivation. The outlook of the rice acreage remained to be seeded and farmers were concerned because of the lateness of the season. The abundant moisture, however, gives promise of excellent range and pasture feed supply.

Prospects for an abundant wheat harvest were further improved as rains added substantially to moisture reserves over much of the Low Rolling Plains and Plateau areas. Early maturing areas had sufficient moisture to carry wheat well toward maturity, and practically all areas were adequately supplied for current and near future needs. Some wheat was beginning to head in northern Plains counties, and much of the crop in that area was in the boot. In the Low Rolling Plains, the late starting wheat was making excellent growth. Last frost and insects appear to have done little damage to wheat.

Vetch was being severely damaged by aphids. Corn, sorghums, cotton, and most other crops were generally in need of sunshine. Growing crops were retarded and fields were becoming grassy. Except in extreme southern counties, much of the cotton and sorghums was yet to be planted. Seed beds were in excellent condition, however, and seeding operations should proceed at a rapid rate as surface soils dry.

Ranchmen were smiling broadly because of the abundant moisture and excellent summer range and pasture feed prospects. Green feed was abundant in all areas excepting some northwestern and Franco-Pecos counties where new feed has been slow starting. However, a few days of warmer weather will bring grass along rapidly. In central, southeastern and coastal counties, excessive moisture was causing a rank sappy grass. Rains over the Plateau continued to curtail spring ear-ening of yearling wethers. The spring movement of steers to Kansas and Oklahoma pastures continued. All classes of livestock were getting fat and slick.

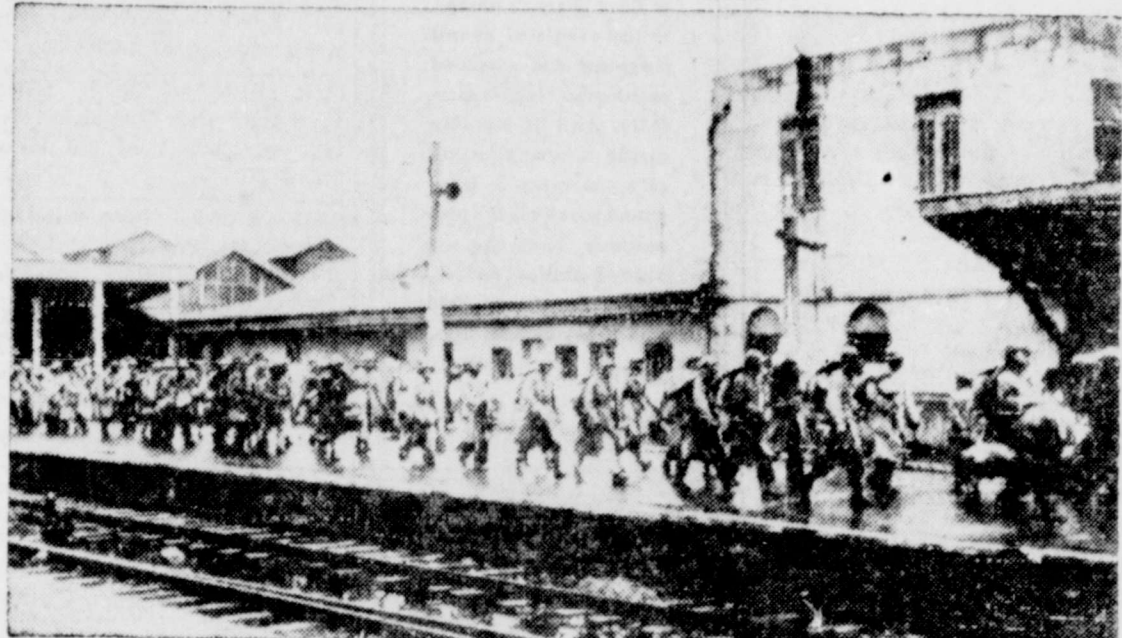
Residents of the Cisco area have been invited to visit the new firm from 9 a. m. until closing time. Souvenirs will be given to visitors during the day.

