W. E. Dean, local manager, announced that the company will deliver the merchandise to the proper authorities in Fort Worth without charge. The decision was reached after he paid a visit to the area.

Heavy infestation of small grasshoppers in grassland over different areas of Eastland County are being reported almost daily to the County Agent's office here, it was stated this week.

Farmers reports are coming in only from the tight soils of the county and none have been reported as yet from the sandy areas, according to J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Farm Agent.

Cooper is recommending that action be taken immediately by farmers and ranchers while the grasshoppers are still small and before they scatter and go into cultivated fields. The little hoppers lack only size and wings before they leave their "beds" or groups and heavy infestations of the larger hoppers can do much damage to crops as well as to orchards in the infested areas.

Many new insecticides are now on the market for hopper control. One that has proven successful is the product called Chlorthane. This material has now been stocked by at least one firm in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Carbon, Gorman and Rising Star, according to Cooper. The material not only acts as a stomach poison but kills by contact and also acts as a fumigant. Within a short time after ingesting a minute quantity the insect quits feeding but complete killing may take from one to three days as the chemical kills slowly.

It can either be applied as a dust or as a spray. One quart of the 74% material in 100 gallons of water is sufficient to spray a 30 foot strip along borders and fence rows for over a half a mile. If the 5% dust is used a total of 20 pounds per acre may be necessary.

The new material is not poisonous to livestock if the proper strength is used and proper application is made. The material should only be used on green grass or forage.

Sheriff Williams To Return 2 Men Charged In County

Sheriff J. B. Williams of Eastland County went to Fort Scott, Kansas, late Friday to take custody of two men wanted in this county on charges of theft by bailer.

The two men, Roy L. Mears and Hilman Bridges, both of Comanche county, were alleged to have purchased an automobile in Eastland and paying for it with a worthless check. Both are ex-convicts, the sheriff's office reported.

Arrested in Fort Scott, the men waived extradition proceedings. The car, which was recovered, will also be returned to Eastland.

Program For Official Opening Of 1949 Softball Season Completed

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal will officially open the 1949 softball season in Cisco Monday night when he tosses in the first ball in the game between the Humble Oilers and the West Texas Utilities Company Kilowatts at Chesley Field after elaborate opening ceremonies which will follow a game between the First Baptists and the First Methodists.

Opening ceremonies will include speeches by Rosenthal, ABC Club and school officials. Monday will also signal the opening of the ABC Club's drive for membership. M. F. Underwood, club president, will open the drive with a talk at the Monday night ceremonies. The goal has been set at 200 members.

E. L. Jackson, program chairman, announced that the program would consist of the talks, flag raising ceremonies, transcribed music and possibly a concert by the Lobo Band. Ground and park attendants, under the direction of H. O. Anderson, have spent most of the week getting grounds and bleachers in condition for the season.

Farmers Make Progress; Need Dry Weather

Farmers made excellent progress toward catching up with much needed field work in central, southern, eastern, and coastal counties in the open humid weather. In this area rain would soon be welcome to germinate new plantings and further stimulate crop development. In contrast heavy rains early in the week held field work at a standstill in the High and Low Rolling Plains. Torrential rains and floods also stopped field work in most north Texas counties. Oat harvest was well along in south Texas and the first load of 1949 wheat was delivered in north Texas.

Wheat prospects were generally maintained except where hail damaged local areas. However, open weather is now urgently needed until harvest is completed. Hail, wind and water from last week's storm caused local damage in nearly all counties on the Cap Rock, but on the whole, the damage was small. Some leaf rust was reported in most counties, with the heaviest infestation in areas off the Cap Rock. Because of the advanced stage of the crop, it was not expected to cause excessive damage. Several local spots of stem rust have been reported in the important High Plains district has good color and is mostly headed. General harvesting in the Low Rolling Plains is expected to start this week, and in central High Plains counties about June 10-15.

