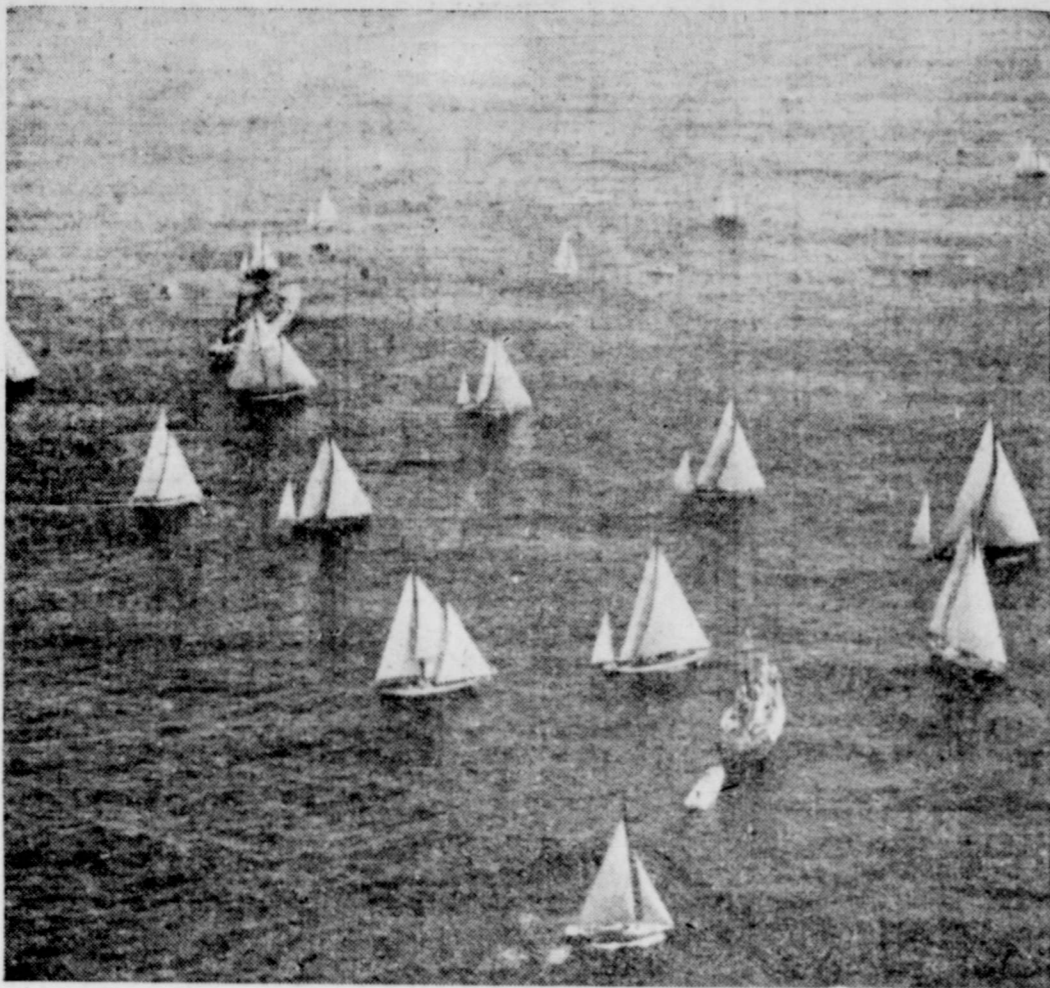
Following the services there will be a reception in the rectory and the public was invited to attend both the services and the reception.

Marine Corps Calls For Active Duty Reservists

The Marine Corps has announced that it was taking applications on certain continuous active duty assignments during the fiscal year which began today.

There are 17 continuous active duty billets which will be available on July 1 in the directors office in New Orleans. All enlisted reservists who are interested in the program were asked to contact Elton Kennedy, 1006 West 13th.

The billets are divided as follows: Rank of Sergeant or below: One classification specialist, one photographer, ten clerical or administrative personnel and one occupational technician. Rank of Corporal or below: Two Clerk typists. Rank of Private First Class or below, one clerk typist and one truck driver.

Reservists with a higher rank than required for the billet may apply for active duty but will be required to take an administrative reduction in rank for the period of such duty. However, when he returns to inactive duty status he will be reinstated to his old rating.

The time of duty is usually three years but no limitation as to the number of years a person can serve. He cannot be transferred without his consent and during time of peace can be returned to inactive duty status upon his request.

Navy To Accept Women Reserves

NEW ORLEANS, July 1. — The Navy will begin for the first time July 1 to take women into its peacetime reserve enlisted forces direct from civilian life.

Eight Naval District headquarters here said today that women high school graduates between the ages of 18 and 30 who have no children below 18 years of age will be eligible. Until the new order only former members of the WAVES were accepted.

The skirted contingent of naval reservists will be enlisted at Navy Recruiting stations, naval reserve training centers, naval air stations and by reserve officers who serve as volunteer recruiters in most cities.

Fogging Machine Operating On Ten Hour Daily Schedule

The new fogging machine purchased by the City recently is operating on an eight to ten hours schedule every working day of the week, according to a report by health department officials.

A new type of spray is being used with greater success, it was reported. The spray is composed of 100 per cent DDT diluted to six to eight per cent with diesel oil. To every gallon of spray material used one gallon of Pyrethrum is added.

The type spray now being used is recommended by the government for sudden killing of flies, mosquitoes, fleas and many other types of insects including some of the garden pests.

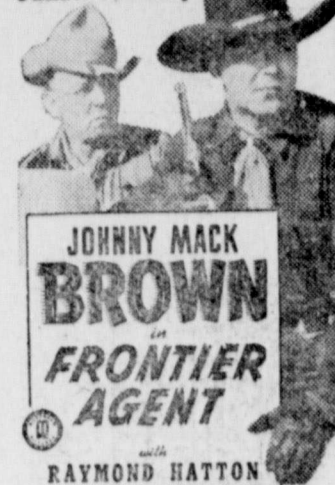
