Mrs. Randolph Lee Clark Named Honorary Cisco Mother

Churches Plan Special Mother's Day Program

Mrs. Randolph Lee Clark was named Honorary Cisco Mother for 1949 in a special proclamation issued Saturday by Mayor Rosenthal and will reign over Mother's Day activities in the city "in absentia" since she is in College Station where she will be presented, as Honor Texas A & M College Mother for 1949, in elaborate ceremonies Sunday.

In the College Station activities Mrs. Clark will be presented to some 6,000 mothers and visitors to the A & M campus, who will gather there for "Home Coming." She has two grandsons in the college and one who graduated from there recently. She was selected as the mother most exemplifying the ideal mother of the student body.

She was also one of the top four mothers in Texas considered for the title of Honorary Texas Mother for 1949. Mrs. E. A. Gillis was selected for the honor and was later selected as Honorary American Mother. She is in New York where she will appear in special services.

The Mother's Day activities here will be confined to private gatherings and special programs in the local churches.

The First Methodist Church will have a special program with appropriate musical numbers honoring all mothers. The Baptist Churches will take a special offering on Mother's Day to be used in the hospital work of the body.

Most of the remaining churches have announced special programs but did not report what the event would be. Mrs. Barton Philpott will present a corsage to the oldest mother attending church in a number of churches in the city and they will receive other recognition.

However, most of the celebrations will be held in the privacy of the homes where "Mother" reigns supreme; and all the children will gather around to pay homage to their special Mother. Many out-of-town visitors are expected to return home for a special visit to "Mom" on her day.

City Purchases Park And Industrial Property At Recent Tax Sale

City officials announced Saturday the purchase of the park property located just north of the post office and stated that the area would continue to be used as a park and playground for children. The property was purchased at the tax sale held in Eastland Tuesday in order to assure the continued use of the land as a park.

Plans call for the erection of the swings and other playground equipment which was moved when the American Legion hall was erected; and for city maintenance of the area.

They also announced the purchase of two blocks of property in the area of East 6th and Ave. A for industrial purposes. The property will be held for prospective industries desiring to establish businesses here.

The city also purchased three lots near the Boss Manufacturing Company plant. The lots were purchased to take care of possible expansion of the plant.

Officials pointed out that the purchases were made strictly for the uses described and were not designed as an investment. The areas, except for the park, will be used for industrial expansion only.

Cross Cut Area To Get Two Extension Tries

Two new locations have been filed for the Blake-Caddo field in Brown County four miles east of Cross Cut, it was reported here Friday.

The Paul Gardner No. 1 J. A. Haynes "B" outpost to production, is slated to drill to 2,800 with rotary permit. The well is located .032 feet from the north and 661 feet from the west line of Block 9, Juan Delgado survey 789.

Another outpost, the Paul Gardner No. 1 Clay Williams, is located 330 feet from the north and west lines of the 100 acre Clay Williams tract in William English survey 791. It also is on permit for 2,800 feet with rotary tools.

Completion filed with the Railroad Commission shows the Bresco Corporation No. 12 J. M. Moore, five miles east of Cross Cut, making 4.2 barrels of 43 gravity oil on official gauge. Test wts for 24 hours on pump from 1,187.1212 feet.

Location of the No. 1 Moore is 810 feet from the north and east lines of the Moore-Fomby 100 acre tract in the W. B. Smith survey 155.

The Bresco Corporation No. 22 A B Treston, outpost to production three miles east of Cross Cut, gauged 2.13 barrels of 42.9 gravity oil in 24 hours on pump from 1,188-1,260. The well is located 2,213 feet from the west and 810 feet from the north line of W. B. Smith survey 155.

Seniors Expected From 40 Schools

Approximately 1,000 senior students of some 40 neighboring high schools will help Cisco Junior College observe annual Ranch Day on Friday, May 13. And plans are being completed to make Ranch Day, 1949 style, the most outstanding celebration since the affair was organized three years ago.

In preparation for the event, the college campus already has taken on the appearance of a Hollywood movie set. Lanky cowpokes are polishing shooting irons, sharpening spurs and shining boots. In fact, western regalia is practically a "must" for all students.

Accumulating stubble on several dozen chins indicates that there will be another beard growing contest this year. Football players haven't used a razor in weeks.

The famed Wrangler Sheriff's Posse - some 20 strong - is headed by Jimmie Lee of Cisco this year. And his deputies are preparing their corral to rule - west of the Pecos fashion - during the Day. It will be unlawful, the sheriff said, to wear less than three items of western gear.

Austin Hollywood is chairman of Ranch Day activities, and his committee includes: George Owens, assistant; Art Clifton, parade; Percy Underwood, nomenclature; Betty Lennon, decorations; Sam Gorman, events; Jerry Westfall, entertainment; DeLores Johnson, menu; and Robi Robinson, publicity.

Letters and invitations have been mailed to senior class presidents of schools throughout this region. School officials expected at least 1,000 to visit the campus during the day.

Visiting groups will register at the Administration Building. At 10 a. m., a huge parade will visit the business district. Floats, the national guard, the high school band and other features will be included.

The program calls for a band concert at the college at 11 a. m. followed by a basket lunch at noon. Lunches will be sold by concession stands, one of which will be operated by the staff of The Branigan Iron, college newspaper.