Oklahoma Company Awarded Contract On Installing Parking Meters In Downtown Area

The Park-O-Meter Company, of Tulsa and Oklahoma City has been awarded a contract for furnishing and installing parking meters in the downtown area of Cisco, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal announced Saturday. The contract was awarded to the Oklahoma concern after a careful study of the products and proposals of some six different manufacturers.

The Park-O-Meter was selected because of its simplicity of design and operation. It was believed that the type meter selected would be more beneficial to Cisco than types of more elaborate design and intricate mechanical operation.

An engineer for the successful bidder will be in Cisco Monday to work with city officials in preparing for the installation. He will offer suggestions as to proper location and time limits. Plans call for the installation of some 300 meters.

Parking regulations will be in effect between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 6 p. m. on week days. There will be no charge for parking after 6 p. m. or on Sunday. One hour parking be allowed on Avenue D and two hour parking will be permitted on Avenue E. The area in front of the First National Bank has been designated as a one hour limit zone and not a 12 minute zone as was first decided. Plans call for the erection of signs near the post office limiting parking to 10 minutes. No meters will be installed there.

The meters are being installed without a cash expenditure on the part of the city. Fifty per cent of the revenue will go to the city and 50 per cent to the company to pay for the meters. When the revenue taken by the company pays the cost of the meters they become the property of the city.

The meters are being installed on a trial basis for one year and if they have proven unsatisfactory at that time they will be removed at no cost to the city.

The type meter to be used will cost \$65 each installed but city officials plan for the installation to be done by city employees. This will save \$4 per unit.

The meters will begin arriving in Cisco approximately three weeks after the survey is completed. It was learned that Ranger has contracted for meters and that Eastland is studying a plan similar to the one Cisco adopted. The Eastland meter order was expected to be made this week.

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MEMORIAL DAY

Out of the great struggle between the Union of the States and the Southern Confederacy has come Memorial Day — the most reverent of all American holidays.

According to research experts, Memorial Day originated in the South, when the ladies of the Confederacy brought flowers to the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers. Later, in 1868, General Logan, National Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, set aside May 30th for honoring those who died in the War between the States.

During the 81 years that followed General Logan's inauguration of Memorial Day, the ranks of dead comrades have swelled to include the fallen soldiers of all wars. Gradually the custom has extended to include all graves, and Memorial Day now is not only

a day of patriotic commemoration, but of personal and family dedication as well.

Although Memorial Day is a legal holiday in most of the United States and its possessions, it is not universally celebrated on May 30th. Southern States, with the exception of Virginia, have their own days for honoring the dead. Memorial Day is observed on April 26th by Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Mississippi, and on May 10th in North and South Carolina. Memorial Day in Louisiana and Tennessee is June 3rd.

Like most of our holidays, a part of Memorial Day can be traced to ancient times. Solemn rites called "Zoaia" were performed over graves in ancient Greece, and the Romans had a similar feast called "Parentalia." Flowers which bloomed on the graves were believed to be an omen that the soul of the deceased had found peace in the next life.

Other countries have days set aside to honor their dead. French cemeteries bloom with flowers on "Jour des Morts," and the Roumanians remember their dead on the "Eve of the Trinity." In the East Indies and parts of China, graves are decorated on a special day called "Ching Ming," or "Festival of the Tombs."

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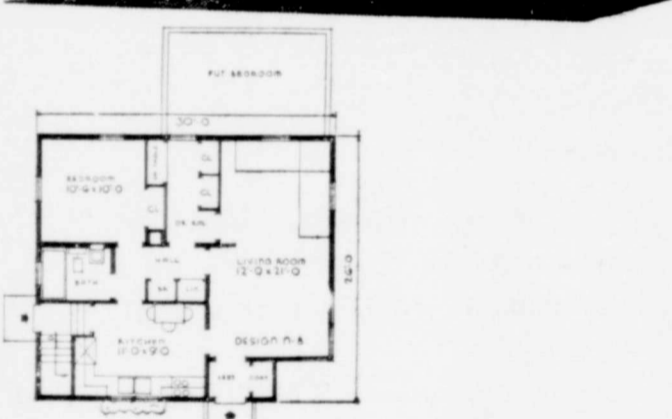
