Military Amateur Radio System Is Set Up In State

Austin, July 20. — The organization of MARS, Military Amateur Radio System, is now operating throughout the state of Texas and has received enthusiastic reception by the amateur operators. Colonel Oscar B. Abbot, Executive of the Texas Military District, announced here today.

Operations are now being conducted and even though approval has been given or temporary suspension during the summer months, it was the decision of the operators to continue as much as practicable to keep the system alive and maintain activity on the various MARS frequencies.

The purpose of MARS is to create interest and further training in military radio communications to promote study and experimentation in military radio communication to coordinate practices and procedures of amateur radio operators with those of military radio communication; and provide an additional source of training radio communication personnel in the event of a local or national emergency.

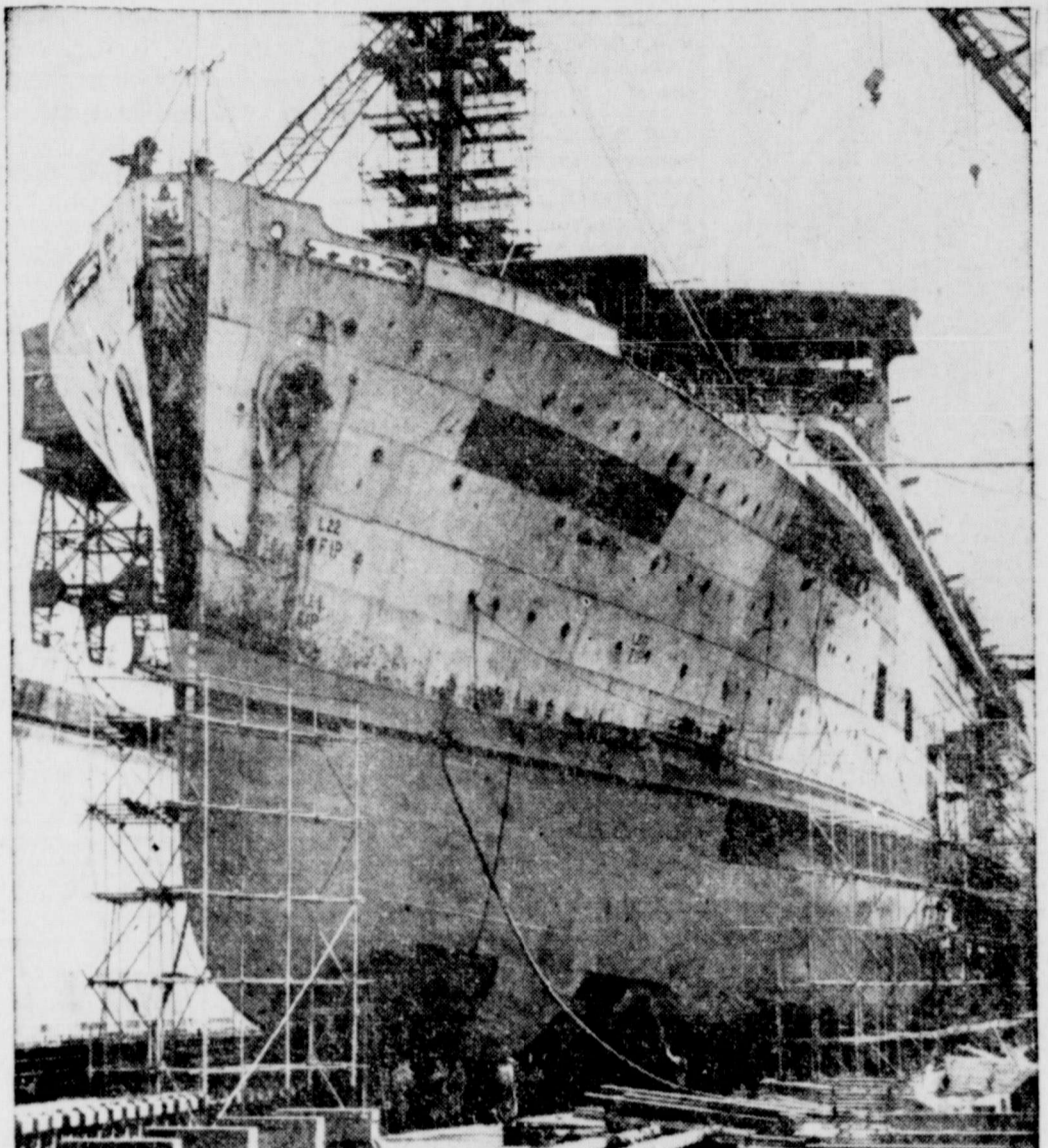
Membership is open to any individual in the military service, Organized Reserves, National Guard or ROTC who possess a valid amateur radio operator's license issued by the Federal Communications Commission. Membership of civilians is not presently authorized but plans are being made for such membership.

Meteor Believed To Have Fallen In Putnam Area Near Midnight Sunday

Persons in Fort Worth, Sweetwater, Brownwood and Cisco reported Tuesday they had seen a meteor falling in this vicinity shortly before midnight Sunday.

