

Almost Complete Wheat harvest made rapid

progress in the important High Plains as open weather prevailred and the supply of equipment and hands was adequate. By the end of the week, harvest was nearing completion in all areas except the central and western parts of the Panhandle and with another week of open weather, most of the 1949 Texas wheat crop will be harvest-

Corn continued to develop favorably and prospects remained excellent in most areas, although additional rainfall would be helpful to limited acreage of late corn.

Cotton made excellent growth and continued fruiting in central and southcentral counties Bolls were opening rapidly in the Lower Valley where harvest was underway. Dryland cotton in that area was suffering from the effects of continued drought. Rain was also needed in the Coastal Bend area, where fruiting had stopped and shedding of bolls and leaves was excesive. Plants made rapid growth over eastern and northcentral Texas, with early votton blooming. There was some increase in insect infestation. In northwest Texas where most cotton is late, chopping and plowing continued and plants made good growth. Most High. Plains cotton had received first cultivation and growth For George Taylor was favored by the hot weather of the past week. Insect infestations remained light in northwest areas as many farmers carried out early control meas-

Ranges and pastures continued upplying good feed over most of the state. However, most dry. A heavy growth of grass was curing in most Low Rolling Plains, western Plateau and southern counties. 