Open House will begin at 9 a. m. Saturday with opening of the departmental exhibits in the four schools of the college: Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Engineering and Veterinary Medicine. The Little Southwestern Livestock show, sponsored by the A & M Saddle and Siroin Club, will be held at 7:30 both Friday and Saturday nights. The two and one-half hour show will feature livestock judging, a professors' pig Topping contest by faculty members of the Animal Husbandry Department, an exhibition of riding American saddle horses, calf roping, rid-

ing and cutting horse contests and presentation of medals to winners in the show.

Saturday night at 10 a square dance and square dance exhibition will be held at the Grove on the A & M campus.

Mrs. Randolph Lee Clark of Cisco will be presented in Guion Hall at 11 a. m. Sunday as honor A & M Mother of the Year. Proposals to continue and to push progress on the Moran water project, the construction of a dam across Deep Creek, were discussed Tuesday night at the first regular session of the Moran City Council. James T. Mathews, newly elected mayor, presided.

Two new aldermen, S. L. Myrick and Paul Harper, together with aldermen hold-overs, J. G. Morris, H. D. Connolly and E. E. Hudman, were present.

Plans were completed by the council during the session to sponsor a city-wide clean-up campaign, beginning May 23.

Landscaping Of Farm Homes Steadily Increases

The annual number of Texas boys and girls enrolled in the National 4-H Home Grounds Beautification program has steadily increased, and the 1949 figure is expected to follow suit, according to the National Club Work. On a national scale, enrollment has more than doubled in the last five years.

4-H Club members start out by mapping the farmstead grounds and making plans for improvement. They learn to use flowers, plants, shrubs, trees and grasses in landscaping. Sometimes dad and mother lend a hand in the job, and share the satisfaction of turning the farm home into a beauty spot. "Before" and "after" photos are taken to show results.

For the 12th consecutive year, Mrs. Charles A. Walgreen of Chicago is providing merit awards for 4-Hers having the most outstanding records of accomplishment in the project. County winners will receive a gold-filled medallion of honor, and the state winner a 17-jewel gold watch. Judged on a national basis, eight state winners will be selected to go to the National 4-H Club Congress next fall, all expenses paid.

Texas named 22 county medal winners in the 1948 program. The Co-operative Extension Service supervises the activity.

Seniors Leave Friday On Trip To Christo-Concho Lodge At Christoval

Approximately 50 Cisco High School Seniors and sponsors will leave here early Friday for a week-end outing at picturesque Christo-Concho summer lodge at Christoval, Texas, located 15 miles south of San Angelo.

It will be a week-end strictly reserved for the seniors, a tradition at Cisco High School observed each year a month prior to graduation exercises. The tradition has been handed down from passing senior classes for the past two decades.

The site of this year's trip was decided upon by the senior class in a meeting two weeks ago, after a decision to go to Oklahoma for the two-day excursion was cancelled, according to Carlos Turner, high school principal. Some of the proposed trips included New Orleans and other points, but suitable accommodations prevented the group from making them.

At the Concha River resort, the Seniors will be treated to "real Western Style" hospitality, which includes favorite past times such as fishing, swimming, moonlight dancing, a half day's hike over the surrounding timber country, skating, boating and horse back riding.

Cabin accommodations were secured by the class secretary, Prudence Harris, who handled the Senior Day arrangements. Members of the class will be divided into groups and assigned cabins.

To make the trip to Christoval, the seniors chartered two buses and mapped the route to and from the lodge. Mr. Turner said.

The Merchants Credit Association of Cisco received the highest award given at the three day conference of some 800 credit bureau and collection service managers, held in Dallas Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. The meeting was sponsored by the 3rd District of the Associated Credit Bureaus of America, in which district Texas is located.