Dr. Z. T. Huff, dean of Howard Payne College in Brownwood, reported he saw a large meteor falling in the Putnam area, between Cisco and Baird. He said it left a long tail, and that one section broke off.

Dr. Huff said later that two other observers reported to him they had seen the fiery missile. Raby Eminger, employe of the Santa Fe Railroad in Sweetwater, said he saw the falling meteor from Sweetwater. Mrs. Zelma Martin reported she saw it in the northeast, from the yard of her home.

In Cisco, several persons reported seeing a large, flaming object in the skies, toward Putnam. An employe of the

Daily Press said he saw the meteor crossing the heavens. "It looked almost like a falling airplane on fire," he said.

Mrs. I. E. Mulberry, Negro maid, told the Press she saw the meteor falling, and that it appeared to her near Abilene. She said it was the biggest "falling star" she had seen.

In Fort Worth, David Donoghue, former mayor of Westover Hills, told Oscar Monnig, amateur astronomer there, "It was the brightest meteor I have ever seen."

Monnig, in a statement to the Star-Telegram, said meteors burn out about 30 miles above the earth's surface. He said the curvature of the earth makes them appear much closer than they are.

T. M. Collier, representative from the 106th district, today advised The Press that the State Highway Department had approved an extension of Farm-to-Market Road 569 from the end of the present hard surfaced road south to the road intersection at Nimrod. The extension will be about four miles.

Farm Road 569 begins approximately two miles southwest of Cisco and extends south toward Scranton and Nimrod for approximately five miles and is known as the old Scranton road. The first section was completed several years ago and applications were in for the extension toward Scranton. The highway department set the present road route.

The construction is subject to the availability of funds under the terms of Senate Bill 287 and to the conditions that Eastland County will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the state.

Upon acceptance of the order by Eastland County officials the state engineers are directed to proceed with the plans for the construction. When the right-of-way and funds are available engineers are to proceed with the construction and to assume the road for maintenance upon completion.

The plans call for the extension of F-M 1027 from Okra north to road intersection. This road will be approximately 3.5 miles.

The two roads will cost an estimated \$65,300 and the designation is subject to the provisions of the \$30 million Farm to Market Road Law which was passed by the Legislature in March. Under this bill \$1,250,000 was placed in a special farm road fund to be used exclusively on rural roads. The fund will be available on September 1.

RETAILERS CONDEMN WASTE

A large retail association, which represents 7,500 merchants in this country and Canada, has appointed a committee to oppose waste and extravagance in government, and to arouse all retailers to the advantages of the Hoover Commission's report on reorganization of certain government agencies.

The resolution went on to say, "With a probable decline in Federal revenues, the terrific waste and extravagance of government are cause for serious alarm. We call, therefore, upon all members of our trade to insist upon a policy of rigid economy in the government."

Retailers know that the kind of waste which characterizes government activity would be fatal if it were allowed to exist in their own business. Competition is getting tougher. Instead

of shortages, we have surpluses in many lines. So the retailer must practice strict economy if he is to supply goods at an acceptable price, maintain his standards of service at a high level, and so hold his trade.

It is often argued that government cannot be operated on a business basis. That just does not hold water. There is no excuse for having half a dozen costly agencies when one would suffice to do a given job. There

is no excuse for the size of the Federal payroll. And there is no excuse for the incredible amount of duplication of effort that is found throughout government in all its branches.

Every retailer — and every other businessman as well — should take part in the fight for efficient, economical govern-

ment. Only public pressure can bring it about. No bureaucrat will economize unless he is forced to. Billions of our tax money can be saved — if we demand it. Only by cutting down inflated government can we save a free nation and ourselves from destruction by taxation.

Boarding House Reach Developed At Local Hotel; Serve Family Meals

They call it dining archery at the Mobley Hotel when they spear a biscuit across the table with a fork.

A long arm is worth its weight in country cornbread and sausage. The boarding house reach still pays dividends and family style meals cost 60 cents.

A little gray headed woman by the name of Mrs. J. E. Shelton manages the red brick hotel. She directs the cooking in the hostelry that was the first of the famous Hilton chain. And its where the boarding house tradition remains alive.

"Salesmen call it 'pitching till they win' when they sit down to the table," Mrs. Shelton says.

Competition is obvious, but friendly. A preacher, a school teacher, traveling salesmen and merchants are regular diners.

Some of the old timers who have been boarding there for years have an uncanny sense of detection. They can spot a hot biscuit in a plate of a dozen cold ones. Most of them can stab a sausage across the table

before a newcomer can take aim.

"We just turn them loose and let 'em go," Mrs. Shelton chuckled. "And sometimes when they get in late, we'll let them cook their own meal."

Mrs. Ora H. Foreman, who has lived at the hotel for years, says she always has her biscuit buttered when meals are called.

Hugh Thweatt, local druggist, says a year of family style eating perfected his strategy. "I can hold my own with the best of them," he boasted.

Typical table prizes include hot biscuits, meat, always peas, beans, potatoes, and onions, cornbread, salad, and dessert. Fruit cobblers are the most popular sweets, says Mrs. Shelton.

But quantity is important. Because it keeps the old boarding house reach alive. "And the guests, too," quips Mrs. Shelton.
