Highway 80 Association Membership Drive Mapped By Chamber of Commerce

Classwork In Summer High School Progressing; 40 Students Entered

Class work in the city's summer school sessions is progressing steadily, Arlin Bint, superintendent of public schools, reported today.

The school, up to Tuesday, had enrolled some 40 or more students for make-up work. According to Bint, this year's enrollment is average in comparison with previous enrollments.

The academic course being offered by the school includes English, Math and Social Sci-

ences, Bint said. The courses are being taught by a three-teacher faculty composed of Miss Doris Joe Pyle, M. F. Woods and Roy Killingsworth.

Bint explained that students would not be given credits for work if they failed to register before the four day deadline which ended today. Actual class work was started Monday following registration of students and distribution of books.

Meanwhile, enrollments in the Cisco Junior College summer school, which got underway Monday morning, had mounted to 25 students today, H. R. (Pop) Garrett, dean, reported.

However, enrollments this year did not reach last year's number, it was disclosed. The students last year totaled between 35 and 40. Garrett said the deadline for registrations was Thursday, and after that no college credits could be given for summer school work.

Credits are being given, at the completion of the eight weeks' prescribed study course, in History, Government and English, Garrett pointed out.

Attendants said Kyle was suffering from a serious brain concussion and a possible fractured skull he received when the car in which he was driving failed to negotiate a curve five miles south of Rising Star and turned over.

Plans for a membership drive of Cisco for the U. S. Highway 80 Association were discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night.

Plans call for a future meeting of a committee to be appointed by President Guinn, with hotel men, cafe owners, service station operators and others particularly interested in tourist business. The meeting will be for the purpose of appointing drive teams and for completing plans for the campaign.

The Highway Association was formed for the purpose of centralizing the activities of the towns and communities located on the highway, in a concentrated effort to advertise the advantages of traveling U. S. Highway 80.

Similar groups were formed by towns on Highways 180 and 36 and advertising programs are in operation by those groups. The date of the meeting was not announced.

Other business matters taken up at the meeting included a report by Mayor Rosenthal on the proposed widening of Avenue D. He reported that a letter from the State Highway Department stated that the department could not pave or widen a city street over which highway traffic flowed if the curb line had previously been set. Mayor Rosenthal said that the city could not handle the project alone at the present time.

A letter from the M K & T Railway, thanking the city and the Chamber of Commerce for the stand taken on the proposed schedule change by the company, was read. Local officials refused to enter into any suit against the company when the proposal to discontinue regular passenger service and add mixed trains was brought up. The decision was reached after careful study showed that mail service would remain practically the same and that freight service would be improved.

After hearing reports from various committees, C. of C. members viewed a film of actual war scenes. The film was furnished and shown by the National Guard.