Mrs. Roy Huffmyer, manager of the local association, who returned from the meeting Tuesday night, reported that there were nine such districts in the United States and Canada, affiliated with the Associated Credit Bureaus of America. She reported that the theme of the Dallas meeting was: "How to Better Serve Credit Granters and the Credit Seeking Public."

Topics discussed at the meeting were: employer - employee relations; Consumer Credit conditions in 1949; credit and collection trends and management problems.

"At the conference," Mrs. Huffmyer stated, "delegates were impressed with their enlarged responsibilities in aiding in the development of Consumer Credit, and in helping to improve consumer credit control." The meetings also provided inspiration and new ideas which resulted from contacts with leading credit executives from Texas.

At a banquet in the Crystal Ball Room of the Baker Hotel in Dallas, Tuesday night, Mrs. Huffmyer was presented with a beautiful plaque, the J. E. R. Chilton, Sr. Memorial Award, engraved to the "Merchants Credit Association of Cisco, for outstanding achievement in consumer credit reporting in its city and for distinguished leadership in credit bureau activities in the State of Texas." This memorial award is presented each year by the Texas Retail Credit Bureaus to a bureau that in the opinion of the Board of Directors of the Texas Association, have shown marked progress during the year.

The plaque is a memorial to J. E. R. Chilton, Sr., who was a pioneer in the field of credits and who started the first credit bureau in Dallas. This bureau is still operated by J. E. R. Chilton, Jr., and Howard Chilton, and is the largest organization in the state.

"This plaque was not won by me," Mrs. Huffmyer said, "but was awarded to the Cisco merchants association, and such an award could never have been won without the help and assistance of all our members."

The Association officials who announced the award also reported that the Merchants Credit Association had received many other citations. The local group was given particular recognition for instituting a consumer credit series in the high school. The series of studies is from a group of books dealing with consumer credit. Cisco and Galveston were the only two cities mentioned in the citation.

Nick Miller, president of the Merchants' Credit Association, attended the meetings Sunday and Monday and J. W. Slaughter was present for the Monday discussions. Roy Huffmyer attended the Tuesday meetings and the banquet Tuesday night.

Lease In County Will Paying Off To State School Fund

AUSTIN, May 3, The State's revenue producing mineral lease issued in 1918 on an 84 tract in Eastland County,

uting to the permanent public free school fund, Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, said today.

Giles, who has a keen eye for the unusual, said that the productive span of many oil wells is short lived and that it seemed

the forerunner of thousands of others to follow, is still contributing more than a coincidence to him that the original lease, contributing the first royalty to the now vast \$140,000,000 permanent fund should still be adding to this fund after 31 years.

A total of six wells was drilled on the lease and "Old Number 5" is still producing some gas.

A recapitulation of the production lease shows that it has contributed a total of \$90,981.99 in oil and gas royalties. The most recent royalty check received from the Eastland Lease by the General Land Office and deposited in the permanent fund was for \$3.69.

Considerable Work For Cancer Cures

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS — (Special) — Some kinds of bacteria cause disease. Some kinds don't. Some kinds are tremendously helpful to human life — the kind that turn cream to cheese, for instance. And some kinds combat disease. Molds revolutionized the treatment of infectious diseases.

Dr. John B. Loefer of the Foundation of Applied Research here has been experimenting with a type of bacterium, the products of which have caused some remarkable regressions in tumors.

He points out that his findings are by no means a cancer cure and that, under the American Cancer Society grant, considerable work must be done on laboratory animals before application of the discovery can even be considered.

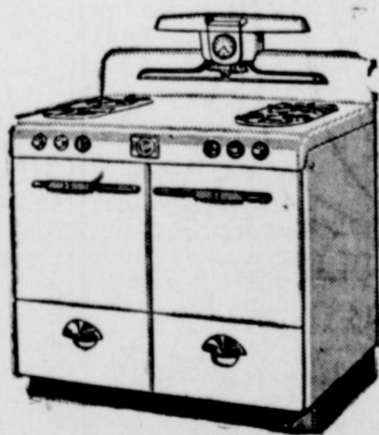