At 1:30 p. m., a program in the auditorium will feature talks by President O. L. Stamey and Dean R. F. Webb, a musical skit starring the college chorus, Bob Littson, and his string band, Iroy and Madiene Stewart, the Co-Eds, Charles Adair, and the CJC square dance team.

Various contests will be held with Hollywood as master of ceremonies. These will include best dressed cowgirl, best dressed cowboy, longest beard and others. From 3:30 to 6 p. m. athletic games will include running contests. Motion pictures of grid games will be shown, along with other attractions.

The day's activities will be concluded with an old-fashioned ranch style supper, a barn dance and a forty-two tournament.

Other announcements concerning the annual event will be made this week.

COACH JACK EVERETT TO HEAD A B C CLUB'S SUMMER RECREATIONAL PROGRAM FOR CITY

Coach Jack Everett of Cisco High School was named by the ABC Club, in a director's meeting at the junior college cafeteria Friday noon, to head the city's summer recreational program.

Everett, who only four months ago was appointed Cisco Public Schools athletic director, will assume full responsibilities of the program, beginning May 9. At that time the official opening of the summer athletic season will get underway.

In to assist him will be V. C. (Buck) Overall, who will divide his time between indoor gymnasium activities such as volleyball, boxing and basketball, and softball.

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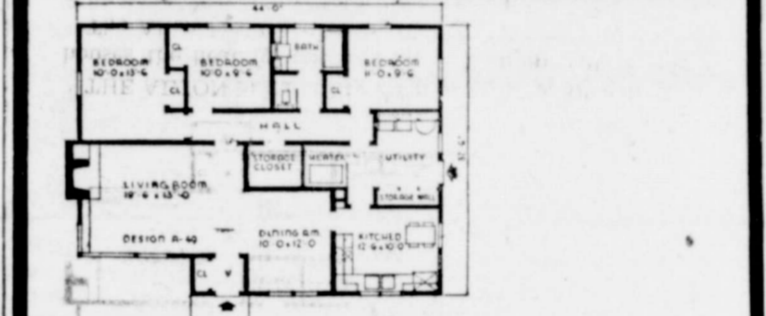
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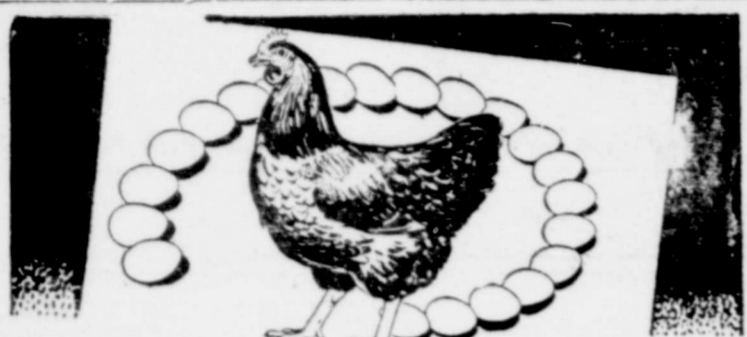
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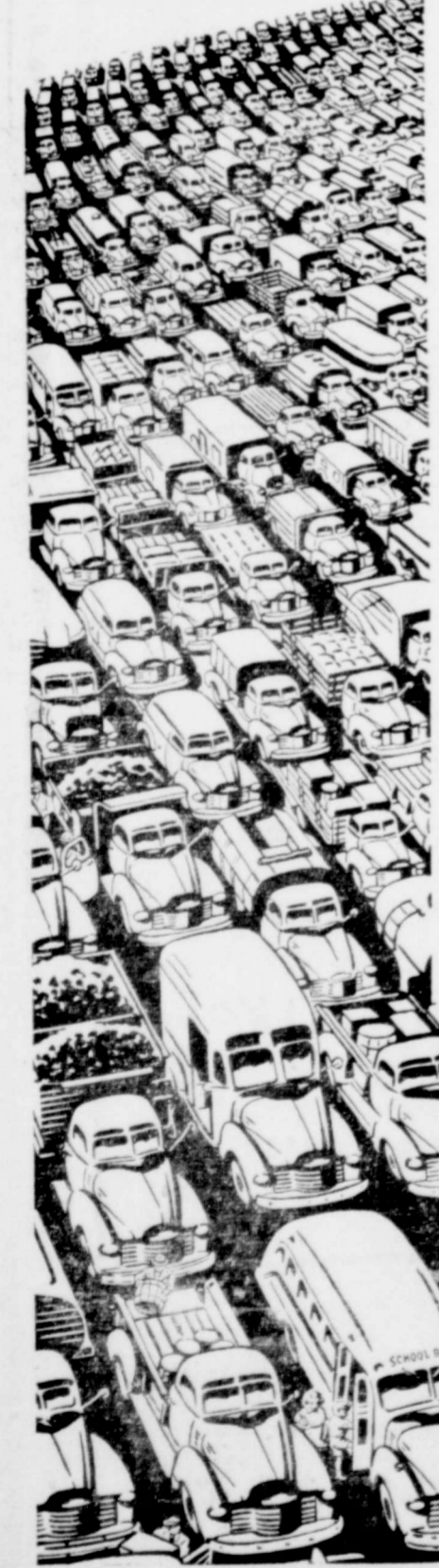
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
