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Lake Cisco Receives Foot Of Water In Sunday Rain

Another foot of water was added to Lake Cisco Sunday night when a heavy shower drenched the city with 5 inches of rain. The rain began falling at 8:30 p. m. and continued for approximately 30 minutes. The fall at the lake was measured at 7 inch. No appreciable rise was noted at Lake Birnie. The level of the lake was the highest point it had been in over a year and Ciscoans were assured of plenty of water for two to three years. The heavy cloud was accompanied by lightning and high winds and sent many storm-conscious persons to cellars. Churchgoers were caught in the downpour as they were leaving the places of worship. Damage from the high wind was confined to trees and some gardens. Some hail was reported in the Moran-Albany sector and Baird reported heavy damage to crops and some buildings. Abilene suffered some damage from tornado winds which injured five persons and damaged several houses. The rains and wind heralded the arrival of a cool front which moved into Cisco early Tuesday dropping the temperature rapidly. The forecast called for partly cloudy weather with occasional showers Tuesday and Wednesday.

Hurst Rites To Be Held Here At 10 AM Wednesday

Funeral services for Curtis L. Hurst, former Cisco man who lived in Hobbs New Mexico, will be held in Thomas Funeral Chapel at 10 a. m. Wednesday. Hurst, 30, son of Mrs. Tinnie Hurst of Cisco, was instantly killed when his car overturned near Hobbs early Sunday. W. E. Moore, former Cisco Church of Christ minister, will conduct the services. Burial will be in Oakwood with full military rites at the graveside. The American Legion Post will have charge of the services at Oakwood and will furnish the pallbearers. Thomas Funeral Home is in charge of the arrangements.

Hurst served with the U. S. Infantry during World War II. He entered the Army on October 11, 1940 and was discharged on August 4, 1945 as a sergeant. He was in Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes and Central European. He was married to Miss Dortha King in Hobbs on June 12, 1946. He is survived by his wife of Hobbs, his mother of Cisco, four brothers and one sister. The brothers are G. H. Hurst of Gorman, W. L. Hurt of Exter, California, C. C. Funeral services for Miss Maude Isabel Martin, 61, were held in the Putnam Methodist Church Saturday at 3 p. m. Rev. W. B. Merchants Issue Warning Against Swindlers

Reported incidents of swindling in Cisco recently resulted today in a warning being issued by the Merchants Credit Association against contracting for advertising, paying membership dues or making donations without first investigating thoroughly the salesman or solicitor. The association reported that recently a solicitor for memberships in an automobile association sold memberships in the organization here. Investigations showed that the association was legitimate but that the solicitor was not a representative of the group. The credit association has a committee appointed to study the requests for solicitation in Cisco and, if approved, a card is issued, signed by the secretary. The purpose of this committee is to protect local citizens and business firms. Everyone was asked to refuse to deal with solicitors who do not have credentials from the credit association.

John James Haynie To Teach In 16th Annual Band School At Texas Tech

John James Haynie of Cisco, accomplished musician, will be one of 16 faculty members at the sixteenth annual summer band school at Texas Technological College, beginning June 6 through July 16, Dr. D. O. Wylie, director, announced. Dr. A. A. Harding, director emeritus of the University of Illinois bands, and Michael Balnemes, who held for 22 years the first clarinet place in the Berlin State Opera orchestra, are returning this year as faculty members in the Texas Tech's band school. Dr. Julien Paul Blitz, professor of music at Texas Tech, will teach elementary music for public school teachers, music history and appreciation and stringed instruments for minor instrument requirements and band major. Thus far a faculty of 16 specialists in band has been organized. Joe L. Haddon of Texas Tech will serve as assistant band school director, and teach baritone and trombone; G. T. Gilligan of Kermit will teach trombone; J. W. King of Big Spring, French Horn; Neilson G. Patrick, San Benito, lecturer for course in administration of the school and band program, and survey of music materials. Others include A. A. Dhossche, director of the Vocational and Technical High School, San Antonio; N.G. Patrick, bassoon; John James Haynie, cornet; Paul Brannon, basses; Strana Herring, French horn; Charles A. Wiley, oboe and theory; Vic Williams, saxophone and clarinet; Harry Born, baritone; Lannes, cornet. Pre-college students will be housed on the campus in separate quarters from college students while enrolled in the band, a report here said.

Eastland Girl Is Injured In Fall At Lake Cisco

Betty Grimes, Eastland High School sophomore who was injured in an accident at Lake Cisco park Friday afternoon, was released from Graham hospital Sunday. Attendants described her condition as "satisfactory." Miss Grimes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pearson Grimes of Eastland, sustained back injuries when she accidentally fell on a piece of pipe in the park area. The mishap occurred during an Eastland High School class picnic, a report here said. The report said Miss Grimes' accident happened while she and classmates were assisting parents in preparing an evening meal. A physician, Dr. G. M. Stephenson of Cisco, was summoned to the scene by telephone and following first-aid, the girl was rushed in a Thomas Funeral Home ambulance to Graham hospital for treatment. Later, attendants at the hospital said Miss Grimes' fall was not as serious as first expected. X-rays, they said, revealed no indication of broken or fractured bones. While Miss Grimes' injury put a damper on the spirit of the visitors, nevertheless, recreational facilities at the park were enjoyed. Miss Martha June Morehart of Cisco, a teacher in Eastland High, Coach Wendell Siebert and a number of parents accompanied the group.

John James Haynie, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Haynie, 812 West 8th St., is a graduate of Cisco High School, receiving his diploma in 1942, and an honor graduate in music from the University of Illinois. During his high school days, Haynie was a member of the Lobo Band.

Following a semester's work at Texas Tech, Lubbock, Haynie enlisted in the service in 1942, serving ten months in the European Theater with the Third Army. Discharged in November of 1945, Haynie returned to Texas Tech the following February and completed both his freshman and sophomore years. 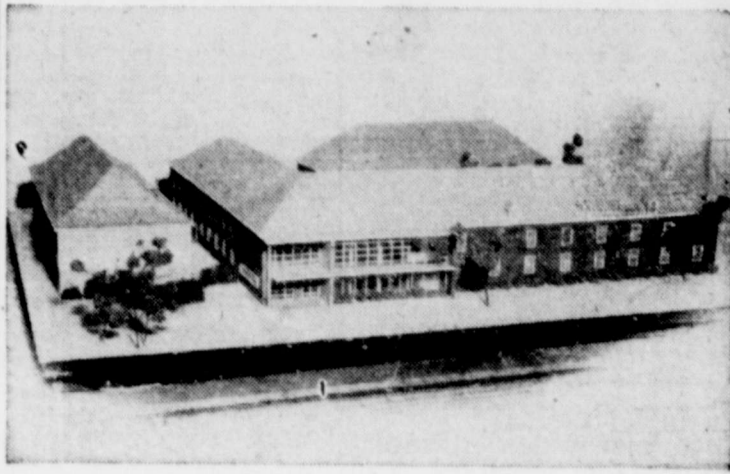
